EASTMAN BREAKS WORLD RECORDS

Stanford Star Establishes New 880-Yard, 800-Meter Marks

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — If a tape had been stretched across the quarter mile mark Ben Eastman, Stanford University track runner, might have set three new records in one race Saturday during the Pacific Athletic association meet at Golden Gate park, but he was clocked only at the 880-yard and 800-meter finish lines, so today he had to be content with world records in those distances only.

Eastman, celebrating his record-breaking performance exactly one year before he turned 21, flashed across the 880 line in 1:52 flat, one tenth of a second faster than the recognized world mark held by Sera Martin, French runner.

Then, springing on to the 800 yard track, he ran in 1:51. Otto Peltner, German star, holds the recognized record for this event in 1:51.6, and Eastman has made the race before in 1:51.3.

Slight Wind

A very slight wind blowing from the right side of the track forced him to double victory, removing any doubt that the time would be given full consideration when he applied for official recognition.

The Klein, University of California's bid for fastest human honor, also earned a sparkling 100-yard record, equalling the world mark of 10.4.

Added by his eighth mile per hour wind at his back was Rudy Morel, Stanford University sprinter, equalled Roland Leckie's time of 20.6 in the 200 meter race.

As predicted, the Olympic club's Eddie Edwards, Stanford, training 89.56 points; Stanford was second, with 55.2 points; and University of San Francisco third, with 18 points.

HITLER SHOWS HIS HAND

Germany's Fascists give the world a pretty fair idea of what Germany may expect if Hitler's crowd ever seizes power, when they mobbed the Communists in the Prussian Diet the other day, wrecking the Diet chamber while they were about it.

The mere fact that the Hitlerites in the Diet outnumbered the Communists by approximately three to one would seem to have made the violence needless; for, after all, what is the use of throwing your opponents out of the windows if you are absolutely certain to out-vote them on every issue that may be raised?

But that makes no difference to Fascism. Brutality, lawlessness and a ruthless disregard of minority rights are its catchwords. The demonstration in the Prussian Diet shows pretty clearly what Germany as a whole will be in for if Hitler's gang ever gets on top.

AN ENCOURAGING STAGE

The argument between President Hoover and Speaker Garner over the latter's proposal for federal unemployment relief marks a new stage in the discussion of the problem.

Until comparatively recently, the main issue at Washington was, Shall the federal government spend money to relieve the situation or shall it leave the problem up to the states, the cities and private charity?

Now it seems to be taken for granted that federal funds are to be used. We are witnessing now, not an argument about whether the job is to be done, but an argument about how it is to be done. This is encouraging. Details of the different plans may vary profoundly; but at least all hands seem to be agreed that some sort of plan must be passed.

THE PENALTY OF HIGH OFFICE

Now that Mayor Walker's examination by Judge Seabury has receded into the background a bit, it is possible to see that regardless of any questions as to the man's fitness for the office of mayor the whole business has re-emphasized one old but often forgotten fact—that a public official must keep his financial and business affairs above even a hint of suspicion.

What would be proper for a private citizen to do can be highly unwise for a public official. He must not only avoid corruption; he must avoid anything that remotely looks like corruption. It is not enough for him to be upright; he must see to it that no one has the slightest reason for implying that he isn't upright.

The occupant of a high office can have no "private life." That is one of the penalties of holding high office.


