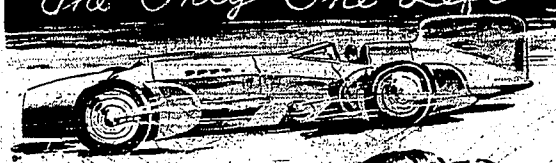

LEADERS PREDICT BITTER POLITICAL FIGHT AT CHICAGO

Republican Chiefs Blunt On Controversial Subject of Prohibition

SHOWS DISCUSSES RESUBMISSION PLAN

G. O. P. Platform Chairman to Continue Search For Satisfactory Plank

WASHINGTON, (UP) — Republican attempts to draft in advance a controversial plank that will please both sides appear to have failed and several leaders are predicting a bitter political fight at Chicago.

Adoption of a resubmission plank by Democrats was predicted by one of their chief spokesmen, Joseph Showe, chairman of the Democratic national executive committee, in a statement criticizing the Republican hope of meaning both sides in effect the search for a miracle.

Several days ago President Hoover began his inquiries into the conflict, conferring with Republican leaders. His chief political manager, Postmaster General Phillips P. Brown, announced that the party plank would be "satisfactory to all."

Leaders Silent

However, there are still some who do not expect to be satisfied until after they have fought it out. True to Republican tradition, leaders are talking little if at all for quotation.

James A. Garfield of Ohio, who is expected here over the weekend to continue his hunt for a prohibition formula that will satisfy both Mrs. Ella Boole of the W. C. T. U. and Senator Frank Bingham, Hays, Colo., took whom there is nobody better this side of Lank Island sound.

This effort to draft an ideal plank and repeat on Mr. Hoover's famous declaration which has since been condensed into the phrase "noble experiment" is noted upon by the Democrats as a safe pretext for a few discreet ejectives.

Showe Spoke

Showe, who should qualify as a prohibition expert, having been McAdoo's lieutenant in 1924 and Hancock's now, said in a statement:

"President Hoover's position on the matter is of course unequivocal, he is staunchly in favor of any plank which will be satisfactory to the dry and liberty planks to the wet. Perhaps this may be the eye of the miracle man of the administration after all."

"The Democratic plank on the subject can contemplate no such comprehensive shade. My party will be satisfied to ascertain the views of a majority of the convention, and to make its platform accordingly. If as now seems probable, the Democrats come out for a referendum, it will be for a real referendum, one that will give the people a definite opportunity to record the preponderance of national sentiment by a vote unswayed by political interference and unclouded by the pulling and hauling of various groups on individual congressmen."

Chicago in Chicago. Many business leaders have said they hope delegates from Illinois will switch to Traylor after casting the "w-vote" and work for Senator J. Hamilton Lewis.

Alvin H. Sauters, former editor of the "Breder's Gazette" but in printed words what many prominent Chicago men have been saying.

Sauters characterized Traylor of the "First" as a "prohibitionist" of the first rank, whose feet always are on a tripod and his heart always with the people who live upon the soil where he sprang.

In a conference with Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the Chicago Citizens committee for the convention recently, Judge James Francis Burke, general counsel for the Republican National Committee, indicated that the Democratic nomination would be either Alvin H. Traylor or Newton D. Baker.

