WORLD SHEETS HARD LIQUOR PAIRS (UP)—Not only American, but Scotch liquors, have reformed their drinking habits and is consuming far less hard liquor. French liquor production figures for 1921 brought a reduction of nearly 20 per cent over 1920. Specialty whisky distillation in Great Britain has produced but one out of two to three-fifths of their normal output and are closing down for the season and month ahead of their usual time.

Judge Sentences Three Oil Men

He was found guilty by Superior Judge John Yankovich to the extent of \$100,000, of the company's funds. The attorneys sought a fine of six months or grand theft, totaling \$130,000. Judge Yankovich sentenced him to one to ten years on each count, and the last four to run concurrently with the second. Likewise was sentenced to two to twenty years in State Prison. He was found guilty originally on only one count of grand theft, but Judge Yankovich convicted him on three additional charges today. The jurist had these three latter counts, under submission since Monday when he retraced the first verdicts. The court ruled that Meeker should serve one to ten years, each on the last three counts, the sentence to run concurrently, and one to ten on the first count, to be run concurrently with the other two to ten years. Meeker stole \$20,000 from the Highland treasury according to Judge Yankovich's ruling.
