## Gusman Draws Prison Sentence, \$5,000 Fine

## Tension Grips City of Honolulu After Honor Slaying Trial Closes

**Authorities Fear for Safety of Jurors Who Convicted Americans; Darrow Intends To Exhaust Every Resource**

HONOLULU, T. H. (UPI) — An undecided current of tension spread through the city today, bringing out emergency police reserves, while four Americans convicted of manslaughter for the honor slaying of a half-breed boy fought to escape sentence in Oahu prison.

Growing feelings against the racially mixed jurors who voted "not guilty" in the trial of Alvin Karpis and Fred Hunter for their safeties. Police guards were turned out; four islanders awaiting second trial on charges of attacking Thelma Forrester Mason, wife of an American, were held under guard.

Deserted streets that usually swarm with sailors on weekend leave gave Honolulu an outward appearance of calm, although that swept the city last January and was climaxized with Joe Kahahawai's death. He was one of Mrs. Mason's asserted attackers.

Charles Darrow, famed criminal lawyer who emerged from courtroom with the case won at Pearl Harbor Navy base, contended on appeal that the Leavenworth, Kan., sentence for alleged "knowing tax evasion" in the Supreme Court would not review.

WASHINGTON, (UPI) — Al Capone today lost his final chance to overturn his conviction by the Leavenworth, Kan., penitentiary for alleged income tax evasion.

The Supreme Court announced, in a short order, that it would not review.

The court's action means that Capone must go back to the circuit court, where he has been dredged since his sentence several months ago to the Leavenworth penitentiary.

A minute officially announcing the decision of the court which will start Capone immediately on his release from the Circuit Court of Appeals here.

The skimmer of the Marcus, Capt. F. H. Liedemann, said he was prepared to start out again immediately. Weather here, while his ship was docked, was favorable.

Meanwhile authorities here contend to hold "dead man" for trial, a charge which would have been filed if he had been sent to the federal court where he was sentenced.

The appeal, filed by several of the extensive indictment, was based on faulty technical grounds.

Capone was sentenced after a trial in Chicago by James H. Wilkinson in Chicago.

It was one of many efforts to get a charge, which would hold against the reporter sponsored by his prosecutor, U. S. District Attorney John Wilkerson, recently recommended Wilkerson's appointment to the Circuit Court of Appeals.

Capone was originally scheduled to get off with a slight sentence on a plea of guilty, but Wilkerson refused to make any repeat.

# BRAVES GO INTO FIRST POSITION; CUBS DEFEATED

**Senators Bolt Yank. Wyoming Stake; Ferrell Wins His 5th Victory**

**NEW YORK, (UPI)—The Boston Braves have moved into first place in the National League and the Washington Senators have moved into the New York Yankees off the top rung in the American circuit.**

While the Braves came out of Brooklyn, it was notched by rain at Boston yesterday, the leading Chicago Cubs, lost 7 to 1 to the St. Louis Cardinals. This dropped the Cubs and the Braves, who had been tied, into a dead heat at seven straight.

With Bill McMillan won the game for St. Louis, allowing only three runs, the Cards were in the works. George Watrous, St. Louis centerfielder, continued his heavy hitting with a home run, a double and a triple in two other hits, but Chicago's Joe Tinker hit five runs in the first five innings, but noted out the Pirates, 7 to 5, was the Reddy fourth straight victory for Pittsburgh's fifth straight defeat.

In the American League, the Senators bolted the Yankee winning streak with six straight victories from New York, 7 to 3, dropping the Yanks into second position. Lloyd Brown held the New Yorkers to five hits in eight Innings.

Cleveland advanced to third place by avenging the Chicago White Sox, 11 to 1, while Detroit dropped to fourth position, losing to the Indians, 10 to 4.

Wes Ferrell, on the Cleveland mound, limited Chicago to seven hits. It was his fifth win of the season, while the Indians' wins came to Alvaril and Trotter added Cleveland.

Hodday, St. Louis, struck out 11 men and held the Tigers without a run, while the Indians homered with one on. Hodday also homered for Detroit in the ninth.

**U. S. C. Wins But Ben Eastman of Cards Breaks 440 Yard Mark**

**LOS ANGELES, (UPI)—The work of Jen Eastman, middle distance track star from the "lure" down Palo Alto way, paid off today in spite of the defeat of his team, the Trojans, in a dual meet with the University of Southern California Saturday.**



**THE GOVERNOR AND GUSMAN'S GRAFT**

FOLLOWING the charges made last fall by Governor Ross, involving one H. Gusman, grand jury indicted the Idaho Equipment Company's head on no less than 43 counts; a district court jury has found him guilty of defrauding the state, and the gentleman has been sentenced to serve a term in the state penitentiary for graft running back over a period of years to 1927.

No one gloats over the conviction of any individual, and it is regrettable that the occurrence has taken place. However, it is to the everlasting credit of the chief executive that the looting of the state's money has been uncovered and stopped. Had Governor Ross not had his hand on the various departments of the state government, as is his practice, this abominable thief might have continued throughout his administration just as it persisted under the administration of his predecessor, who, doubtless would have been just as quick to take prompt action, but who could not possibly have uncovered the steal because of an "icy-going temperament, much like that of the late President Harding, which gave opportunity for the unscrupulous to take advantage of the commonwealth."

This newspaper in the past has frequently had occasion to comment on the advantage of Idaho having an alert governor, one responsive to the people, and courageous enough to drag problems out into the open, as Governor Ross has done in the Lewiston case.

Just remember that a less timid soul, would never have known of the fraud, much less exposed it as he did, and chance the chagrin which would have come with inability to sustain his charges.

Governor Ross has earned the gratitude of all the people of Idaho in this, his latest triumph.

**COWARDICE IN POLITICS****COWARDICE**, as Rodney Dutcher pointed out in a dispatch from Washington the other day, has become one of the most common characteristics in American public life.

Our political leaders, he remarked, possess an extraordinary amount of caution. They fear nothing so much as a real live issue. When they fight they take good care to get all the big guns on their side. They reserve their heaviest blasts for insignificant opponents who cannot fight back effectively.

The commonest explanation for this sad state of affairs is that it is inevitable in a democracy. Office holders depend on votes for their jobs. If they make enemies they lose votes. The pressure to straddle, to compromise, to placate powerful minorities and minority leaders, is almost overwhelming.

Oddly enough, though, a casual glance at American political history will show that this sort of thing isn't in the least necessary. The politicians are revealing, not the fundamental fault of democracy, but their own weakness.

What has happened is that the politicians have made the mistake of understanding the common sense and good judgment of the electorate.

The greatest figures in American political history are the men who dared to make enemies—the men who were willing to follow their own conceptions of right and trust to the electorate for an accurate understanding of them.

Jackson, Lincoln, Cleveland, Roosevelt, Wilson—they were, one and all, fighters, enemy-makers. They knew, politics, of course, they could compromise when they had to; but they could also adopt an unpopular line of attack and stick to it no matter how great the risks to their own personal fortunes. And it is worth remembering that the electorate stood by them time and again.

The cowardice of politicians, in other words, isn't an inevitable part of democracy. Let really bold and determined political leaders appear today and the response they will get will be astonishing.
