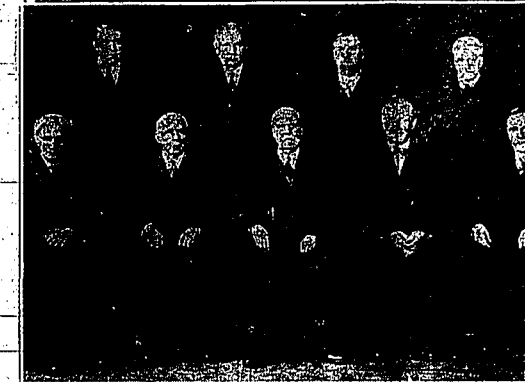

Pacific Coast League Season Opens With Wide Variety of Scores

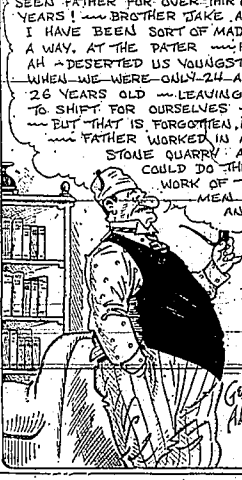

PHAR LAP, NOTED RACEHORSE, DIES OF INDIGESTION

Wonder Gelding From Australia, Succumbs At The Ferry Stables

FERRY STABLES, MEMO PARK, Calif. (UP)—Phar Lap, the mighty "Wonder-Horse" from Australia and one of the most magnificent thoroughbreds of all time, lay dead today in the rambling frame stable of Ed Perry's stock farm.

Rescued from lack of sleep and from crying the little group of horsemen who had pulled the blanket-covered body in flickering lantern light all night long, was still stunned by the loss of their "Dobby."

A sudden attack of acute indigestion, possibly due to the slight aerial gallop which crossed the Pacific ocean to win the \$50,000 Aga Khan's Stakes, had curtailed the admiration of the American sporting public.

David J. Davis, co-owner of the track and ranch, arrived today by airplane from Los Angeles. He entered the stall, lifted the blanket and sat down on the floor, murmured, "poor Dobby."

He dropped the blanket over the horse and sat down on the floor for him and his Australian partner, and stumbled outside to his wife, Donna Stuppert.

Davis was still too stupefied by his loss to make any decision as to the funeral. The stables manager suggested that it be mounted and be placed on display at one of the Los Angeles hotels. It was valued at \$50,000.

"Dobby," as he was called affectionately by the small retinue of Australian horsemen, was \$50,000 when he was not injured.

The financial loss incurred nothing," Davis explained. "We never regarded him in the light of dollars and cents. He was a prize among horses, with almost human intelligence. We worshipped him from the sporting angle and loved him for his own affectionate ways."

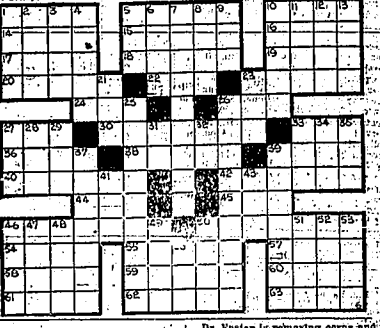

A NEW IDEA ON CONGRESS

15 YEARS AGO

WHEN war was declared 15 years ago by the United States against the Imperial German government, the nation assumed the obligation with seriousness and grim determination as became the situation. But few there were with the vision to see 15 years into the future and contemplate the problems which that declaration one day would create.

On April 6, 1917, the anxiety was limited to the physical welfare of combatants; it was not then thought of that this generation throughout the world in 1932 would still be enduring the hardships of war, of war debts, of reparations and moratoriums.

The gaiety of marching armies then blanketed visions of hunger marchers in 1931 and 1932.

The "war to end war" was fought with a spirit of confidence that begot patriotism rivaling anything ever experienced by America, and it was believed that the League of Nations would be the stepping stone to world peace, a condition which ironically enough has not existed at any considerable period of time since the Armistice.

Who knows what the situation shall be 15 years from today? It is not to be even hoped that the burdens of the World war shall then have been eliminated, only lessened. But just as the present attitude of the American people is greatly changed toward war it is to be hoped that the oncoming years will see a furtherance of this spirit.

Concluding Dance Of Series Given

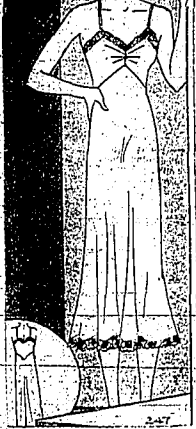

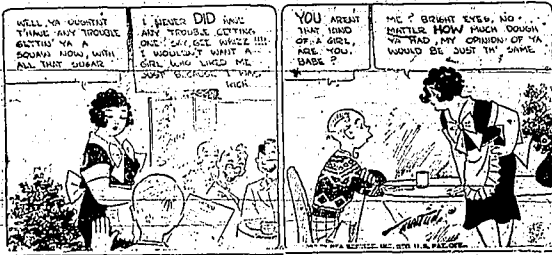
