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**THE CAMPAIGN**

MORE than fifty Twin Falls county men and women (53 to be exact) have filed their candidacies for political preferment at the hands of the voters in the county, congressional district and state, thus revealing their laudable ambitions to serve their constituencies should they be nominated and elected.

The entrance of these persons into the public arena, contrary to legend, does not at once make them subject to personal abuse and critical scrutiny, with the curious and suspicious examining either their motives, first of all they are to be congratulated for the interest which has displayed in public affairs.

Idaho's primary law makes it the privilege of any one qualified legally and politically to enter his name as a candidate for the public office of his choice. By so doing his candidacy deserves generous consideration on the part of the voting public and further, what is more important, decency and propriety dictate that all candidates be treated with the honor and dignity which the respective offices deserve.

It is a tribute to the citizenship of this and adjoining counties that so many persons at this time should be willing to offer their services to the public; a tribute inasmuch as the role of the public office-holder in perilous times is no sinecure.

Whether we are accurate in our contentions or not, we as a people have more and more come to the point of believing that in the proper administration of our government rests to a large extent our prosperity or our success; we have brought ourselves to believe that the type of legislators and executives and judiciary in office, very largely governs our condition, as regards tariff, financial policies, taxation, law enforcement, and the general administration of special services, of justice, of employment, of national prosperity.

If this be true then it behoves every one of us to give serious attention to the calibre, the ability, the experience, and the capability of those whom we are presently to choose as our candidates, as well as to consider well the respective parties themselves, as regards policies, platforms, accomplishments and reputations.

Contrary to current belief, just because a person is a candidate, does not at once make him a "politician" from the standpoint of the currently accepted meaning of that word. There are "politicians" and then there are those interested, experienced and qualified in the problems of the administration of political science. The enlightened view is that these latter are our benefactors. The voting public should be quick to spot these, to see to it that their talents and experience are made use of, and that they are put in public places where they can use their abilities and bring added respect and competence to the positions they occupy.

The practice which makes candidates the butt of disarming abuse and criticism has resulted in many otherwise capable persons refusing to permit their names to be mercilessly bandied about as happens so frequently in political campaigns. Fortunately this practice appears to be coming more and more into disrepute.

At least it will be greatly to the credit of all concerned, on the eve of the present campaign, there shall be resolutions on the part of the individual voter and worker as well as the candidates themselves, to conduct honorable and dignified efforts, however strenuous to win their causes. Then when the results are determined, the defeats and victories can be accepted in good grace, without the mortification which results from having practiced unscrupulousness and devoid of the sting of unfairness sometimes attached to an unwarranted defeat.

May we ever be guided by honesty of purpose, justness to all, and a broad spirit of fair play in this as well as in all other elections, in the knowledge that only such a course merits public approval and the kind of honorable success for which we all should strive.






## WEST VIRGINIA'S PRIMARY MAY 10

**Hoover and Roosevelt Appear  
Certain of Preference  
Next Month**

**CHARLESSTON, W. Va.** (UPI)—President Hoover and Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, are virtually certain to gain national convention strength for the Republican and Democratic leadership as a result of this state's primary election, May 10.

A temporary majority of Republicans, who have filed for delegates, are the sole holders of true importance by the fact that convention delegates are not bound by the popular vote.

Three Democratic and one Republican have filed in the state's preferential presidential primaries, but the results of these contests are far from clear-cut.

Roosevelt, regarded as firmly entrenched in favor of the Democratic presidential nomination,

has no real opposition.

Two Democratic candidates are Governor Roosevelt; Governor William H. Murray; Murray of Oklahoma, and J. J. Coughlin of Milwaukee. The Republican candidate is Joseph J. France of Maryland.

There are no vacancies for United States Senators, but the four candidates were reelected as in good position in their races for re-nomination. Opponents have filed in the districts of Lynn S. Hall, John R. Clegg, Charles E. and Hugh McShane, Republican, blue field.

Candidates for state office have been selected by a majority of the government, almost without exception.

Governor Frank B. Conley is presented Frank, seeking re-election for his second term, while the chief executive to one term, on the Republican ticket, is the gubernatorial candidate, Dr. W. V. Wilkins, who has been a member of the legislature.


2 cups sifted flour	2 egg yolks, well beaten
2 teaspoons Calumet Baking Powder	2 tablespoons melted butter
1/2 teaspoon salt	1 tablespoon sugar
1 tablespoon baking powder	2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
1/2 cup milk	

All measurements are level.