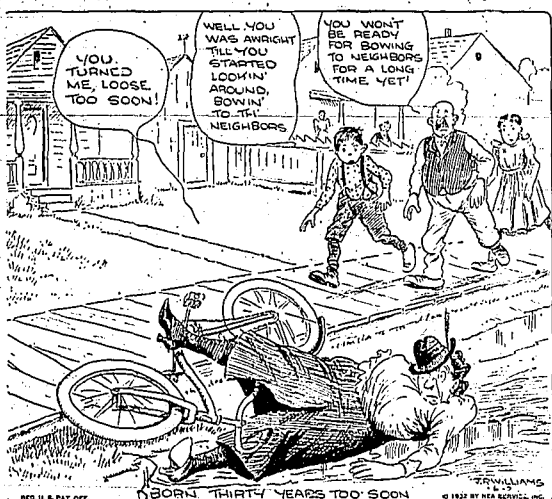

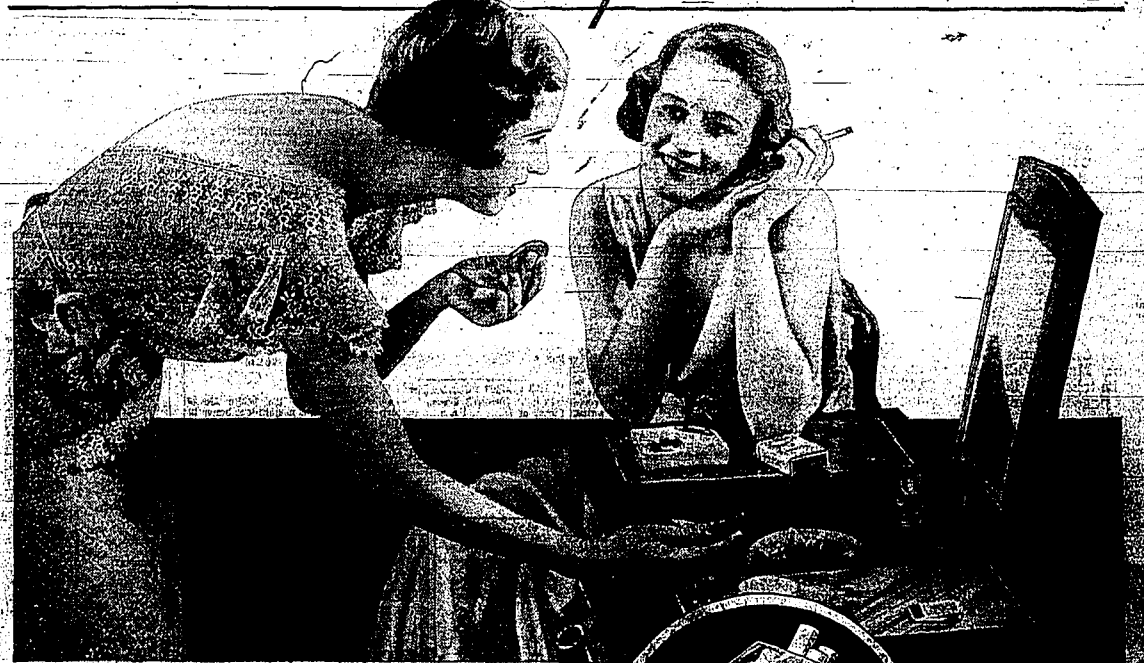

NEEDED: A DOLE SUBSTITUTE

ONE out of every four of the 2,700,000 unemployed men in England is no longer fit for normal work.

This bit of news is contained in statistics recently released by the British government. It presents a problem which might well be given some extended consideration on this side of the water.

These jobless men who are below par physically number between 600,000 and 700,000. A United Press cable summarizing the report about their remarks:

"Long idle, they have dropped into a permanent rut, out of which only full-fledged prosperity can rescue them. Their muscles have become soft, their thoughts chronically soured and twisted. Their condition has been likened to shell-shock, and some experts now refer to it as 'unemployment shock.'"

This, then, seems to be one of the brightest fruits of England's famous dole policy. We over here are going to have to think more seriously about an American dole, or its equivalent, in the coming year than we ever have before; it might pay us to keep this English object lesson in mind.

And yet it will not be enough for us simply to say, "The dole has tragic results and we want none of it." If things go on as they have been going, we shall assuredly have to have either the dole or something to take its place, and this little object lesson is useful chiefly because it warns us how vitally important it is that we dig up a good substitute.

The dole doesn't work out well. Those 600,000 English sufferers from "unemployment shock" will be a major problem for England for a good many years to come. But the dole does prevent starvation. It is probably fair to say that in England it has prevented a revolution.

And then, we reach the point at which some sort of government help for the unemployed becomes necessary and find a better solution than the dole. It may be extremely hard to find one. But it is quite evident that the job must be done.

DO WE MISJUDGE NEW YORK?

IT IS beginning to look very much as if the nation at-large had done the people of New York a grave injustice.

New York is popularly supposed to be hardboiled city. Broadway is supposed to be a street where your best friend will put a knife in your back as soon as he gets a chance. The "big town," in short, is looked upon as one of those places where the milk of human kindness has gone a wee mite sour.

But behold! How we have been misjudging the place! Here we have the mayor of New York, the over-worked and harassed Jimmy Walker. Mayor Walker, filling one of the most arduous of jobs, seems to have found the world filled with devoted and thoughtful friends, all eager to do what they might to make his path a little smoother.

