CHINA APPEARS UNITED AGAINST FOREIGN MENACE

Government and Military Leaders Agree Upon Aid Respite

CHINESE TO POLICE EVACUATED REGIONS

Newest Developments Endanger Shanghai's International Area

SHANGHAI, (UP)—The Japanese civil and military authorities at Shanghai are prepared to negotiate for peace on the terms of the League of Nations resolution of March 4, Manchu Sheng, Chinese minister, notified the Chinese today.

The notification was sent through Sir Miles, British minister. Sheng said that in view of the situation at the time he decided it a matter of urgent necessity to reach at the earliest possible date a definite agreement for complete cessation of hostilities, and then discuss arrangements for withdrawal of the Japanese forces.

SHANGHAI, (UP)—Renewed danger to the international settlement and residents of Shanghai area was seen today in the Chinese announcement that Chinese police would resume their duties in territories from which driven by the Japanese.

The Japanese have refused to allow anyone to enter the area without their consent. The conflict between Chinese and Japanese, especially in China, appeared only.

Peace Hope Diminishes—Meanwhile, foreign diplomats held little hope for peace through the "backchannel" where strong Chinese and Japanese forces were concentrated.

Chinese government and military officials in the city of continued resistance to Japanese demands for withdrawal from the area after C. H. Johnson, American minister, announced appointment of Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek to command the Chinese army.

Mayor Wu Teh-chou of Siping, has notified Japanese authorities that Chinese authorities are prepared to police the Chinese Kwangwan.

WINTER SEIZES MOUNTAIN AREA

Snowfall General Throughout Colorado; Mercury Falls in Montana

DENVER, (UP)—Record break in low temperatures were reported throughout the Rocky Mountain today.

Snow fell in every section of Colorado, varying from light frost in the south to heavy fall throughout the northern and eastern sections that deposited from 12 to 18 inches.

A high wind whipped the snow in eastern Colorado and western Kansas in blizzards. Roads were clogged with drifts.

Temperatures were in the below zero mark at many mountain points. Cheyenne recorded 12 below for the night. Sheridan, Idaho, Billings, Montana, recorded 25 below, the lowest reading in 25 years.

HOOVER REPUTED STILL ADVOCATE OF PROHIBITION

Won't Make Statement but Views Regarded As Unchanged at Present

WOULD NOT MAKE LAW PARTY ISSUE

Republicans Fear Serious Split by Agitation Before Convention

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The most authoritative information available represents President Hoover as holding the dry view, despite a pronounced desire among some Republican leaders to renounce the prohibition issue at present.

Renewed activity over the prohibition question has led to many attempts to elicit from Mr. Hoover some public statement of his attitude on what position the party should take this year. He has declined to make one.

The information—derived from other sources, it is to the effect that he has indicated privately that he intends to support the party should take this year. He has declined to make one.

Further, he is reported to be in those who supported him on prohibitions in 1928 and that to avoid the national opinion of the party would be a desertion of thousands of loyal friends with no other alternative.

His policy is to discourage discussion of prohibition as a party question. Feeling on both sides is so strong that there is fear of a serious split by agitation prior to the convention.

This accounts for the scarcity of statements on the subject from Republican sources, in contrast to the practice of other Democratic candidates, the more prominent ones, the more they have been publicized.

The Republican party is as badly split over prohibition as the Democratic party, the managers believe it is, and it is as far as possible from both sides.

Therefore, many of the modifications and amendments of the party platform, favoring a referendum plank, favor going ahead without consulting the president. They expect that any reasonable plank calling for a referendum of the citizens, will inspire the object.

Boost Held Necessary to Balance Budget and Maintain Credit

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The House Ways and Means committee in a formal report today defended a bill to increase taxes on absolutely necessary to balance the budget and maintain the credit of the United States government.
