BUS REGULATION

THE Interstate Commerce Commission seems to be moving wisely in recommending gradual formation of a federal code to govern interstate transportation by motor bus and truck.

As the commission remarks, this is a new field, and it is important that the government, in entering it, move slowly and feel its way from point to point. It is not quite plain, yet just where the public interest chiefly lies in this matter, and precipitate action must be avoided.

But it is clear that some sort of regulation is needed. Interstate commerce is interstate commerce, whether it moves by bus or by train; if one variety needs governmental supervision, it seems obvious that the other variety needs it also.

NUISANCE TAXES

IT IS TO BE hoped that Congress avoids the placing of nuisance taxes on telegrams, telephone bills and bank checks.

To do so would place a handicap on a current form of business vehicle out of all proportion to the ability of business to bear the burden.

Apparently these items have been suggested for taxation only because of their convenient accessibility and because of the ease with which the assessment could be collected through banks, and the utility corporations.

Better far, if it is necessary to assess business in a heavier amount than at present to levy a flat charge against each firm—it would be easier and would avoid the nuisance angle. But of course no firm is so heavy a taxer.

The place to look for increased revenue is from property and sources not already taxed, or sufficiently taxed—not from business which now is bearing a heavy economic load.

A BUILDER PASSES

LINCOLN COUNTY, too, will may give recognition to the service and life of Paul S. Bickel, eminent Idaho irrigation engineer, whose body was laid to rest at Twin Falls last week. This man was the chief engineer of the Twin Falls project at the time of its building. He was a quiet man who did a vast work and sought little of the world's limelight.

Eight years ago Mr. Bickel did his final important bit of irrigation development work when he located the route of the present Milner-Shoshone canal. There had been a general confusion as to probable locations of a canal. The highest point that it seemed possible to top the Little Wood river was some ten miles west of Shoshone. An 80-mile canal from the Snake to Little Wood appeared the shortest—that was likely. Paul S. A. Bickel was put in the field, with men under him who also were versed in the topography of the north side Snake river country. Under his guidance they located substantially the present course of the canal which is bringing such great benefit to this country today.

This piece of service, too, was done quietly—with no indication but that it was all in the course of an engineer's-day-of-work.

THE FORGOTTEN MAN

THAT "nobody is starving" in this land of plenty was declared by Senator Bingham, standard senator from New England. He said that some state governors had so informed him.

In Philadelphia a little girl fainted in a schoolroom. When she was revived she said, "I am not sick; I'm only hungry." When the teacher told her to go home and eat something, she answered, "How can I? It's not my turn to eat today."

The trouble with the Binghams is that they don't know about the folks down on the lower level. And in their prejudices, and sometimes in their service to special interests, they don't try to find out. It wasn't the little Philadelphia girl's "turn to eat today," she said. Was it every second day or every third day that her turn came to eat?

In New York, three elderly men were taken to the hospital in one day—all victims of starvation. Senator Bingham said "nobody is starving" in this land of plenty.

In Washington an unidentified man walked into a restaurant, scribbled a note to the manager saying,


"Eastman's work was done; I have no work, which is worse," and swallowed poison.

When former Gov. Al Smith attacked Gov. Roosevelt because Roosevelt remembered "the forgotten man" in a speech, he, like Senator Bingham, apparently claims that "nobody is hungry" in this land of plenty. When Smith threatened to take off his coat and vest to fight any candidate who pleads the cause of the poor and asks help for the hungry and social justice for the masses, he overlooked the little girl who said, "How can I eat? It's not my turn to eat today."
