WASHINGTON (UP)—Republican leaders here today are preparing the way for a compromise prohibition plan, but it means less than two weeks from today.

President Hoover is holding no orders, so far as has been disclosed. At least none has been put through the thick fog of all the intricate and conflicting issues here.

Political leaders and delegations are filing in and out of the White House like a line of ants in a procession that approaches their final goal.

Mr. Hoover's chief political manager, Senator General Clegg, has announced that the prohibition convention will agree to a prohibition plank that will allow the repeal of the 18th amendment.

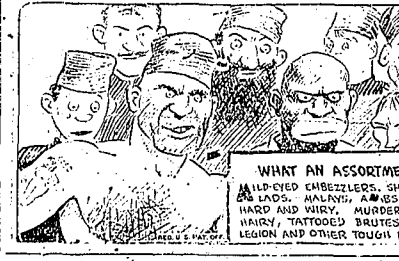

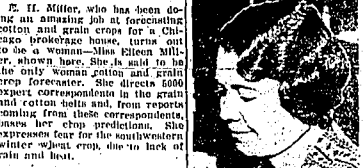

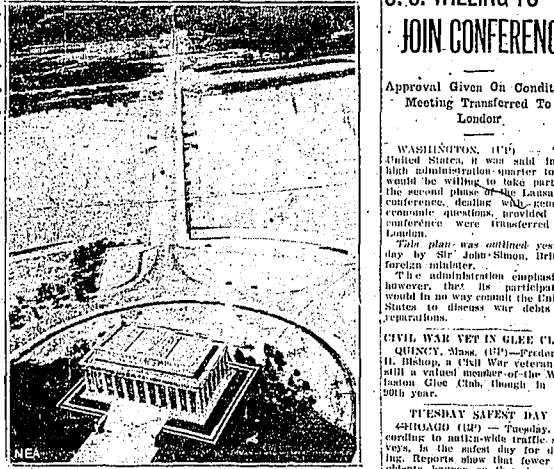

The color change system will cause the color of the film to change from black and white to color.

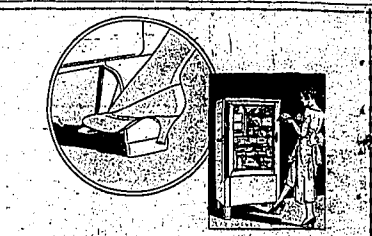
