

HAWAII'S CASE DISPATCHES from Washington indicate that the proposal to grant full statehood to Hawaii, which had a great deal of support when this session of Congress opened and looked as if it might pass without much opposition, has suffered severely because of the furor arising out of the tragic Mase case.

Instead of being slated for early consideration, with the odds favoring its acceptance, the proposal now seems doomed to slumber indefinitely "in committee." It is a little bit hard to see just why this should be so. The Mase tragedy was pretty dreadful, of course; but is it any worse than things which happen on the mainland? Is it, in short, any worse than the Lindbergh tragedy in New Jersey?

THE JAPANESE SITUATION

THE most disturbing thing about the situation which has developed in Japan following the murder of Premier Inukai is the likelihood that the fire-eating militarist group, responsible for the dangerous Japanese adventure in Manchuria and Shanghai, will emerge from the turmoil with infinitely greater power over the Japanese nation.

The military clique has always had more than its due share of influence in the Japanese government. It plunged the nation into the recent Chinese affair over the heads of the civilian authorities and presented the world with an alarming threat to continued peace.

If, now, it cements its power more fully and beats down all opposition completely, the situation in the Orient will seem more menacing than ever.

CAUGHT IN TIME

PROM Ogden comes the story that the Republican state convention, forgetting that times have changed since the party platform of two years ago was drafted, blithely and unsuspectingly adopted the platform of 1930—the other-day just before the convention recessed for lunch.

Imagine the embarrassment of the party stalwarts when a short time later they recalled the fact that the 1930 platform contained one of those typical Republican "prosperity planks" which sounded convincing at the time, but which only malicious Democrats enjoy reading now.

No one could remember exactly what the plank said, but S. M. Jorgensen, chairman of the resolutions committee two years ago, recalled that it pointed with pride to those Republican policies which had created and which alone could maintain prosperity.

The first business performed after the convention reconvened was the adoption of a motion by W. D. Candland to rescind the action adopting that platform. And when the deed was done everyone sighed with relief.

THE NEED FOR REAL LEADERSHIP

CONGRESS has come in for some pretty hard words lately. For the most part, it has deserved them. Its performance in the last few months has not been the sort of thing that can be pointed to with a great deal of pride; the antics it has performed in connection with the matters of budget-balancing and economy are hard to contemplate without a severe pain.


But Congress, after all, has been getting a little bit more censure than it really has coming. For the chief trouble with Congress has been that it has been faithfully reflecting the conflicting and confused sentiments of the people back home. The blame that we have been giving Congress must, in the last analysis, rest on all of us.

Has Congress approached the taxation problem in the manner of a chicken with its head cut off? So have all the rest of us, from one coast to the other. Has Congress had a fearfully dismal time trying to decide just where money can best be saved in the federal budget? It has simply been trying to respond to the wishes of its constituents, who are as far from unanimity on this platform as they possibly could be.

Congress, in short, has been a perfectly adjusted gauge for the wind of public opinion. That wind, unfortunately, has been blowing from all points of the compass at once, of late; but when that happens it is hardly fair to blame all of the subsequent gyrations on the gauge itself.

The chief trouble, perhaps, is that in the past few decades we have stuck too closely to the notion that a congressman ought to reflect the desires of the voters back home. He should do that, certainly; but he should also think for himself, at times, and be capable of following his own best judgment even when he knows his constituents won't agree with him.

We have representative government, and it may be that it is just a shade too representative. At a time when all of us are as confused as we are now, we don't want someone to take our orders. We want someone to lead us.

250 UNEMPLOYED PROTEST MEXICAN LABOR IN FIELDS

Workmen Meet With A. B. Hagar and County Officials at Parish Hall

Two hundred and fifty workmen assembled at Parish Hall Thursday afternoon in a meeting with county officials and A. B. Hagar, district manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company in an effort to iron out difficulties which have arisen by the employment of Mexican labor in the thinning of sugar beets at Twin Falls and Jerome counties.

The assembly was addressed by Hagar who promised the cooperation of his company in putting as many of the sugar to work as possible and by Sheriff E. P. Prater who emphasized that the first thing necessary was to convince the farmers of the two counties of the urgency of the employment situation and of the advantages of employing workmen.

Asks Reason

It was revealed that there has been no complaint over the ability of the men to labor so satisfactorily do the best work, this being given as the explanation as to why the men were not employed at Prater suggested that the men form themselves into groups with a leader and in a position to guarantee their work. Mr. Hagar explained that the sugar company could not force any particular kind of labor on growers, as the latter did the thinning and the paying.

The meeting was held at Parish hall early Wednesday evening attended by 488 men whose names were listed together with their addresses—whether or not they were married or single; their length of residence in the county and facts regarding their experience.

The list revealed they had 477 dependents, some of whom are under 11, and that the average length of residence was from 3 to 10 years.

Hagar Makes Statement

Hagar said there were now a total of 400 men employed in the beet fields, about 60 of these being resident Mexicans, and probably about 100 outside Mexicans. He said the company has not imported a single Mexican or had had transportation or supplied food for any of them; and that their coming here had been completely discouraged by the other hand, he said the company had spent \$180 sending Mexicans out of the country.

E. J. Finch, who presided at Wednesday night's meeting pointed out that the employment of men who would be reflected in taxes and would tend to relieve a taxless situation.

Speakers from the workers stated that many of the men were out of money as well as work and that their families in many instances were destitute and hungry. They pleaded for continued opportunity to display their ability at thinning beets, many of them offering to work a half day and if the farmer was not satisfied with their work to quit.


