

The commissioners expect to save \$14,825,000, while the actual expenditures will be less than that.

Until departing figures are available, the commissioners will determine what extent salaries will be reduced, it is explained by council members.

### Financials—In Summary

During the evening, a proposed spending plan was developed from a report on Rainey State School, and, following the selection of the spending plan, the commissioners voted to increase the amount of the school's budget by 10 per cent.

**THE GIBSON PLAN**

THE American proposal for armament reduction, broached the other day at Geneva by Ambassador Hugh Gibson, at least has the merit of tackling the vexing problem of security from an entirely new angle.

Since the World War, practically all attempts to reduce land armaments have come to nothing because certain nations, especially France, have insisted that they must be safe from aggression by possible enemies before they can disarm.

The American proposal, aimed to get around this objection, is simply that the most powerful offensive weapons available be legislated out of existence. If the defense is given an overwhelming preponderance over the offense, it is argued, all nations will be safe from aggression because no one will care to wage a war on the offensive.

Accordingly, it is suggested that heavy mobile guns, tanks and poison gas be abolished.

Back of all of this, of course, there is one simple factor; the tremendous increase in the fire power of infantry made possible in the last generation by the development of quick-firing small caliber arms.

At the time of the American Revolution, an infantryman was doing well to get off one shot every minute and a half. By the time of the Civil War things were a little better, but two shots a minute still constituted extraordinarily rapid shooting.

Then came the breech-loading, repeating rifle. The infantryman now could fire half a dozen shots a minute without undue haste. On the heels of this came the machine gun, capable of spitting out bullets at a rate better than one a second—and the defense became almost infinitely superior to the offense.

To meet this there came a great development in artillery. If the defending infantry could not be routed by the bayonet, it could be blown out of existence by a heavy barrage, or suffocated in a flood of gas shells. Hand in hand came the tank, to rout out and destroy machine gun nests. The old equilibrium of war was at least partially restored.

Now the American proposal urges that the machine gun and automatic rifle be made supreme again. Whether it is accepted or not, it marks an interesting development in the history of warfare.

**A WISE APPROPRIATION**

THE Senate shortly will be called upon to decide whether it is to recreate, for the campaign of 1932, a senatorial campaign fund investigating committee similar to the Nye committee that functioned so energetically a couple of years ago.

If the Senate is well advised it will lose little time in voting to establish such a committee on precisely the same basis as that on which the Nye committee operated.

The cost would not be great. Probably \$125,000 would more than defray all of the expenses. And the work done by such a committee is extremely valuable to the nation. The Nye committee more than justified its existence; there is no reason to suppose that a similar committee this year would be any less useful.

**BACK OF THE BONUS**

THERE is one angle to the present widespread demand for a bonus to World War veterans that is usually overlooked when the subject is discussed. That is the feeling so many citizens have that such a bonus would be no less than fair in view of the way in which big business and high finance can and do get extensive financial assistance from the federal treasury.

That feeling may be mistaken; even if correct, it may not in the least justify the veterans' demands. That is beside the point. It is important that the feeling be recognized and understood.

The war veteran is not, certainly, any more selfish than any other citizen; and in calling for a \$2,000,000 bonus he does not feel that he is asking for any special privilege. Instead he points to the vast sums that have been made available to help finance and industry, and asks if only the rich and powerful can get at Uncle Sam's purse.

Until opponents of the bonus recognize the depth and strength of that feeling, their arguments won't make much impression on the veterans.
