Rock Creek Closed All Year But Smoke Is Open Public Advised

The present cold spell—just today by Grover C. Davis, deputy director, game warden in Inyo county, the public at large, that Rock Creek is a closed stream this year around and that fishing therein is a public offense, punishable by heavy fines.

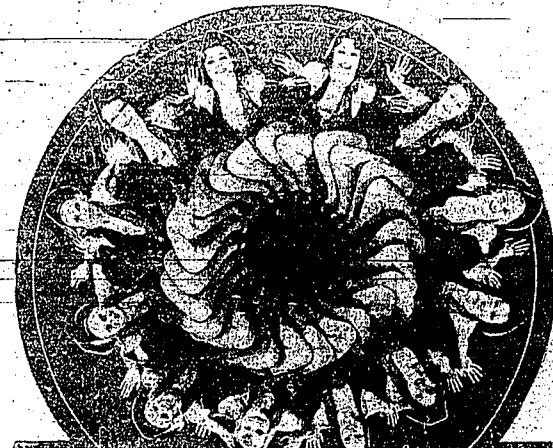

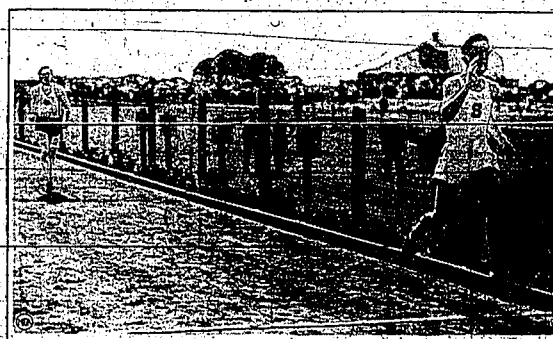

THE AUTO BAROMETER

To accomplish this he listed as the first three out of ten or twelve basic requirements, the following three:

- (1) Restoration of farmers' buying power.
(2) Relief for small banks and home owners.
(3) Reconstructed tariff policy.

He pleaded for consideration for "the little fellow" instead of the vested interests and eloquently extolled the rights and consideration due the "forgotten man at the bottom of the economic pyramid" as they have not been described before in this campaign.

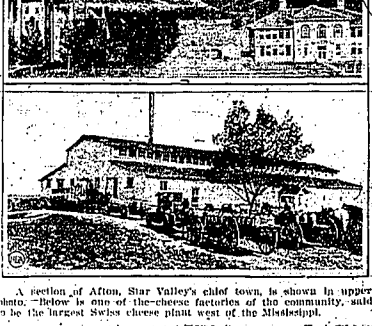
