With indications pointing to an unusually heavy vote at the polls in Twin Falls county Tuesday, all is in readiness for the commencement of balloting in the 27 precincts at 10 o'clock in the forenoon. Tuesday will see the wind-up of the campaign through newspaper, radio and personal campaigning and the Democratic rally scheduled for 8 o'clock at Legion Memorial hall will mark the conclusion of the pre-primary campaign in this county. ## County Has Five Sons in Contest For High Office

With the primary elections of the Republican and Democratic parties set for Tuesday, only a day away, interest has developed in the several contests in the county and state, though few are predicting the exact results. This is the first time that a state-wide primary has been held in Idaho, the nomination of state and congressional offices as well as supreme court judges having previously been left to state nominating conventions of the respective parties. Twin Falls county has more than an ordinary interest in the results of the state-wide primary inasmuch as five of her sons are candidates for state or congressional offices.

## Thirty Candidates To Remain in County Political Race

Of the 39 candidates of both parties seeking county honors at the primary election Tuesday, 19 of them will be necessarily counted out and 20 will remain in the race, inasmuch as there are only 15 positions to fill on each ticket. However there are no contests in the case of six Democratic and five Republican places, leaving 13 places for which there are contests. It is around these offices that interest in the results Tuesday centers. Of the 17 contests, nine of them are in the Republican ranks and the remaining eight in the Democratic column.

## ELECTION INFORMATION

The primary election polls will open throughout the state at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning and will remain open until 8 o'clock at night.

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PROPERTY OWNER OF GOODING DIES

Robert C. Brown, Business Associate of Late F. R. Gooding, Dies at Boise

GOODING, (Special) — Robert C. Brown, one of the early pioneers of Gooding, died in Boise Saturday evening at the age of 65 years. He was a native of Denmark, coming to this country at the age of 18. He was married by the late Mrs. C. Brown, and a daughter, Alice Brown.

Mr. Brown lived in Gooding many years, having been associated with the late Senator Frank H. Gooding, owner of the Gooding mill works which they constructed and owned up to 1925 when they sold them to the city of Gooding. He also built a large number of homes in Gooding, some of which were sold to some owners who were later owned by Mr. Brown after the property interests of Gooding and Brown were divided at the time of the settlement of the F. R. Gooding estate. Mr. Brown owned several Gooding mill houses, and he was also owner of the Gooding Heating and Plumbing company and the building in which it is located.

For the past four years he had lived with his family in Boise, where he was engaged in the contracting business, and at the time of his death was building the new hospital for the state of Idaho at Billings.

18 ELEVATORS AND WAREHOUSES SOLD

Idaho and Utah Properties of Colorado Company In Big Deal

ODDEN, Utah. — The purchase of 18 elevators and warehouses in Utah and Idaho from the Colorado Mill and Elevator company, was announced today by the Farmers National Grain Corporation.

The houses have been leased by the Farmers National to the Colorado Mill and Elevator company during the past year and will be taken over at a reported purchase price of \$165,000.

The purchase will make 48 elevators and warehouses in Utah and Idaho under the ownership or lease of the Farmers National. Included are 16 houses now run on lease from the Odeh Grain & Milling company, 10 houses already owned, 4 leased from individual operators, and the 18 from the Colorado Mill and Elevator company.

The location of the houses bought in Idaho include those at JHI City, Corral, Fairfield, Drummond, Hencroft, Downey, Talmage, Arimo, Malad, Coulam, Grace, and Weston, and at Lampa, Utrich, Gatch Valley, Utah, Fremont, Utah; Fielding, Utah; Portage, Utah.

"Prosperity Wheat" on Sale at \$1.25 Bushel

Pratt, Kan. — Wheat—\$1.25 a bushel will make 3800 loaves of bread, 1750, selling for 10 cents a loaf, brings in \$500.

Profit For All Thus the farmer selling the 100 bushels of wheat realizes \$125 from the sale. The baker gets a profit in selling to mechanics, and the merchant makes a profit from the 38,000 loaves sold for 10 cents.

