Since December, 1931, the cost of living has declined 2.7 per cent according to the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics. During the six months the decrease in amount has been 2.1 per cent. During the two years in which the depression has continued, the cost of employment has dropped nearly 29 per cent and industrial payroll rates more than 43 per cent.



