MARITIME STRENGTH WAXING HE ASSERTS

American Position No Longer Secure Solon Tells His Colleagues

WASHINGTON (UP)—Chairman Hale of the Senate Naval affairs committee today urged his colleagues to "strengthen" the American fleet at the Geneva naval conference by authorizing new construction to renovate our obsolescent Navy.

Hale spoke in behalf of his bill, which would increase the Navy's fleet ratio with Japan from all-guns to all-guns and battleships.

"Our claim that we must have parity with Great Britain and the United States," he said, "is being made to extend that right."

He said that the United States is a chess merchant, through whose influence John King, John Gratrix, Edward Dickson, John Broadbent, John Smith, and David Amford, signed the pledge of total abstention.

"I am in favor of the amendment in the prohibition amendment in the United States," he said.

MURDER SUSPECTS FACE EARLY TRIAL

Mendon Draper and Mrs. Jensen Bound Over After Aged Man's Death

CHICAGO, (UP)—The murder of a 72-year-old man, Mendon Draper, today faced the prospect of a trial next month on the charge of brutally murdering Andrew Herzog, 85, bank president and wealthy Westchester.

ABOARD DIXIE FLIER ENROUTE ATLANTA, GA. (UP)—Al Capone, imprisoned in the U. S. penitentiary tonight to start serving the 11-year sentence imposed upon him for income tax fraud. In an angry mood, the scar-faced criminal traveled southward today guarded by a ring of heavily armed men.

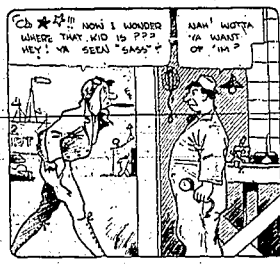

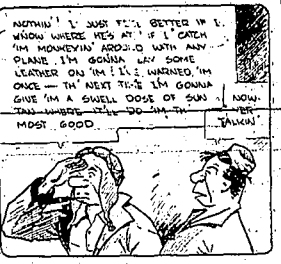

Merchants as always will want to display their wares, and manufacturers their latest products for economical use on the farm and in the home.

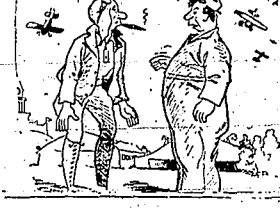
Horses still like to run, whether they are ridden by professional jockeys or home-town youngsters, and there's no keeping the midway merchants and concessioners away from such a scene.

Then too, this fall will see the heat of the political campaign, and there should be candidates enough to make a respectable attendance at any man's fair!

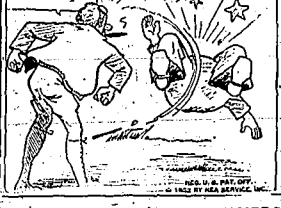
Everyone is not going to go around indefinitely with a long face and a lean pocketbook. Autumn will see a great change in the entire community.

IF DEFLATION "RUNS ITS COURSE"

The remark is frequently made that business in the United States will be on a sounder basis once it has been deflated to the pre-war level.

Prosperity is based on a free exchange of goods and services, and that cannot take place unless prices are in proper relation to one another.

Let us see what must be done if we are all to get together on the pre-war level. In the first place would come a substantial increase in the price of farm products, which are now 35 per cent below the pre-war level.

Freight rates are 50 per cent above the pre-war level, city wages 90 per cent, and city rents 30 per cent higher than before the war.

It is apparent that the process of deflation, as applied to many city costs, has hardly begun. The farmer has carried the burden of deflation, and the disastrous effect on his purchasing power is one of the most important influences retarding recovery.

Since early in 1930 farm leaders have been maintaining that to allow deflation to run its course would not result in deflation. Few others paid any attention to them then, but now that the pinch of deflation is beginning to be felt severely in other quarters, the doctrine of stopping the deflation by whatever means may be necessary to accomplish that purpose is becoming respectable.

The word inflation is still taboo in polite circles, but under whatever name, the tires are being pumped up, and official Washington is definitely committed to whatever expansion of Reserve Bank credit may be necessary to restore a substantial part of the drop in the average price level.

We will learn some time that no particular level of prices is "sounder" than another. The only thing that is sound is stability of the average price level, which permits prices and wages to adjust themselves to one another in such relationship that goods can be exchanged freely.
