JUDGE ORDERS H. F. FOX ACQUITTED OF FRAUD ACCUSATION

Motion To Liberate Lewiston Bookkeeper Accepted by North Idaho Court

DEFENSE RESTS ITS CASE THIS MORNING

State Offers No Rebuttal And Trial Approaches Conclusion

LEWISTON (UPI) — Judge Miles S. Johnson today granted the defense motion for an instructed verdict of "not guilty" in the trial of H. F. Fox, Salt Lake City, co-defendant with Henry Guzman of Boise in the sensational trial for fraud "the condemned man" which was adjourned for which payment was allegedly accepted without delivery of goods.

The defense caused a site of argument before the court, as the state's chief witness, was called to the stand to identify two letters he had written to Guzman, the defendant, in which the state had agreed to which payment was allegedly accepted without delivery of goods.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — Representatives of the United States captured the anti-insurrectionary band near the Honduras border today and killed 100 revolutionaries, most of whom were identified as being affiliated with Augustino Sandino.

Correspondence left by the insurrectionists when they retreated revealed Sandino took part in the fight.

Marine Sergeants John Thomas of Philadelphia, John Burns of New York, N. C., and Roy Vogel of St. Louis, Mo., were among those who participated in the anti-Sandino assault.

it again; and the rioting grew out of this.

The frenzied attempts to find the thing once more





Julie Peterkin has continued her engrossing study of American Negro life in the south in her new novel, "Bright Skin" (Holt-Merrill). The same insight, the same colorful background are present in "Bright Skin," as they were in her Pulitzer prize-winning "Starlet Sister Mary." But "Bright Skin" is quite different in the color of her characters. Something deeper -- an intuitive mystery and interpretation -- is lacking. The writing is here as good as in her earlier books. The scenes and characters are picturesque, but each story is told in the impression surviving that Mrs. Peterkin had from the masses of her own, a telling portrayal of cause and conditions. A minor point detracts from the novel. Someone, in editing the book, has interjected a series of little footnotes. These explain that "kwine" means "going" and that "hook" means "book."





UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow. Students at the University of Idaho have had their allowances reduced because as the depression is making their dollars go surprisingly fast. More than 1,000 students are getting checks from home with part-time employment and they are not "high-brow" about what jobs they will accept. A large number of students report that they earn more than what is commonly considered the average.

The sacrifices which students are making are particularly evident to stay in college, even if means forego many of the pleasures dear to the collegiate heart has not gone unrewarded. The university has received \$1,000,000, \$7,000 raised by Moscow business men, faculty members and the board of regents, in assisting depression students. In addition, more than 100 have been helped from this fund, which is in addition to several others provided by various organizations for the assistance of Idaho students.

They now live in comfortable quarters, and parents and sororities have reduced social functions and the ones held have been of the modest and inexpensive type.

While no salary has been made available to the university office staff that fully 75 per cent of the present university students are contributing all or a part of their year's expenses.


