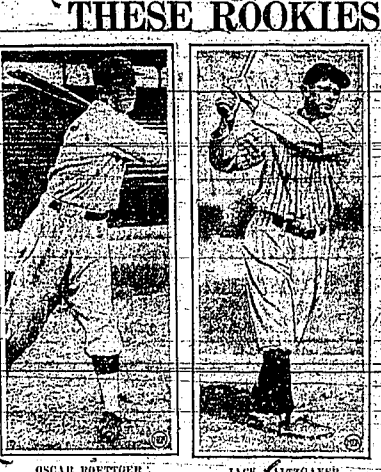

Last year, the Caldwell team journeyed to Twin Falls where the Brunettes registered one of those four defeats against them.

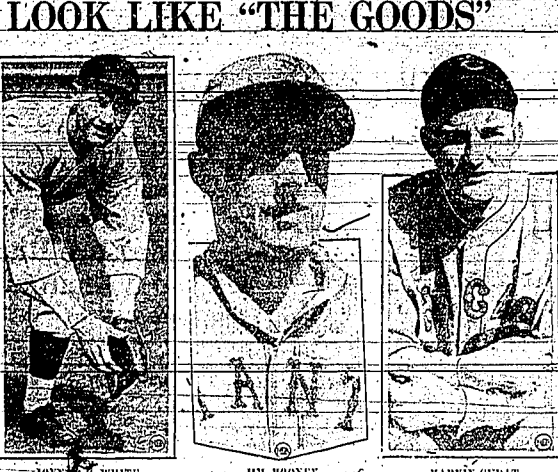

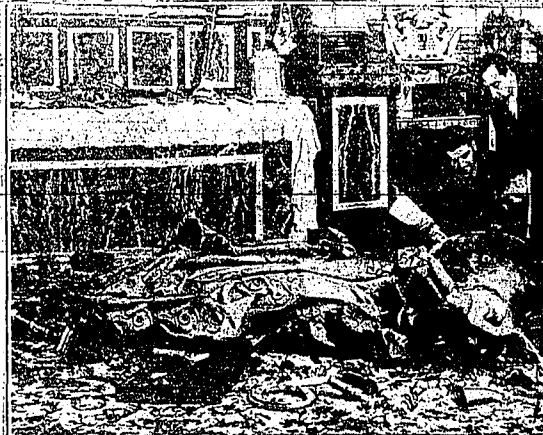

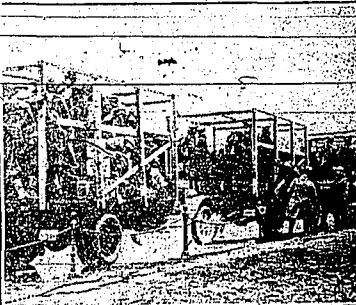

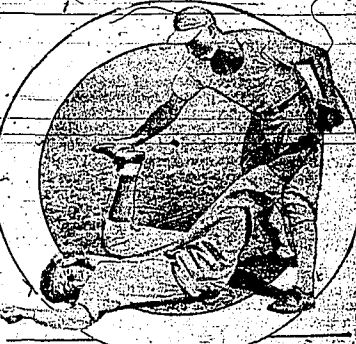

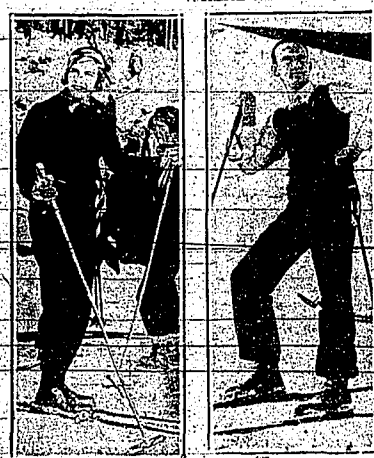

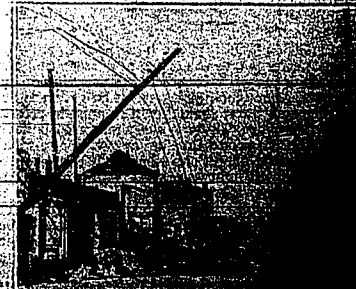
