

## Cattle Thieves From Mexico Raid Ranches Lying Along Border

### Desperados Becoming Bolder Daily Around Columbus, New Mexico; Troop Protection Wanted

COLUMBUS, N. M. (UP)—Armed bands rode the range around this isolated little border town today to protect American cattle herds from the forays of Mexican bandits. Residents of Columbus, remembering similar raids by the wild forces of Pancho Villa, the famous Mexican bandit, whom ranches and buildings were burned, herds raided, and many Americans killed, went armed and sought military protection from bandits who have terrorized this section for a week before.

Mayor Louis Ravol asked Governor Arthur Seligman Santa Fe, requesting troops.

Eight mounted bandits crossed the border Thursday night, rode the J. M. Grimo ranch, near here, looting food and implements, and then drove back to a place where they fired a gun battle with A. Poole, manager of the ranch.

On Wednesday night bandits raided the Siles ranch, nearby, but did not have time to do more than loot. A fire in the heart of Columbus was looted Tuesday night, and the bandits engaged in a brief gun battle with the sheriff's posse as they crossed the border into the safety of Mexico.

At least one American was killed and a man and a woman were taken to a manadero which was held in 1910 unless we are given troop protection. Mayor Ravol asked Governor Seligman.

Bandits are growing bolder daily and we are living in terror and at their mercy."

## JAPAN'S REGIME BREATHING TO FORSAKE LEAGUE

### Nation Will Withdraw If Organization Exerts Undue Pressure

TOKYO, (UP)—Japan decided today to withdraw from the League of Nations, if the League attempted to exert undue pressure for settlement of the Shanghai and Manchurian questions, an official spokesman said.

An official announcement here said that Sir Eric Drummond, League secretary-general, and the Japanese delegate Naoki Takahashi at Geneva, had agreed to prepare a joint declaration of Article 15 of the covenant to the "dispute" between China and Japan in Manchuria. Japan has consented through the settlement made to be made by direct negotiations with China.

In the event the League acts according to Sir Eric's announcement, the spokesman said, Japan will withdraw from the League.

Section four of article 15, providing for a dispute submitted to the council is, "The council is authorized to inquire into any such dispute, either manually or by majority vote, and shall make and announce a report containing a statement of the facts of the dispute and the recommendations of the council, and shall propose a course of action."

## Power Company Removes Tolls At Upper Salmon

The Idaho Power company has removed the 50-cent toll charge heretofore levied for entrance to the lower Salmon river. Salmon Falls, officers of the Southern Idaho Fish & Game association were advised by letter Saturday.

The toll was levied on boats now open to all-year trout fishing. The toll was levied in connection with the construction of a dam at Salmon Falls, from the depletion of the property and cooperation of the state in the dam project.

## Justice Reaches Retirement Age

Justice Sutherland, 67, was appointed to the bench by President Harding in 1919. He is the only justice to have served on the bench for more than 10 years.
