Mr. Hoover's chief political manager, Senator General Clegg, Mr. Brown, has announced that the prohibition convention will agree to a prohibition plank that will allow the repeal of the 18th amendment.

NEW YORK, (UP)—Pepper Martin, hero of last year's world series, seems to be regaining his championship form, after his recovery from a shoulder injury.

The Pepper tripled yesterday, driving in the lone St. Louis run with which the Cardinals dominated the Chicago Cubs 1 to 0, in a five-inning game. The three-bagger came in the first inning with Eddie Orsatti on base.






### Trans-Pacific Plane Dives Into Bay











ABERRANT William Borah is off the reservation again and the Democrats are smiling at the discomfort of their Republican brethren, who are frankly dismayed at the prospect that he really may mean it this time.

Typical of the editorial comment is that of the Baltimore Sun, which thinks that Idaho's senator "who is cool and distant to his party leaders in May and becomes a pillar of ardent flame by September... This time 'may he mad,' Up in the panhandle at Sandpoint the Northern Idaho News wonders:

What course will Borah pursue after the nominations have been made? Will he support the nominee of his party with reservations, or will he support the nominee of the Democrats, or will he sulk, Achilles-like, in his tent?

Down in Boise a Republican political observer thinks Mr. Borah may be "drafted" to the convention by the process of electing him chairman of the Idaho delegation. Thus does the speculation run.

Why is Senator Borah again out of the G. O. P. fold? Press correspondents in Washington profess it is because he, as a staunch dry, is opposed to the anticipated prohibition re-submission plank in the Republican national platform. That hardly seems probable, however. There would be nothing inconsistent in Senator Borah approving a referendum plank, for that is neither a wet nor a dry matter. It is purely a proposal to permit the people to express their opinion again on prohibition, regardless of what the decision may be.

Prohibition may be the excuse offered, but there is doubt that it is the reason. The plain truth is that Senator Borah and President Hoover have been at loggerheads on nearly every important issue since the president took office and that Mr. Borah, inconsistent as he has been in the past, cannot lend his influence to open support of Mr. Hoover without repudiating his own record and conscience.

Not the least of Senator Borah's admirable qualities is his moral courage. He is not afraid to change his mind. He is not afraid of the truth. He is willing to face the world as it is. That is why he has many of the elements of a great man.

Borah fought Wilson in 1920 because he honestly thought Wilson was wrong. The Tribune credits him with supporting Mr. Hoover in 1928 despite past disagreements and criticisms of measures advocated by Hoover—because he honestly thought Mr. Hoover would make a courageous and capable president. He even indulged in such excessive zeal as declaring that the 1928 campaign was "a contest between law and order and Tammany hall and its allied influences."

Then came the disillusionment. At the urging of Senator Borah the president called a special session of congress to consider tariff revisions for the benefit of the farmer. Under the leadership of Joe Grundy and other industrial lobbyists congress then passed the most nefarious tariff bill in our history, an act which was more of an embargo than a tariff, whose effects are painfully apparent in this sad day of unemployment, hunger and distress throughout the nation.

Senator Borah roundly denounced that tariff bill. But the president did not have the fortitude to veto it! It opened a breach between the White House and Senator Borah which has not been healed, and which succeeding clashes have widened.

Now, it appears, Senator Borah and the administration have come to the parting of the ways. Unless he weakens, the Republicans must go through the hazards of the campaign without the support of their strongest vote-getter.

"UNCLE SAM" INDIANS

EXPLORERS who return from the darker regions of the earth often bring back very diverting stories. But it is a long time since anyone has popped up with quite as pleasant a yarn as that told by Dr. Thomas W. F. Gann, British archaeologist, who recently landed in New York after exploring the jungles of Guatemala.

Dr. Gann, it seems, discovered in the jungles a tribe that he christened the "Uncle Sam Indians." These Indians, he says, wore costumes very like that traditional for Uncle Sam. They had red and white striped trousers and they wore dark blue coats with long tails; and Dr. Gann, who knows his cartoons, was immediately struck by their resemblance to the legendary figure.

What all of this may mean is perhaps obscure but it does come as a welcome, brightly diverting little bit of news.




