He is not the only Idaho mayor seeking high political office. Mayor Tom O. Coffin, Pocatello, seeks to represent the second congressional district in Congress and Mayor Eugene Bode seeks the senatorial top.

Reports of Loan Requirements Exaggerated in Hoover's Opinion

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Hoover today said that the personal investigation of the railway situation had shown that the estimates of the need for new roads "of smaller dimensions than had been generally believed."

In a formal statement, the President said it was estimated that the railroads in 1932 would need between \$300,000,000 and \$400,000,000 in loans. He said the railroads' own credit corporation would contribute \$200,000,000 of this, and that most of the bank loans would be continued.

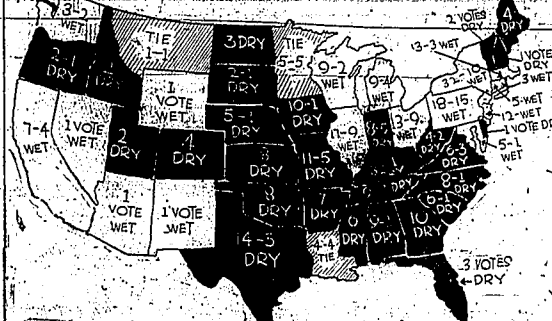

When Congress voted on a proposal to keep the 18th Amendment prohibition amendment out of committee in the first vote-day test of importance since 1917, Representatives lined up as shown in sketch map above. The Beck-Latham resolution, still locked in committee, would amend the 18th amendment to allow state control of liquor. Vote piled up a surprise vote of 167 to bring the proposal before Congress. They were opposed by 227 dry-voting congressmen. The 18th amendment originally was adopted in the House by a vote of 292 for and 128 against.

STILL TRYING A RECENT dispatch from Washington points out that although airplanes are being brought nearer to perfection each year, men are still trying to invent devices that will enable them to strap on wings and fly away under their own power by flapping their arms.

Only last November such a device was patented, although it is not known yet whether its inventor has actually been able to fly with it.

This return to the earliest principles of attempted flight looks odd, in view of the great advances that have been made in aeronautics; but really, it probably represents a form of aviation that would interest the average man, if it could be perfected, infinitely more than any other.

To be able to fly up in the air like a bird, just for the fun of it, without depending on a motor that comes closest to those old, wistful dreams of flying. If such a scheme ever is made practical, it ought to be enormously popular.

WHAT PRICE POLITICIANS? (OREGON JOURNAL)

SEVEN HUNDRED AND SIXTY bank failures in one nine-year period, 9458 in an 11-year period. War taxes in peace-time!

More than four billion dollars of national expenditures coming year, only three quarters of a billion a few years ago. What price politicians?

That is to say, national expenditures the coming year are to be nearly six times what they were only 18 years ago, and of this national expenditure of \$4,112,209,950 more than 70 per cent, or \$2,903,673,727, is for past wars and preparation for war.

And the politicians of America, led by the late Senator Lodge, caused the rejection by America of the only great plan ever proposed to end war! Those politicians for political purposes made a political football of the League of Nations and caused America to remain out of the league membership.

What a glorious thing it would be for America and Americans if people stopped listening to the siren songs of politicians and voted for themselves and their families instead of being directed to vote by political head-men!

In spite of the frightful price the American people are to pay the coming year for war, politicians in congress, politicians in the congressional lobbies, politicians on the radio, politicians acting for and in the interest of munition-makers, arms manufacturers and shipbuilding companies, are urging more and bigger appropriations for armaments.

Haven't people listened long enough and acted long enough on the advice of politicians? There was the famous "full dinner pail." Who's got it now? What bunk it was, and what a lot of people were bunked by it!

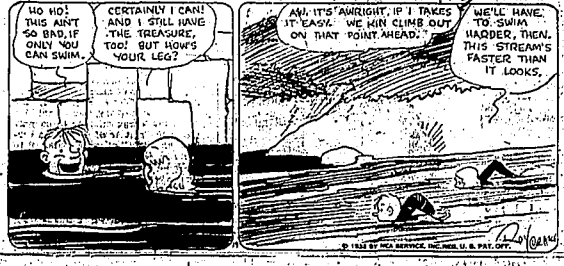
In the same textbook, page 103, is this charming assurance: "This Republican prosperity is no myth! Nor is it confined to a favored few!"

In contrast to this latitudinous bunk of the politicians the records tell a striking story. Here is some of it: Beginning with 1911 and up to 1920, including eight years of Woodrow Wilson, there were 760 bank failures in the United States. In 1931 there were 2298 bank failures. In the last three years 6000 banks failed in the United States and not one in Canada.

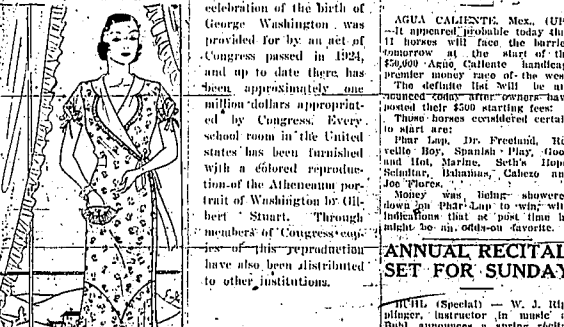
All this happened under the reign of Andrew W. Mellon as secretary of the treasury. There were almost as many bank failures in one month under Mellon as in the entire eight years of Woodrow Wilson. And after refunding nearly four billion dollars of war taxes to mighty corporations and corporatists Mellon left a deficit of nearly \$2,000,000,000 in the national treasury. Among others, Mellon related more than \$131,000,000 to the Steel trust.

And now congress is trying to balance the budget. War taxes are proposed. The people are to be taxed \$4,112,209,950. Twenty years ago they were taxed only about \$750,000,000 a year.
