NAZIS DISORDERS OCCUR IN BERLIN

Franz Von Papen Guarding Cabinet, Police Guard Neighborhood

Eight Defendants Draw 5 to 25-Year Sentences For Kidnaping Physician

Former Candidate for Mayor of Illinois City Alleged Ring Leader in Abduction Conspiracy

PEORIA, Ill., (UP)—Eight of the 11 defendants accused of kidnaping Dr. James W. Parker for \$50,000 ransom, were convicted today by a jury and their sentences fixed at terms ranging from five to 25 years.

Among those convicted were James W. Hinson, former city detective, former candidate for mayor and alleged ring leader of the abduction conspiracy; and Joseph H. Purshoff, former candidate for mayor and police investigator who was accused of being the intermediary in ransom negotiations.

Hinson was one of four defendants whose punishment the jury fixed at 25 years in the joint sentence. The other three defendants were sentenced to five years.

Parishoff was one of the two defendants who drew the lightest sentences among those convicted. He was ordered to serve five years. The case went to the jury here yesterday after three weeks had been consumed in selecting a jury and hearing evidence. The jury reported to Circuit Judge Henry Ingram when court opened today.

The others found guilty and the punishments fixed for them were: Claude Child Evans, accused of being one of the men who took Dr. Parker from his front of his home, March 1, sentenced to 25 years. Arlo Stoops, alleged to have aided Evans, sentenced to 25 years. Cecil Minnibach, accused of joining Stoops and Stoops on a mission from the scene of the kidnaping and of taking a wallet containing \$50 from the physician, sentenced to 25 years.

Leading Commercial Nations of World Seek to Raise Commodity Prices

BRITISH SUGGEST LONDON MEETING

Mellon Instructed to Report Idea Approved by Government

By JOSEPH H. BAIER Called Press Staff Correspondent of the United Press

The two most potent commercial nations of the world, Great Britain and the United States, were united today in support of an early economic conference of the nations to secure means of raising commodity prices and lowering world food and clothes for the common man.

Great Britain suggested that a conference be held in London, Secretary of State Simon D. Mellon to report the idea to the president.

Details were announced at a conference among Great Britain, France and Italy. Perhaps the most interesting feature was when President Hoover presented his memorandum plan program.

Pending further information, officials here forecast: 1. That the London economic conference, if agreed to by France and Italy, will be held soon after the meeting on reparations at Lausanne, June 21. Then Europe will know what to expect from Germany and what reparations it will ask the United States to do about war debts.

2. That the London economic conference will include discussion of ways to raise commodity prices to the level of say, 1926, and consideration of low silver prices, trade restrictions, embargoes, possible tariffs.

DRASTIC PROGRAM OF ECONOMY PLANNED AS SENATE VOTES TAXES

Legislators Respond to Pleas from Press, and Chief Executive

WASHINGTON, (UP)—Pleas from press, public and president jumbled a \$1,115,000,000 tax bill through the Senate today in culmination of a 13 1/2 hour session of excruciating sacrifice.

Secretary of Treasury Mills told the United Press that sum would balance the national budget and all practical purposes.

As the unprecedented peacetime burden was adopted, the single appropriation committee reported to the Senate a \$235,000,000 economy program to add to the tax bill passed the Senate at 12:25 A. M. almost 12 hours after the Senate had passed the tax bill.

Confusion on Measures By a vote of 72 to 11 the Senate sent the tax bill to conference with representatives of the House.

In a surprise appearance before the Senate finance committee, Secretary of State Stimson reported that new sources of revenue had to be found to balance the budget.

Income taxes, gasoline and electricity for money and light, were selected. They were given a \$27,000,000 additional burden.

Stimson also advocated the manufacture of synthetic rubber, in his personal plea before the Senate. President Hoover said he would accept any measure that met the finance committee and the Senate voted that day, the latter endorsing the referendum.

Senators remarked early that they left the chamber that morning with a heavy heart, and there was a feeling of gloom. There was wondering comment that no fare-back of congressional session had met the president's message.

Administration Surprises Hit the Senate after the third vote of Mr. Hoover ceased speaking and he hurried from the chamber.

The House's action came after a dramatic hour, which included an appeal from President Hoover to the Senate to speed tax legislation and a lengthy night session of the Senate, in which the tax bill was passed.

Reactions were world-wide as hours about recessed favorably to the news that Congress was on its way to completion of one of the most sweeping pieces of legislation.

Sheriff Robinson said the 160 unemployed men came here from Logan, Ill., late yesterday and demanded that the union men be discharged and that local labor be employed instead.



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

ENTHUSIASM: CURSE AND BLESSING

A 19-YEAR-OLD Chicago boy had dreamed of becoming an aviator. Not long ago he found out that the family finances would make it impossible. So he committed suicide, leaving a note in which he remarked that "death is better than a life of monotony."

Of suicide, unfortunately, there is never a scarcity; and every now and then we have one like this, in which some pitifully misguided youth thinks his life has lost all of its savor and so destroys it. And a tragedy of this kind is always a puzzler—until we stop and remember how very, very dark the sky of a 19-year-old can seem, on occasion.

The youngster of 19 has a more priceless of all gifts—enthusiasm. But this gift has a catch to it. The enthusiasm of 19 has a way of draining itself out very suddenly—and leaving bleak emptiness behind; and that emptiness can be very hard to bear.

This boy's tragedy is typical. An older person can realize that while being an aviator may be the best of all possible callings, life can still be made supportable if one has to find his fortune in some other field. But it is harder for 19 to see that; harder, because when you're in your teens you haven't yet learned how to give things up philosophically.

That, after all, is about all there is to growing up. One learns that most of the bright dreams of youth can never be realized, and one also learns that it doesn't really matter so very much, after all. It's a mortal hard lesson, and some never quite get reconciled to it; but we do learn it, after a fashion, and we can watch our old dreams drift over the horizon and go to find substitutes as best we can.

Youth, though, hasn't yet learned that. It has the ability to live in and for a dream, but when one dream goes it often has a hard time finding a new one. And so, once in a while, youth destroys itself, for what seems to us an absurdly insufficient reason; and we are reminded that the enthusiasm of youth can be a curse as well as a blessing.

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
