

PROPERTY OWNER OF GOODING DIES

Robert C. Brown, Business Associate of Late F. R. Gooding, Dies at Boise.

GOODING (Special) — Robert C. Brown, one of the early pioneers of Gooding, died in Boise Saturday evening at the age of 70 years. He was a native of Denmark, emigrating to this country at the age of 15. He is survived by his wife, Mary C. Brown, and a daughter, Alice Brown.

Mr. Brown lived in Gooding many years, having been associated with the late Senator Frank R. Gooding as a boy. He worked on various projects which they constructed and owned up to 1925 when they sold home to the city of Gooding. They then moved to Boise, where Mr. Brown died recently. Some of the buildings in Gooding, some of which were sold to home owners, and some were still owned by Mr. Brown at the time of his death. Mr. Gooding and Brown were divided at the time of the settlement of the Mr. Gooding estate. Mr. Brown now owns several buildings and houses, and he was also owner of the Gooding Heating and Plumbing company and the building in which he died.

For the past four years he had lived with his family in Boise, where he was engaged in the construction business, and at the time of his death was fulfilling the needs of the state of Idaho at his foot.

18 ELEVATORS AND WAREHOUSES SOLD

Idaho and Utah Properties of Colorado Company In Big Deal

GOODEN, Utah. — The purchase of 18 elevators and warehouses in Utah and Idaho from the Colorado Mills and Elevator company, was announced yesterday by Farmers National Grain Corporation.

The houses have been leased by the Farmers National from the Colorado Mills and Elevator company since the past year and will be taken over by a reported purchase price of \$165,000.

The purchase will make 48 elevators and warehouses in Utah and Idaho and the Farmers National lease of the Farmers National, included are 16 houses now run by lease from the Goba Grind & Milling Co., 10 houses now owned and operated by three individual operators, and the 18 from the Colorado Mills and Elevator company.

The location of the houses owned in Idaho include those at Ida City, Corral, Fairfield, Drummond, Emmerich, Downey, Talmage, Arimo, Malad, Coalville, Grace, and Mackay, and in Utah, the Cache Valley, Utah, Tremonton, Utah, Fielding, Utah, Portage, Utah.

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"Prosperity Wheat" on Sale at \$1.25 Bushel

PRATT, Kan. — Wheat at \$1.25 a bushel, selling for 10 cents a loaf, brings in \$50.

Thus the farmer selling the 100 bushels of wheat realizes \$125 from the sale. The baker gets a profit in selling 125 loaves, and this is equivalent to \$12.50 for the 20-bushel loaf, or for 10 cents. The entire community is relieved of the cost of storing wheat and of getting it to market and for their wheat, this out ok was gloomy until the "Prosperity" Wheat Association was founded.

The association is a non-profit organization for the benefit of all local farmers. They started merely as a plan to help wheat farmers get their wheat to the whole country, and was right out to ready the advertising slogan, "Wheat to the whole country."

The plan is to sell wheat at \$1.25 a bushel, which bakers are agreed to buy from the farmer, and citizens agree to buy bread made by those bakers.

The plan at present is a combination of the two, and placed in the market. Some distinguished persons put out two names in each township and the lucky farmers sell their bushels of wheat to bakers at \$1.25 a bushel.

Not only is the farmer and consumer profit by the procedure now used to market the wheat, but the baker has a profit and also goes out on the right side of the ledger. One hundred bushels of wheat

assured farmers of Kansas have now assumed the production of bread, flour, and other products of their original farm. In Pratt, there are other Kansas communities falling in line. Among them are Stafford, Edwards, and especially the community in the great wheat belt.

What was written in particular of the plan, Gutierrez, Tex., has asked for full information. Mr. Pratt, the president of a wheat mill in Cherokee, Okla., and the entire wheat raised in that community will be sold under the "Prosperity" Wheat Association.

The association now functions under the direction of Heckday and Fred Heskele, president; Mrs. Nellie, secretary; Artay Cooper, treasurer; and Artay Cooper, a 20 farmers have taken 50 bushels of wheat to their mills and sold it for \$1.25 a bushel.