One friend cuts him in on a stock-trading account. Mayor Walker puts up no money of his own; but he takes out, in the end, \$246,000. Could there be a finer testimonial to the value of sincere friendship?

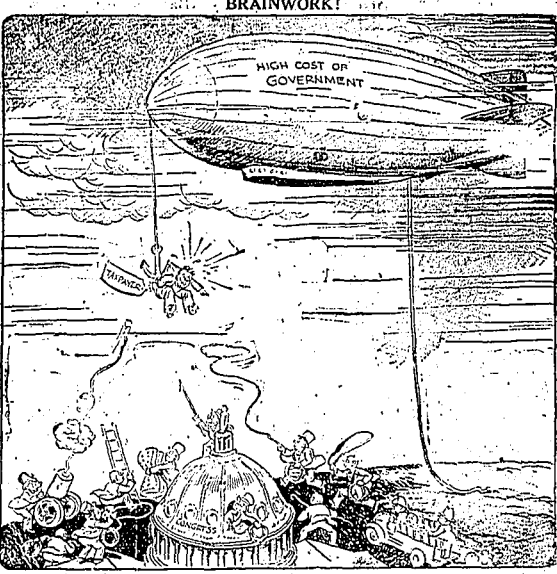
Nor does that incident stand alone. A friend meets him at a banquet in Atlantic City and suggests his participation in an oil stock pool. Mayor Jimmy thinks no more about it; later, he finds that his friend put him in it anyway; and made \$26,000 for him.

All of this is immensely heartening. Friendship, after all, is the most precious thing on earth. It can mitigate the severities of an otherwise dull and monotonous existence, it can make a life of toil seem pleasant and refreshing, it can sustain the soul in time of need. Mayor Walker, plunked down by fate in the heart of the world's most hard-boiled city, found his way fairly cluttered up with friends. Which of us can refrain from envying him?

WHAT'S WRONG WITH THE WORLD?

COLONEL HUGH L. COOPER, president of the American-Russian Chamber of Commerce, suggests the calling of a world conference "to find out what's wrong with the world."

"It is difficult," he says, "for me to see how a disarmament conference for the limitation of land and naval forces, sitting by a lakeside; another conference on reparations, sitting somewhere else; and a conference on world banking, another on the gold standard, and another on tariffs—all at different times and places—can produce a lasting remedy for a very sick world." We all know that these problems

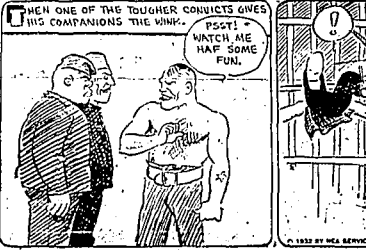
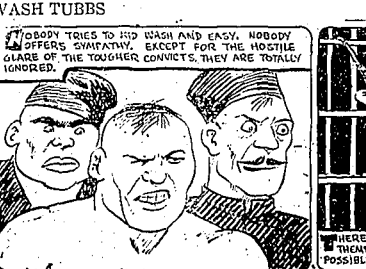
are so interdependent that we could possibly be solved separately."

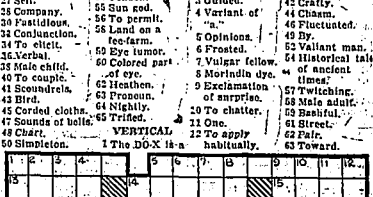

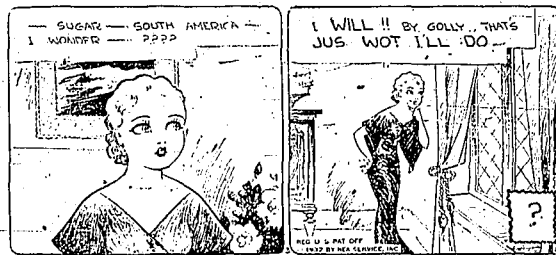
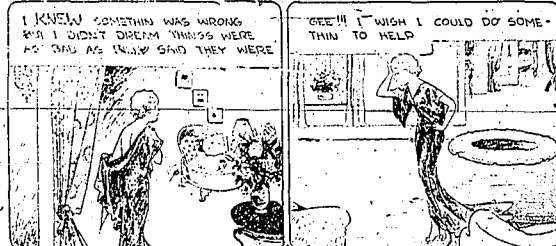
