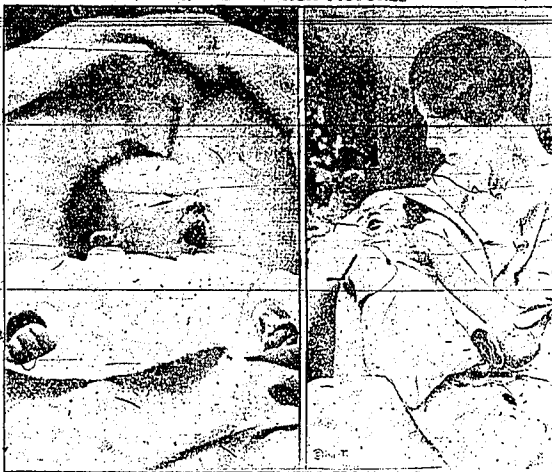

### HOW GARBO HIDES HER FEET



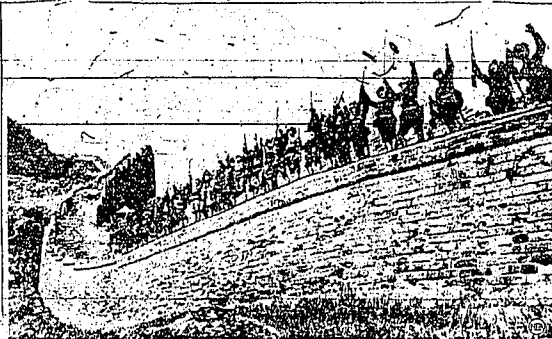

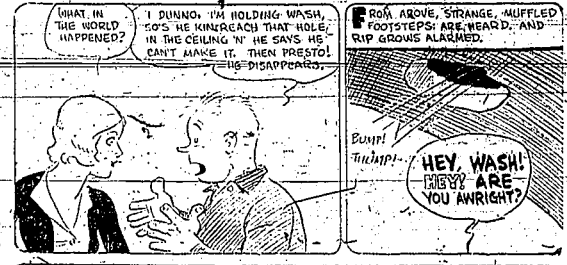

Safety education campaigns among workers can do much to cut down this toll. In some plants, too, it has been found advantageous to order all workers to wear goggles. But whatever needs to be done, it is obvious that both labor and management must tackle the problem together.

AN ENCOURAGING SIGN

ONE encouraging sign in the midst of hard times is noted by the Magazine of Wall Street in its current issue, when it points out that during January more new business enterprises were begun in New York state than in any other single month in the past two years.

This indicates that an increasing number of people are gaining confidence that the worst is over and that the long upward pull is beginning. More important, perhaps, as the magazine points out, it also indicates that an increasing number of jobless people are finding it possible to adapt themselves to changed conditions and are setting out to make a living on their own.

How far away prosperity may be is something no one can say. But this little report from New York is one of the most encouraging straws that recent months have provided.

But the vast majority keep faith at hearthsides. A woman's greatest pleasure consists now, as always, in telling the man she loves that it isn't his fault that he hasn't won the laurels that he deserves... and in telling a little boy, who looks like his father, that of course he will win them some day.

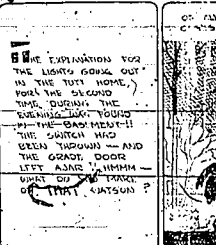

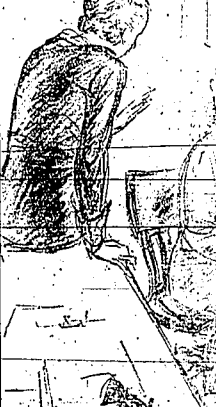

# Spud Shippers Association - Fighting for Better Rates

Potato Group - Discusses Problems at Special Meeting in City

AT A special meeting of the Southern Idaho branch of the Idaho Potato Shippers' association, held at the Park hotel Friday night, matters of interest to the potato industry of Idaho were discussed.

"Due to lack of better organization, many shippers are marketing Idaho's large potato crop in within growers have as a result as buyers have to be handled by the shippers' organization," said a statement issued by the organization.

"During the past few weeks, considerable publicity has been given to the reduction of rates on spoils to many points east of Chicago, which took effect March 1. This statement contained a list outlining the amount of some dealers outside the state organization who are receiving preferential rates. The fact remains that this reduction and all other recent concessions from the railroads were brought about by the Idaho Potato Shippers' association which has been in existence for several months. The foremost rate expected in the west at an expenditure of some \$200,000. This recent reduction is only one of the many important changes needed in connection with potato rates.

"Vigorously interested, the Twin Falls territory is more vigorously interested in potato rates than any other section of the state because of its higher rate than other and eastern Idaho and a 2c higher rate than the West. The fact that the section is most eastern and southern points.

"Due to the exceedingly low prices of potatoes and the small margins on which buyers are attempting to work, the rate advance, which is being made, is a considerable business advantage.

"The Idaho Potato Shippers' association has a complaint filed and is being everything in its power to have all points in Idaho east of Boise covered by the same rate to the East and California points which would place every coming station on an equal basis and do away with much of the present unequal competition. This association has been contended with.

"Another important consideration is the excessive charge for greater protection during the winter months, so present (the rate) tends to be a most eastern points and the shippers are contending that it is all the service required and are fighting for such a reduction. Many growers feel that when it is necessary to have to start being lost, the charge is necessary in the light of the fact that the program has been made, it is expected by the dealers that reason must be such before a program can be expected.

"Travis Hager Young, president of the Idaho potato shippers, said that the shippers' association has devoted much time and effort to all of the items which the association is trying to remedy. It is expected that arrangements can be made for him to address many farmer gatherings in the near future. He is sure that potato growers may have a better understanding of the problems confronting the potato industry and an opportunity to give some assistance.

"One must be an extreme opinion in attempting to make a good job of handling Idaho potatoes. The assumption would be that this was a gathering of outsiders, but when these potato shippers from all sections Idaho were enjoying themselves every attempt at confidence was exhibited by the bitter fact that confronted them. With upwards of a month's time of potatoes left in Idaho, some 70-80 days left to ship and a reluctance to distant markets to buy their own, they are in the judgment of the well-posted that dealers and growers alike must seek for favorable conditions during the balance of this season."

# LEADERS OFFER IDEAS TO HELP LIFE OF NATION

Executives Make Suggestions For Improving Conditions

COLUMBIAN, (AP) - A questionnaire circulated by Ohio State University's college of engineering, suggests for leading executives, industrial executives, and economists, including President William Howard Taft, a list of suggestions for the improvement of life of the nation.

These included a five day work week with an eight hour day, old age pensions, better credit facilities, better factory conditions, industries on a national scale, and unemployment insurance. Government ownership of industries was disapproved.

Replicas were summarized in a supplement to the Engineering Experiment Station News, published by the university. Committee members conducting the study, were Professors F. C. Caldwell, C. A. Norman and John Young.

Five Factors Stressed

Two factors were stressed in the report.
