

LEADERS PREDICT BITTER POLITICAL FIGHT AT CHICAGO

Republican Chiefs Silent On Controversial Subject of Prohibition

SHOUSE DISCUSSES RESUBMISSION PLAN

G. O. P. Platform Chairman to Continue Search For Satisfactory Plan

WASHINGTON, (UPI) — Republican attempts to draft an advance platform on prohibition next week will please both sides apparently have failed and several leaders are predicting a wide open fight.

Adoption of a resolution plank by the Democrats was predicted by one of their chief spokesman, Sen. Silvio, chairman of the Democratic national committee, in a statement criticizing the Republican hope of piecemeal legislation to effect the search for a miracle.

Several days ago President Hoover began inquiries hoping to reconcile the conflicting temperance factions in his administration. Walter Frank, his chief political adviser, announced that the party plan would be "satisfactory to all."

Leaders Silent

However, there are still some who do not expect to be satisfied with any plan that will satisfy both.

Two prominent leaders of the party are talking little if at all for quotation.

James A. Childs of Oklahoma, slated to be the platform chairman, is expected here over the weekend to continue his hunt for a platform which he will submit next week. Mrs. Ella Baker of W. C. T. U. and Senator Elbert D. Thomas, Repub. Conn., whom there is no doubt will write this section of the platform, were the exception of the miracle man of the administration after all.

The Democratic plank on the subject is also quiet, although a comprehensive study of Mr. Adcox's platform in 1924 and Roosevelt's now, would indicate that he is in a position to demand a plank which will be satisfactory to the dry and slightly pleasing to the wet.


Shower Given For Miss Ada Mayne

PROHIBITION HEAD COMPLETES TOUR

Director Claims Enforcement Activities In West Satisfactory

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Prohibition Director Amos W. W. Woodcock, just back from a tour of the mountains, plains, deserts and the middle West and Rocky mountain regions, declared that he found enforcement activities *satisfactory* in the West.
