



# CHICAGO STADIUM WILL BE SCENE OF TITLE RING BOUTS

### Important Fistic Battles Are Scheduled For Windy City Next Month

CHICAGO, (AP) — The Chicago Stadium, world's largest indoor arena, will stage two world's title matches next month according to plans announced today by the Chicago Athletic Union.

Before he departs for New York, Jack Dempsey of Los Angeles will defend his welterweight title against Alvin Karpis, who is expected to arrive in Chicago on April 10th. Karpis has a record of 12 wins and 10 losses.

George Slocum, Buffalo, will defend his light-heavyweight title against Alvin Karpis on April 11th unless a fractured hand keeps him from being able to compete.

The stadium has the closed ceiling of Nichols and Walker, partner boat, and the signed contract of Florida. Lewis has a total record of 10 wins and 10 losses. WITH today's issue this newspaper enters upon its twenty-eighth year. A long time and a period which marks practically the complete career of the town, for as is revealed in the 27-Year-Ago column now running on this page, The Times was here before Twin Falls was incorporated even as a village!

The publisher intends to conduct The Times in the interests of the people who have established themselves here... The Times will represent no special interests, nor cliques, nor factions, but will advocate such measures and work for such conditions as seem to be for the general welfare of all.

Its columns shall at all times be open to anyone for the discussion of any matter of general interest.

Politically The Times will be liberal in its expressions. Not all good ideas find expression in any one party, and no party is free from bad influences. The greatest good to the greatest number, with the ability to put its ideas into effect, is the only standard by which parties should be judged.

It will be the aim to make a good paper, one in which the public will have confidence and respect.

A newspaper in a way is a public enterprise, or at least a public convenience. More than any other enterprise, it deals with the interests of all the people, and is morally obligated to be just and considerate. No calling is more honorable, and few are weighted with greater responsibility.

THAT WET-DRY VOTE

AS might have been expected, the recent House vote on the prohibition modification question has led to all kinds of claims and counter-claims from both sides of the fence. Both wets and dries seem to be able to deduce all kinds of things from an examination of the vote.

The one thing that seems obvious, though, to a dispassionate observer is that the vote proved practically nothing of any real importance.

Or the mass of the people still want prohibition or is there an overwhelming shift to the wet side? Study the House votes all you please and you'll still be in the dark. It is a bit too soon to be making definite claims. There will have to be more elections and more expressions of the popular will before we shall have sufficient light on the subject. The vote in the House, useful in that it forced lots of congressmen to quit straddling, really settled nothing.

RASKOB'S INVESTMENT

NEWS that the Democrats have raised enough money to pay off the \$100,000 they owed to National Chairman John J. Raskob for the 1928 campaign puts emphasis on a rather odd situation.

Raskob is still financing party headquarters at Washington, to the tune of about \$10,000 a month. The party still owes him plenty, and efforts are now being made to square the obligation by the middle of April.

And the above-mentioned oddness comes in when you reflect that while Raskob is paying the party's bills, Franklin D. Roosevelt—and not Raskob's bosom friend, Alfred E. Smith—seems to be corraling most of the votes.

There must be moments in which Raskob asks himself plaintively whether it is really worth while.


