**PUBLISHES TAX ROLL**

The American Falls Press, weekly newspaper at the Power county seat has done a remarkable thing and made a valuable contribution to the community in setting into type and printing in its current issue the complete tax roll of the county, with no cost to anyone but the newspaper itself.

The list gives the name of every taxpayer together with the legal description of the property, the amount at which it is assessed, the exemptions allowed and the net tax charged. The list occupies over five pages of small type and has the appearance, very much, of the usual tax-sale legal notice periodically published by counties.

The Evening Times has had occasion in the past to recommend that such publication be made by counties throughout the state.

In some states it is already law, the purpose being to reveal to all and sundry just how much taxes who pays on what. Its cost, even if paid for by the county, would be a wise investment, for it would tend to equalize taxes, perhaps, and drag out into the light those pieces of property which may be bearing either too little or too much of the public tax. Had the publication been paid for in Power county it would have cost less than \$500. The amount would vary in smaller or larger counties, but the benefits to be derived would be proportional.

Practically all public officials are required by law to publish financial statements, periodically, and it is well it serves to protect first the officials themselves, and secondly the taxpayers, who are entitled to know what is going on in public affairs.

The American Falls paper says it believes this is the first time such a statement has been published in Idaho; doubtlessly the paper is correct in this, and what is more it may have started something which will redound to the benefit of taxpayers in other counties, also, if such publication could be made a legal requirement which now it is not.

There cannot be too much publicity about the public's business.

**SAVED A LIFE.**

HERE is a story from the Minidoka County Record, Rupert weekly newspaper, which confirms the contention of The Evening Times, when it recently urged the protection of lives of innocent children who might haplessly fall into irrigation streams.

It will be recalled that this newspaper printed advice from Dr. Jensen, director of the Twin Falls county Health Unit, in which it was pointed out that in case of the recovery of a body from water (or in cases of electrical shock and carbon-monoxide poisoning) hope of saving the life should not be abandoned short of two hours spent in the application of methods to induce artificial respiration.

His advice was to first start working on the person, and then send for a doctor.

The story from Rupert reveals how one two-year-old tot is alive and well today, as the result of quick and effective work on the part of the parents.

Here is the story:

Swallowed-by the swift-running water of B-1 canal a week ago Tuesday, the little body being taken down stream fully an eighth of a mile, remaining in the water 15 minutes or more, Ray Robbins, two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Orrin Robbins, farmers on the old J. W. McAlister farm near Acquia, today is in his usual good health, except for a bad cold.

Tuesday morning about 10:30 Mrs. Robbins missed the youngster. A search of the yard failing to disclose his presence the mother rushed to the canal a hundred yards distant. Seeing no trace of the child she ran to the field an eighth of a mile from the house to notify Mr. Robbins. Rushing back to the house she traced the foot-steps of the little tot to the canal. Firmly convinced that he had fallen over the high bank into the rapidly running water she hastened down the canal bank and when approximately 200 yards from the starting point the little body of the babe came to the surface near the shore. The frantic mother seized in, bringing the unconscious form to the bank. By this time Mr. Robbins had arrived. Shedding his coat the father wrapped the lifeless form in the covering and began to roll the body, the water-filled lungs began to empty and after a short time a feeble flutter of life was noticeable, and soon the little lad was breathing. The father ran to Acquia where a physician from Rupert was notified. Responding rapidly to the call Dr. Leland Frazier found the baby breathing regularly when he arrived but still unconscious.

The little fellow remained in a coma for nearly 24 hours, then gradually began to get stronger and after a couple of days in bed was apparently no worse for his experience-excepting for a bad cold.

While it is not known exactly how long the body remained under water it is thought that fully 15 minutes must have elapsed from the time he fell in until rescued by his mother. The babe is the only child of the young couple.

Here is a lesson for everyone living in an irrigated country, for the possibilities of similar occurrences this spring and summer are great.

Learn the method of applying artificial respiration and you may be learning and preparing yourself to save a life.