Wheat stands this territory from the standpoint of prosperity. Last year farmers in the district were getting from 18 to 25 cents a bushel for their wheat. The out look was gloomy until the "Prosperity Wheat" Association was founded last November. Since then the price of wheat has climbed.

Last year when wheat prices dropped in their lowest level in years, local farmers sought out one man they knew could do something if any one could. He was P. W. "Woody" Heckaday. "Woody" had been one of the most efficient business men in the territory. He engineered the construction of a highway across the great wheat lands of the state. He hoisted state wheat to the whole country, and was sought out to remedy the alarming situation.

Everybody Co-operates He decided to form the Prosperity Wheat Association with the sole aim of bringing wheat up to \$1.25 a bushel. He announced his plan, which consisted of co-operation between farmers, bakers and consumers in the county, and got the support of 200 members.

Here's the way the plan works: Mills agree to pay \$1.25 a bushel for wheat. Bakers agree to buy flour from such wheat, and citizens agree to buy bread made by these bakers.

The plan at present is a community one. Members names are placed in a hat. Some distinguished person pulls out two names. In each township and the lucky farmers sell 30 bushels of wheat to bakers at \$1.25 a bushel. Not only do the farmer and consumer profit by the procedure as is used to market the wheat, but the baker and the merchant also come out on the right side of the ledger.

One hundred bushels of wheat

SINGING IN THE BATHTUB

BOISE CANDIDATE DEFENDS DRY LAW IN ADDRESS HERE

Attorney Harry S. Kessler Speaks Sunday From Methodist Pulpit

A forceful defense of prohibition was presented here Sunday evening by Harry Kessler, Boise attorney, and a Democratic aspirant for nomination as United States senator. He spoke at the regular evening service in the absence of the pastor Dr. Elijah Houghsack.

Mr. Kessler stated that prohibition was adopted in Idaho 16 years ago by a four to one vote and today a majority of the public seem to be carried away by wet propaganda. He entered the race in aid because none of the other Democratic candidates measured up to the demands of the prohibitionists and is avowedly wet and the other is in Washington and is saying nothing in defense of prohibition. He said the cause without a single dry champion.

"There is only one way to repeal the Eighteenth amendment," declared the speaker "and that is by the same process that made the law a part of the constitution. There is no such thing as a provision for a referendum either in the United States or in Idaho."

Moral Up-DOWN "All the ills of this country are laid at the door of prohibition," he said. "There has been a world-wide moral let-down since the war and that is the only remedy. It is a moral vigor which will overcome our evils. Were it not for prohibition conditions would be infinitely worse."

In answer to the argument that the prohibition law is a restriction on personal liberty he declared "A freed slave like the proclamation of the United States, which says 'repeat will not bring back to the nation. I say it will because there is no other place to go; they may cost too much and enforcement is too slow and inefficient."

Three Curses "The three great curses of mankind were war, slavery and intemperance. It has been 2000 years since Christ declared that the greatest sin among men was that which says 'I will not be afflicted; slavery was outlawed by Abraham Lincoln, yet still survives in the 14th and 15th amendments to the constitution are not being enforced in every part of the United States. Yet there is an urge to repeal the Eighteenth amendment, because it is not perfectly enforced in a few years."

"It can be enforced, and will be enforced," he declared, "the Eighteenth amendment is a country changed by the idleness and laziness of the landowners and the greed of the laborer. 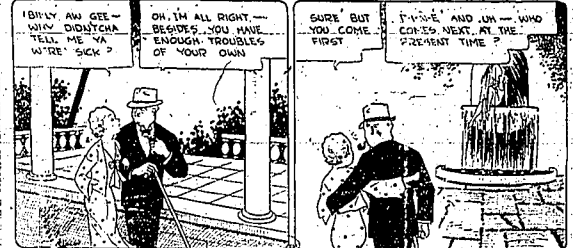
