Babe Held in Preston, Iowa, Is Not Lone Eagle's; Officers Take Other Trails But Without Result Hoped For

HOPEWELL, N. J. (UP) — State police reported today new discouraging and the blasting of what seemed three promising leads to the kidnapers of little Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr. The forenoon bulletin to the press was entirely negative. GOVERNMENT TAX RECEIPTS LARGER THAN ANTICIPATED

Early Figures Show Returns Only Slightly Less Than In 1931

WASHINGTON, (UP) — The treasury today made its first tabulation of March 15 income tax returns and reported an initial collection of \$12,618,766. On the corresponding date last year collections of \$12,900,000 were reported by the treasury.

The tax collections reported in March's treasury statement are distinguished from those of the previous year in that the taxes actually paid on March 15 are \$1,200,000 more than in 1931. It requires some time for the return to be filed and the revenue officers to tabulate the returns.

"More Than Anticipated" The income tax receipts listed for March 15 were larger than expected, being only about \$100,000 less than collections on the corresponding day last year. However, the department expects the first quarter payments to total more than \$175,000,000 last year's \$170,000,000, a gain of \$5,000,000 in the first quarter.

Total income taxes paid this month through March 15 were \$14,070,000, compared with \$13,324,000 for the corresponding period last year.

More Income Shown During the present fiscal year, \$792,827,728 has been paid in 1932, compared with \$780,000,000 in 1931. This represents an increase of \$12,827,728, or 1.6 percent, as compared with \$1,232,555,929 for the corresponding period of the fiscal year 1931.

The bulk of the March 15 income tax payments probably will be reflected in the highway tax collection on Saturday and next Monday.

Experience of the previous years shows that the largest payments usually are reported by the states. Payments on the fourth and fifth days after the payments were made.

Prussian Authorities Raid Hitler Quarters To Halt Mobilization

Revolt Rumors Seethe in Faith of Ordinal of Paul Von Hindenburg

BELLIN, (UP) — Prussian police raided Paul Hitler's headquarters and headquarters today on information alleging that the Nazis planned to mobilize their storm battalions for civil war.

An official Prussian government statement said the raids were intended to frustrate fascist preparations to seize power by violence.

The raids were made through all Prussia by the official Prussian police force. The Nazis had hoped to control that police force by winning control of the Prussian diet in the April 21 election.

The search was ordered by the Prussian ministry of the interior. "Defeat of the Nazi leader, Adolf Hitler, in the presidential election and rumors of an attempted fascist coup," it said, "precluded the raids."

Hitler, Deputy Reich President, was defeated Sunday by President Paul Von Hindenburg in a sensational election, with the Nazis soldier-soldierman planing a revolt, yet not a clear majority.

Gov. Murray Trails New York Executive By 12,700 Votes

OKLAHOMAN STRONGEST IN CITIES' PRECINCTS

Outcome Not Expected To Be Changed by Remaining Rural Returns

(Copyright 1932 by United Press) MINNAPOLIS, N. D., (UP) — A United Press tabulation of votes from 178 North Dakota precincts today gave Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York a commanding majority in the Democratic primary over the Oklahoma opponent, Gov. William H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray.

The victory as reported to the United Press from more than half of the state's 2,192 precincts, was:

Roosevelt, 29,707; Murray, 17,294; Proctor, 1,706.

The first test of the New York executive against the "farm boss" candidacy of Murray, included strong support received even in rural sections of this wheat growing state which had been counted in favor of the Oklahoma governor.

Strong Roosevelt Trend While the majority remained largely from country precincts, the city vote was believed to be possible these votes would contribute to the strong Roosevelt trend evidenced throughout the state.

Greatest Murray strength was shown in cities which by "staying" prior to the primary and its districts where the Nonpartisan league retains vestiges of its influence.

County figures reported ample evidence that Republicans had carried the Democratic primary in 172 precincts. The vote was a record for any presidential primary and the largest Democratic vote since the 1920 election.

The regular Democratic state organization supported Roosevelt and claimed the vote which carried Roosevelt's Progressive appeal. Democrats' observers had believed Murray would win the vote and political interests within this precinct area in this kind of "practical" political ability.

