Far East Peace Hope Fades; China Recalls Chiang to Lead Army

Military Machines Clash Over Wide Front;
Conference Held Impossible Until
Japanese Troops Evacuate.

SHANGHAI, (UPI)— Weary armies battled along a wide front in the Yangtze valley today as Chiang brushed aside world-wide peace overtures, and recalled from exile his greatest military leader, Gen. Chiang Kai Shek, to direct the defense against invading Japanese.

Chinese government leaders, meeting Japanese chargers that defending armies were responsible for the renewed hostilities, flatly announced their refusal to attend the long-awaited peace conference unless Japanese troops withdraw.

At the same time, the capital executive committee met and announced that Gen. Chiang had been appointed chairman of the military council, a post he had been offered to assume by the Japanese army.

The Sino-Japanese clash in the Yanzei valley, which sprung up shortly after commanders of both sides had agreed to a truce, apparently encouraged the government to a new assertion of national entity.

Chiang Tso-Ping, former minister of foreign affairs and chairman of the foreign affairs committee at Loyang, hastened the announcement that Chinese will remain away from the front, and that the Japanese troops leave Shanghai.

"The government stand on the Shanghai question is guided by the desire to maintain peace, and will not yield to coercion, nor will it lose its honor, humiliations, and loss of sovereignty," Chiang said.

Questions regarding the responsibility for the Sino-Japanese incident as well as indemnity for the loss of lives and property must be discussed and settled with absolute frankness," he added.

Gen. Chiang, whose policies have been in doubt since he resigned several months ago, won his appointment along with Ku Meiu-Yu, prominent leftist, administrator of railways.

USEFUL SENATOR NORRIS

SENATOR GEORGE W. NORRIS of Nebraska has in this session of Congress once more demonstrated that he is one of the most enlightened and useful men in American public life today.

First, after many years of struggle, he saw his famous lame-duck amendment win a victory. State legislatures presently will be called on to ratify this measure which will make the federal government more responsive to the will of the people.

Secondly, it is becoming evident that he is about to win his anti-injunction fight. If his bill passes, "yellow dog" contracts will no longer be upheld by Uncle Sam's courts, and federal judges will no longer be sacrosanct despot in labor controversies.

The author of these two measures has done his country a great service.

PLANES VS. INFANTRY

A GLANCE back at the record of the fighting around Shanghai leads one to wonder if the offensive power of the airplane in modern warfare may have been overestimated a little.

Throughout this conflict the Japanese were well equipped with modern airplanes, while the Chinese, to all intents and purposes, had none at all. The Japanese bombers went into action almost daily; before the beginning of this month it was announced that they had dropped more than 900 bombs, most of them large ones.

But—the Chinese lines held longer than any military expert had dared predict. Isn't it just possible that the infantryman is still the final arbiter of war, despite modern inventions? Airplanes are exceedingly useful weapons, but they have not yet made the old-fashioned foot-slogger obsolete.

THE SALES TAX

Congress adopts a sales-tax, as it seems about ready to do, in preference to voting stiffer rates for wealthy income tax payers; it may gain a lot of favor with important contributors to campaign chests, but it is hard to see how it will win the abiding affection of the man in the street.

The man in the street, these days, is often quite literally in the street, looking for a job or a free meal. Higher income taxes would not worry him; a sales tax, however, would affect him directly and painfully, even though staple foods are exempted.

However, it is not customary, in times of depression, for the statesmen at Washington to worry greatly over the plight of the little fellow. The sales tax will probably go through, thereby making it unnecessary to wallop the higher income tax brackets so very heavily; and the big income tax payers, beyond doubt, will be delighted—and grateful.

A NATION'S SYMPATHY

PROBABLY no parents ever received such universal sympathy as the world is accorded its most famous young couple today in the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby. And while the public is always eager to help a lost child find its way home again, somehow this case is different. It is Lindy's baby that is gone this time. And anything that happens to his household is very personal to millions of Americans.

People who applauded enthusiastically, when the famous aviator reached Le Bourget on his famous flight to Paris in 1927, are suffering with him now. They aren't thinking of him as a daring explorer of skies this time. Just as a young father whose little boy has been kidnapped...

They aren't remembering Anne as the fearless girl who matches her husband danger for danger. Quite suddenly she is only a young mother who is afraid that her baby is crying for her.

The world has always given the Lindberghs applause. Now it's giving sympathy. Swift. Warm. Genuine. It has watched for them in dangers many times. Now it is watching with them. The Wall streets and the Main streets and all the other streets that make their criss-cross way up-and-down the nation echo with voices that wish that they could say some consoling word. Little boys who almost have come to believe that Lindy's adventurous wings are their own, and their fathers' and mothers' and sisters are hoping desperately and prayerfully that Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., will come home soon, unharmed and alive.

Every man and woman who has paused outside a bedroom door and listened to the soft breathing of a little child understands how frighteningly unreal an empty crib must be.

Economic conditions and warfare in the streets of Lindbergh aren't half as momentous as the fate of a little boy. If sympathy and interest and a desire to serve and courage in a time such as this, Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh have the satisfaction of knowing that the hearts of a whole nation are suffering their sorrow, hangs with them.
