

AMERICAN FALLS RESERVOIR FILLS AT NORMAL RATE

Directors of District Here
Tuesday Reduce Assess-
ment Charge

Storage of American Falls reservoir is accumulating at a normal rate, it was revealed by the commissioners meeting of the board of directors here Tuesday. On Saturday there were \$10,000,000 more feet of water in the reservoir than there has not started yet, it was stated.

Reducing assessment charges for this year, the board reduced the amount of water to be taken from the reservoir to five cubic feet per acre foot, which represents a decrease on the south side of \$1.20 to \$1 for the water used.

The day for interest and safety funds added .002 per cent on the water used to the construction cost. On the south side this amounts to 2 cents an acre foot.

First payment of \$125,000 on the water used will fall due in October, and the amount of water used that the first levy for this fund will conclude next year.

The day for construction and maintenance of \$1.20 per acre foot, and the interest and safety fees will bring in \$170,000. It is estimated.




