NEW YORK, (AP)—A special title pulled out of New York for Hartford, Conn., early today, carrying home a sad decoration of light fans, heavy-hearted because they had seen Christopher (Max) Battalino, former featherweight champion here, a near record crowd of 18,000, in the scoundrel fight seen here since Petrolle outlanded Jimmy McLachlan some months back. LUBITSCH DEFENDS SEX, GANG MOVIES

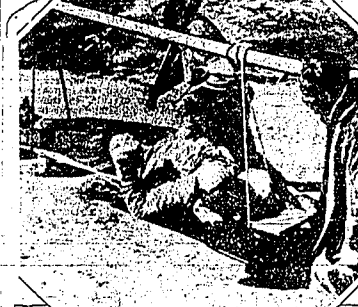

WASHINGTON (AP)—Farmers intend to plant 52.3 per cent more wheat this year than they did last year, the department of agriculture reported Thursday. From when planting started in 1931 for a 24.8 per cent increase in acreage.

Wheat acreage in 1932 is estimated at 102.2 per cent of last year's acreage, the board also reported.

Preceding the report with the explanation that the report on farmers' intentions is based on returns for 47,000 producers, the department estimated the planting intention for other crops as follows:

Wheat, 52.3 per cent; corn, 101.7 per cent; soybeans, 101.7 per cent; sweet potatoes, and yams, 113.2 per cent; dry, white beans, 82.2 per cent; soy beans, grown alone, 97 per cent; tame hay, 104.1 per cent.

THE HISTORY OF TWIN FALLS City and County FROM THE TIMES OF 27 YEARS AGO

IN LINE WITH the editorial discussion presented in these columns last week, in which the attitude of the Idaho Statesman at Boise was commented on, the Lewiston Tribune of Tuesday carries one in similar vein.

Continuing it says it is interested in fair political play in Idaho, particularly when it involves the most important governmental subject which confronts the harassed citizenry of the Gem state—taxation.

In line with this policy it is proper to direct attention to a series of particularly abusive and unfair editorials which have been published by the Idaho Statesman, southern Idaho's leading newspaper, and mimicked by lesser fry in that field.

But the Statesman is not content with one-sided criticism of the income tax law. Because the incumbent favored this act it belittles and flings dirt at the state's highest officer, the governor.

Old Publisher Cobb, we fear, would turn in his grave were he aware of the unworthy devices to which his good newspaper has fallen. He avoided a biting pen, often a bitter one, but never did he permit nose-thumbing, back-biting, disparagement.

THE antics of Fascist leaders in Europe would not mean much on this side of the Atlantic were it not for the fact that there are a good many Americans who are inclined to believe that Fascism does have its uses as an antidote to Bolshevism.

That the Fascists in Italy choked off radicalism at a crucial moment is obvious. The question, however, is whether the cure is not worse than the disease.

A plot to plunge Germany into civil war and seize the government by force was discovered; and the plot was typical of Fascism in all countries. Rejected by the voters at the polls, Fascism would take the offices it wants anyway—for one of the hallmarks of the Fascist is that he is always quite sure that he knows just exactly what ought to be done for his fellow-citizens and is willing to do it for them regardless of their wishes.

All of this, in other words, simply emphasizes again the fact that Fascism is as complete a denial of freedom, democracy and individual rights as Communism is. And it comes from the same conditions that produce Communism.

Each of these divergent philosophies of government is a philosophy of despair. Men do not become Fascists, or Communists, unless they are convinced that things are so very bad that they could not possibly get any worse. Hitler may have lost the election in Germany, but the size of the vote he polled shows that an enormous proportion of Germany's citizens had reached the point at which they were willing to put their destinies in his hands.

Fascism, like Bolshevism, is a sign that a nation is deathly sick. It is as violent, as ruthless and as dictatorial as Bolshevism is; it means revolution just as surely as Bolshevism does; it is just as fatal to the common man's rights.

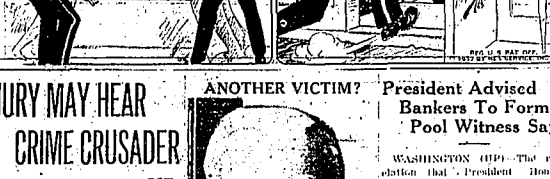

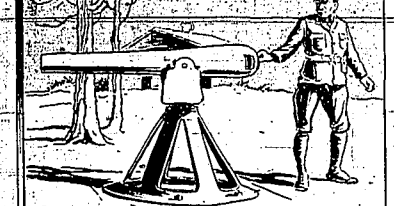
