BANKING LEADERS ECHO OPTIMISTIC VIEWS OF HOOVER

Recent Setback Held Due To Exaggerated and Unwarranted Rumors

NATION'S AUTHORITIES REVIVE BUSINESS HOPE

Smallest Number of Bank Failures Since 1928 Occurs in Week

NEW YORK (UPI)— Determined efforts of governmental and banking authorities to set the country on the road to recovery have received hopes in business and financial circles.

Wielding its strongest weapon—exaggerated purchase of government securities—the Federal Reserve board has embarked on the largest campaign of its character since the depression to stabilize the economy. It is designed to move into business to bolster prices and promote trade.

Bonds Bought

Purchases of \$400,000,000 in government securities last week, this week, setting a corresponding amount of currency into business, stopped their downward trend and helped to bring prices and contributed to a sweeping recovery in grain prices.

Business and banking leaders agree with the optimistic views expressed by President Roosevelt.

They also, particularly that the business setback recently was ended—chiefly on exaggerated and unfounded rumors, are heartened by the passage of the soil conservation bill.

Although general business activity showed little change this week, many leaders were hopeful.

The new legislation, the first virus completed by the "American Banker," shored bank failures this week, numbering only 6, or the lowest number in 10 years. Failures ran into the hundreds in the early weeks of the year. So far April has seen only 25 closings, nominal, so far as March, 125, in February and 261 in January.

Rumors Disipated

The difficulties of the small holding companies have been dispelled, and, along with some of the larger concerns, they are again signs of stability in the oil industry. They have added millions of dollars to purchasing power.

Business conditions have improved, and there is a point where a moderate increase in activity would result immediately in reducing warhorses.

DENTISTS' CONVENTION

TWIN FALLS is glad to be host city for the annual convention of the Idaho State Dental Association.

This city has had the privilege in the past of entertaining all sorts of conventions, but it is seldom that it has been the convention city of a professional group.

Just as all such gatherings contribute greatly to the advancement of those who participate, it is commendable that the dental profession of Idaho is so alert and aggressive as to have an active association for the mutual betterment of its members.

As the new advances are made within the profession, it is through such conventions that the knowledge is disseminated for the benefit of the public. The bringing of competent lecturers and dental surgeons from the outside to the state for the purpose of imparting this knowledge, is an evidence on the part of the dental profession of its willingness to keep on learning and growing and advancing and improving.

Modern dentistry, in truth, is a far cry from the tooth-doctoring of a quarter-of-a-century ago. Just such professional meetings as that held here this week have played their part in this advancement.

Twin Falls welcomes the members of this important and profession to the city and trusts there stay here shall not only have been pleasant, but profitable and valuable in their future practice of dentistry.

THE LINDBERGH CASE AND JOURNALISM

COL. CHARLES A. LINDBERGH and his wife are on record expressing their great appreciation to those members of the press, who in many instances have given us their cooperation, often to their own disadvantage."

This constituted their answer to a growing flood of private criticism in some portions of the public concerning lengthy publication of stories on the kidnapping and its attendant searches.

The Lindberghs, torn by weeks of uncertainty and anxiety, have let it be known that they felt publicity, particularly in the early stages of the case, had been helpful, and in only a few instances have they asked the press to withhold details. Close friends of the couple have said that Col. Lindbergh now felt that probably publication of the serial numbers of his ransom bills had been helpful. And this was in the face of his original temporary request—honored by the press—that news of the serial numbers be suppressed.

These developments coincided with a national poll among many prominent editors, taken by the United Press, to show how the press felt toward suggestions that the story should be suppressed or curtailed.

Replies, which poured into headquarters of the United Press in New York showed editors keenly interested in the question, fully aware of their responsibilities in the situation and extremely sympathetic toward the major aim of the present investigation—early safe restoration of the kidnapped child to its parents.

Some maintained that publicity is essential, since secrecy and suppression would only place a premium on further kidnappings, encouraging gangsters to feel that they could operate unhampered by the pitiless glare of publicity.

Others held that it was time to eliminate from the stories all speculation; and to follow Lindbergh requests at any time as to specific cooperation.

The Colonel himself added to his note of appreciation the observation:

"It is still of utmost importance for us and our representatives to move about without being questioned or followed and we are again requesting the complete cooperation of all members of the press to this end."

An example of the kind of cooperation which the press has been able to render was well illustrated last Saturday, when afternoon papers were notified through the United Press that the banks of the country were to be advised of the serial numbers of the bills given as ransoms, which at once disclosed for the first time without question that the Lindbergh baby not only had not been returned, as was intimated in speculations on the subject, but that the money had been paid over and further that several days had already elapsed since, clearly revealing a "double-crossing."

That was news which any newspaper would like to print, but there was appended the specific instruction the information was not for publication and must be guarded at the specific request of Colonel Lindbergh—an obligation which the press, with customary honor, willingly observed, only to see the exigencies of the situation change during the day to permit rivals to release the story the next morning.


But as has been said in these columns, the newspapers of the country, anxious as they are to carry in their columns the latest development in the complex situation and to have the satisfaction and pleasure of heralding the news of the restoration of the child, would rather forego the advantages of a "scoop" than to prematurely reveal information which might hurt rather than help in the solution of this great crime.

Enough has happened in this case already to fill many books. When the affair is all over, as certainly it must be soon unless it is to go down as a complete mystery, the American public will be amazed and thrilled at the examples of cooperation of sacrifice and of unselfish labor which have gone into the case by agencies which now do not share the spotlight, and by methods concerning which little is publicly known.