However, N.Y. Out The Independent Republican delegation to the Chicago convention which is expected to support Roosevelt, was apparently elected as was William Stern, D.

SENATE RECEIVES DEPOSITORS' BILL

Long-Deferred Glass Banking Measure Makes Its Appearance

WASHINGTON, (UP) — A \$200,000,000 "rail" proposal for depositors of failed banks reached the Senate floor today as part of the long deferred Glass general banking bill.

The Glass bill would create a federal depositors' corporation as a permanent organization for quick disposition of assets of failed banks which would be part of the Federal Reserve system.

For emergency purposes during the next two years the corporation would be empowered to purchase and liquidate assets of closed non-membership banks.

Members of the Senate committee would be authorized to draw on the treasury for \$200,000,000 to provide such relief. The permanent relief fund would be obtained through subscription by Reserve member banks.

The bill is designated by Senator Glass, Dem. Va., to pass through the Senate in the next few days.

It would impose severe regulations to that effect on the Federal Reserve system and the provisions that considerable banking opposition is expected to develop.

House's Leaders Sponsor Bill to Lower Salaries

Measure for Reduction of Federal Stipends Ready Soon; Graduated Scale Favored By Chairman Byrns

WASHINGTON, (UP) — House leaders have decided to sponsor a general federal salary reduction bill. Chairman Byrns said the measure would be ready for submission to the House the middle of next week.

The extension of the reduction favors graduated scale which would be lighter on smaller salaries but reach 20 per cent on members of Congress (who receive a \$10,000 a year). Others would get a 10 to 15 per cent cut.

The measure was regarded as part of the drive of leaders to get the sales tax through the House. The fact that the decision was reached in the midst of the tax fight supported that intention.

Byrns said he had appointed Rep. John S. Sullivan, Dem., Ill., as chairman of a subcommittee to draft the bill. Sullivan is expected to report to the House as soon as the tax bill is out of the way.

To avert any action, it probably will be offered as an amendment to the legislative appropriations bill providing for salaries and expenses of members of Congress, he said.

"The deficit is growing and the budget has to be balanced," said Byrns. "Byrns must help to make the sacrifice. We had hoped that the deficit could be eliminated, but it looks now like we will have to do that along with other legislation in order to do it."

The decision marks a change from the House's previous position. Leaders who are in control of the House "Up to now they have been content to let legislative appropriations increase salaries."

