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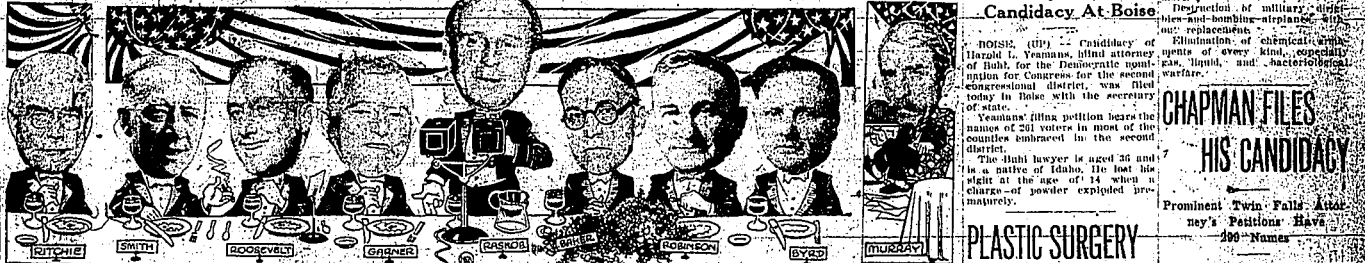
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**HOW DEMOCRATIC 'HOPES' VIEW CAMPAIGN ISSUES**

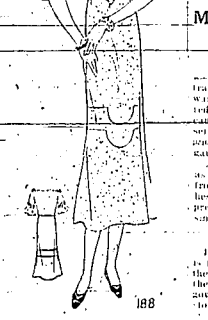
BUSINESS leaders half a century ago apparently arranged those of today in imagination and ingenuity when it came to thinking up remedies for a depression. 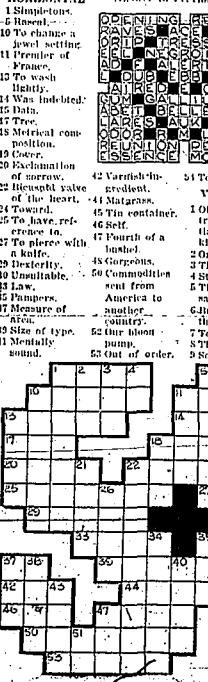

THE BONUS BILL

SENTIMENT for and against the payment of the remaining portion of the bonus (adjusted compensation) is rapidly crystallizing as the time approaches for its consideration by Congress. There are some things which should be said in regard to the proposition. One is that no person should permit himself to be unduly swayed in his sentiments toward or against the matter by his present personal situation. By that is meant that if a veteran is wealthy he should not thereby take an attitude against the bonus payment because of his personal security; or if he is temporarily handicapped financially, he also should not for that reason alone insist on full payment of the bonus.

In either instance, he should consider first the nation itself and the welfare of all his fellows. Then only will he be able to reach an unbiased and intelligent decision, and his calm judgment will dictate whether he should advocate either the payment or the non-payment of the bonus at this time.

The question is an important one. On one hand it is contended that the government can not now attempt to shoulder this new financial responsibility. On the other hand it is argued that if Uncle Sam has adequate funds with which to assist the big banks, the railroads and other corporate enterprises, why should he ignore his other obligations; furthermore, it is argued that although Mellon claimed the authorization of payment of the first half of the bonus would be a catastrophe, in fact no apparent serious results ensued.

At this stage of the controversy one will hear much concerning the attitude of the American Legion and other service men's organizations toward the bonus payment. It will be pointed out that the Legion in national convention last autumn promised the President of the United States not to upset the financial security of the nation by pressing the bonus demands. This argument is answered with the assertion that conditions are vastly different now than they were then. Against the declaration that the loosening of over two billion dollars in cash on the country at this time would admittedly relieve much distress and stimulate business, it is contended that the appropriation of this huge fund would imperil the security of the nation's financial structure and over-tax an already burdened budget. However, counter plans for caring for this huge sum are being urged; plans which their sponsors assert would satisfactorily avoid the taking of the funds from the treasury itself.

Many ex-service men who heretofore have been opposed to the bonus-payment are now for it. New converts are being made every day, both among their numbers and among the members of Congress, where a strong lobby is being persistently waged for the proposition, the leadership of which was initiated and is being assumed by that great body of service men expanded into the Veterans of Foreign Wars organization.

Certainly the steadfast patriotism of bonus-payment advocates cannot be impugned—forces beyond their control have created economic conditions which impels them to urge the measure on sincere and constructive economic principles. Under normal conditions few veterans would urge cash payment. It was necessity which prompted the payment of the first half before any part of the obligation was due; during "good" times no serious thought was given the matter. Now no one will now deny at least the desirability of the veterans having the money.

But the question is whether or not the government can stand the financial strain. If, as proponents of the bill claim, the end can be accomplished without undue difficulty, then that point would cease to be an issue, and there remains only the problem of the nation's responsibility in the matter; the problem of whether the government will wait until 1945, the date of the maturity of the debts, before discharging its admitted financial obligation to those whose services were rendered many years ago; at all times taking into consideration their present manifest financial stringency, just as the government has taken into consideration similar conditions as they apply to railroads, banks and agriculture.

No one certainly, should urge the bill's passage if the financial security of the Republic will be imperiled thereby. But until this is proved the bonus advocates will not be appraised by mere predictions, such as Mellon's last time, that the act would wreck the U. S. treasury. They are out to win their fight or to know the reasons why.

The burden of proof then, would appear to rest upon those who oppose the measure. If it can be shown it is a dangerous scheme, then no band of men will more loyally sacrifice the hopes now within their breasts, than those who in the past laid their lives on the altar of the nation's freedom.

A hard-working relief worker at Buhl, who has been valiantly assisting all winter in providing fuel for destitute families, declares with manifest knowledge of what he is talking about: "If Hoover is reelected there will not be a tree left in Buhl!"
