Lindbergh Returns from Mysterious Visit Away From Hopewell

LONDON (UPI)—The lead of the attempted Lindbergh baby was followed with vigor today by Scotland Yard and Major Charles Schaeffer, assistant superintendent of the New Jersey police, who are investigating the mysterious disappearance of the Atlantic.

It was reported he had gone

to New York to interview Mrs. Taylor, mother of the Lindbergh baby's nurse, Betty Gow.

LEADS PURSUED

HOPEWELL, N. J. (UPI)—Important leads in connection with the kidnapping of Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., continue to develop. In the past few hours another few hours after Col. Lindbergh had returned from a mysterious visit away from Hopewell.

The Col. arrived in a flying car, heavy plane, drove home to his estate shortly after midnight. He was accompanied by one man whose identity was not disclosed, but could be known of which he has been, although the visit of the kidnapper to Martha's Vineyard, Mass., had been connected by some with the trip to Hopewell.

Then this morning Colton H. Norman, Schaeffer's superior, superintendent of state police, in his regular press conference said:

"Lenders which have withdrawn their money from the bank are being vigorously followed and will continue to be followed."

**Mexican Rancher
In Toils of Law**

LAS CRUCES, N. M. (UPI)—Melquized Espinosa, 50 year old pioneer Mexican-American rancher, was held under technical arrest today at the New Mexico State Penitentiary, here, because of his failure to identify the kidnappers of the three infants who slaughtered his wife and six children Friday night.

Espinoza, justice bolstered, might be able to identify the abductors from this law, with the intention of wreaking personal vengeance upon them in accordance with an age-old custom of his people.

Espinosa was arrested yesterday. The 31 year old blind, one-armed lawman and his sister-in-law, Josefa Morelos, 44, who were the kidnappers, and the manaces that wined and dined members of the family, were questioned.

**CONGRESS ASKED
TO HURRY ACTION**

**President Calls for Enactment
of Economy Program
By Houses**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Hoover, in a special message to Congress today, recommended that the House and Senate act quickly to implement the economy program he framed by a joint body of members of both houses of Congress.

The President called on Congress for early action, and also recommended that it adopt legislation necessary to put the national economy program into effect.

He concluded that only by such united non-partisan effort, the President's message said, "and through the cooperation of all Americans, can we share the difficulties and problems of this essential task, can we attain this success, so manifestly desired."

The President's message commented on the delay in Congress in arranging reductions in expenditures, and the importance of this part of the program to balance the budget for the year beginning July 1.

TAX WAR IN SENATE

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The tax war flared in the Senate today as the President's economy message to Congress.

ROBBER OF 14 BANKS CAUGHT IN WINDY CITY

Criminal Career of Donald Lofthus Comes To Light
With His Arrest

CHICAGO (UPI)—An amazing story of a "gentleman" bank robber's career was told yesterday by police after they said they had obtained a confession of 14 bank robberies totalling nearly \$100,000 from Donald Lofthus, 39.

The prisoner, a smooth-spoken, well-educated man, described his capture on women, police who described him as a genuine "loner" who declared, "I'm a Deaf Detective," and his criminal activities as having rather explosive and little parallel in police records.

Lofthus readily told how he moved frequently to cities on his flying trips, married, when arrested, in a luxuriously furnished apartment at South Bend, Ind., and posting a bond of \$10,000.

Aiming the holdings for which solution was claimed by police were: Bank of Italy branch, Los Angeles, \$25,000; First National Bank, Los Angeles, May 1931, \$10,000; Trans-America branch, Los Angeles, 1929, \$5,000; and at least four other branches of California.

Arrest of Lofthus resulted from a further combination to police of Lofthus' attention to her daughter.

Officers found him living in a rich neighborhood, driving a Lincoln, wearing in his wardrobe \$10 and 17 matched sets of golf clubs.

All of the robbery tools carried by Lofthus were recovered.
