

"April the Fifth" Wins 153rd Derby

100-to-6 Shot Leads Field of Famous Horses

EPSOM DOWNS, Eng., (UP)—April the Fifth upset all expectations by winning the 153rd renewal of the derby today before a vast throng of half a million which had come to see the expected triumph of Orwell.

Dastur was second and Miracle third.

Royal Dancer finished fourth and Firdaus's fifth. Orwell was sixth in the lead and could not get up the wire by only a nose.

April the Fifth finished three-fourths of a length in front of Dastur which led Miracle to the wire by only a nose.

One of the greatest crowds in the long history of the world's greatest horse race was gathered on the rolling downs. The entire royal household was there. Mrs. Baring, first woman to fly the Atlantic, attended with Lord Astor.

April the Fifth, owned by Tom Walls and ridden by Fred Lano, was 100 to 6 in the betting. Dastur, owned by the Aga Khan, was 18 to 1 and Miracle was 10 to 1.

The time for the distance of approximately a mile and a half was 2 minutes 41 seconds, compared with the record of 2:41 2/5 made by Gall Hoy in 1927.

Walls, the proud owner of April the Fifth, is an actor and theatrical producer. He trained only once April the Fifth, but he not only won the race, but he also won the Derby.

A field of 21 colts started. Washington, owned by Orwell, having withdrawn his other starter, Loughan, just before the race. The victory was worth approximately \$45,000 to Walls.

The money was little, however, for the achievement of winning the great race, especially as well as a highly-regarded as Orwell, the best favorite in recent years. Walls, beaming his delight was greeted with rousing cheers from the stands. He was surrounded by all the jockeys, congratulating him, and shook hands with them.

April the Fifth's victory was announced by the disappointing performance of Orwell in two hours and ten minutes, cloudy but without rain, and Orwell had been expected to perform brilliantly on a good track. Millions of dollars had been bet on him, and the bookmakers were furious.

April the Fifth's victory was amazing. He finished sixth behind Orwell in the two hours and ten minutes and was out of the money in his only three starts as a two-year-old. He is a brown colt.

Orwell started at the short odds of 6 to 1. It was the shortest price since 1918, when Galatinopolis, his sire, started odd-on at 8 to 13.

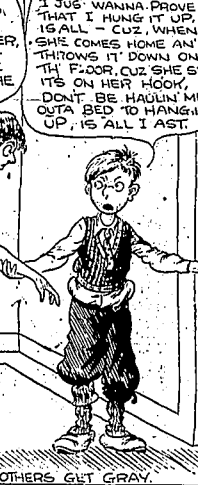

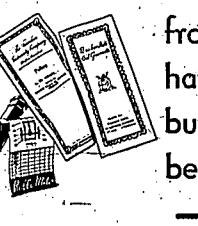

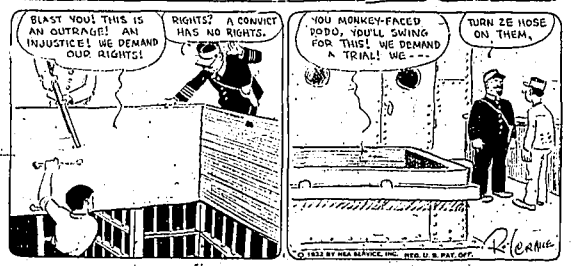

ENTHUSIASM; CURSE AND BLESSING A 19-YEAR-OLD Chicago boy had dreamed of becoming an aviator. Not long ago he found out that the family finances would make it impossible. So he committed suicide, leaving a note in which he remarked that "death is better than a life of monotony."

Of suicide, unfortunately, there is never a scarcity; and every now and then we have one like this, in which some pitifully misguided youth thinks his life has lost all of its savor and so destroys it. And a tragedy of this kind is always a puzzler—until we stop and remember how very, very dark the sky of a 19-year-old can seem, on occasion. The youngster of 19 has a most priceless of all gifts—enthusiasm. But this gift has a catch to it. The enthusiasm of 19 has a way of draining itself out very suddenly—and leaving bleak emptiness behind; and that emptiness can be very hard to bear.

This boy's tragedy is typical. An older person can realize that while being an aviator may be the best of all possible callings, life can still be made supportable if one has to find his fortune in some other field. But it is harder for 19 to see that; harder, because when you're in your teens you haven't yet learned how to give things up philosophically.

That, after all, is about all there is to growing up. One learns that most of the bright dreams of youth can never be realized, and one also learns that it doesn't really matter so very much, after all. It's a mortal hard lesson, and some never quite get reconciled to it; but we do learn it, after a fashion, and we can watch our old dreams drift over the horizon and go to find substitutes as best we can.

Youth, though, hasn't yet learned that. It has the ability to live in and for a dream, but when one dream goes it often has a hard time finding a new one. And so, once in a while, youth destroys itself, for what seems to us an absurdly insufficient reason; and we are reminded that the enthusiasm of youth can be a curse as well as a blessing.

We never heard much hub-bub about it in 1929 or the two years following, while the deficit was being created. Who ran up this deficit anyway? Was it a Democratic administration or a Republican? 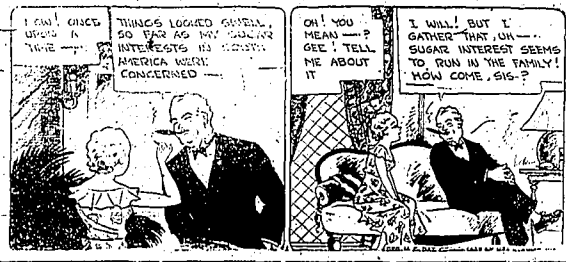