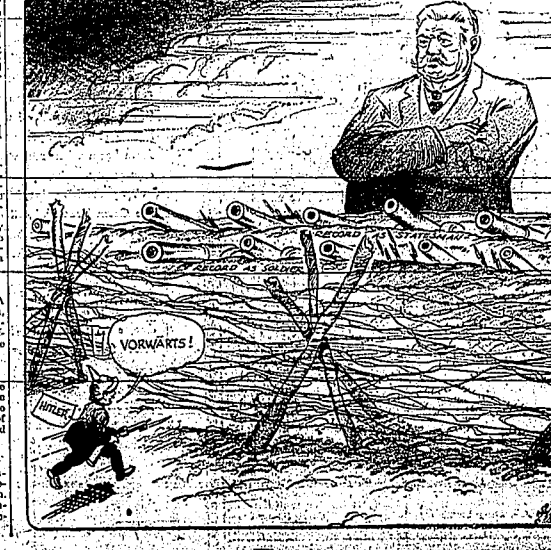

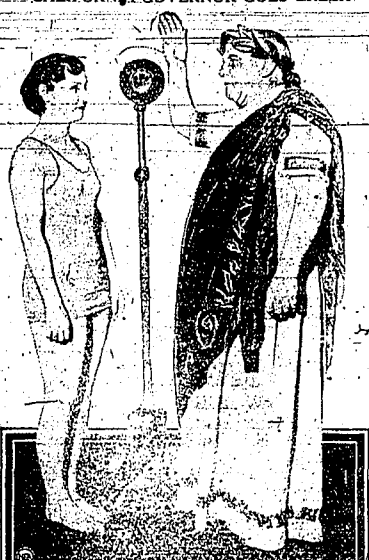

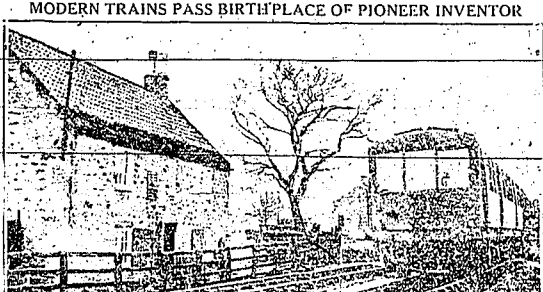

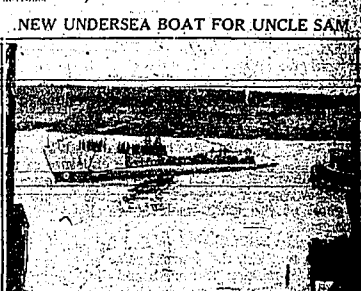

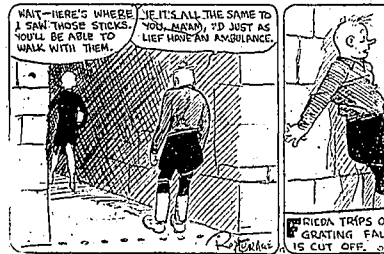

THE MIGHTY HAS FALLEN

IN ITS cheap campaign of vilification against the constituted authorities of the State of Idaho, the Boise Statesman has descended woefully in the public esteem which it once held in this commonwealth.

There is a place for politics and a place for criticism. But when petty politics is placed above patriotism and loyalty, then those who indulge in such practices have earned the condemnation of the responsible.

On its staff that newspaper has employed a gossip, presumably to interpret the "inside" of the politics of the state, which material has come to be for the most part biased, unfair, unscrupulous and on its face an effort to "smeared" those with whom the paper is not in political agreement.

Its editorial columns are given over almost daily to preaching disrespect for law, notably the "Property Relief Act" and to abuse, rather than offering constructive criticism.

As one after another of the policies of the present administration have been vindicated, one wonders to what ends this unwarranted hounding on the part of the paper which used to be a "part of the life in Idaho" can go and continue to merit public acceptance.

The Kilworth tax has been upheld by the courts; the income tax law has been approved by the supreme court; the state game warden has practically called the Statesman a liar for its impertinent interference and insinuating slander; and the grand jury at Lewiston has so far eloquently justified Governor Ross' contention that there was scoundgery extending over a period of years at Lewiston.

But where are the big, broad, fair newspapers willing to give credit where credit is due? Where are the state newspapers which approve exposure of the school-endowment frauds? Where is the leading state newspaper when it comes to placing the people and the good of the state itself above cheap political vapors?

The mighty has fallen. Impelled by small, petty and mean motives, the journal referred to has misconceived its mission and has been blinded by ribald partizanship. A member of its staff has been picked out to take charge of the Republican public bureau, to aid in putting the state government back into the hands of those who debauched it. The party might better have taken over the Statesman in its entirety for it can well qualify as a rabid anti-Ross and anti-everything not Republican.

But Idaho, having experienced the progressive government of a new leader working practically single-handed among hold-over Republican officers who have put stumbling blocks in his path at every turn, will insist that he be given a free hand and opportunity to work out his policies.

Handicapped by back-biting on every hand he has risen head and shoulders above his petty antagonists and doubtlessly shall continue to do so.

That is the reason perhaps the opposition organ has become frantic with rage at his success; why it has resorted to a campaign of vilification rather than to present a decent portrayal of its party's claims for support.

The tactics it indulges in are unequalled for and are unjustified; and they remain a blot on the journalism of Idaho.

A little more generosity, a little more fairness, and a little more bigness on the part of newspapers are warranted, even as such attitudes improve the personal characters of those of us who wish to live as friends and neighbors in this growing, ambitious State of Idaho which we all love and wish to see prosper and succeed regardless of whether its governors are Democrats or Republicans.

Wonder what has happened to the Chinese-Japanese fracas during the two weeks the Lindbergh child has been occupying the major position in the news?

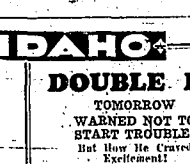
