

House May Vote Appropriation to Help Bonus Army

Head of Legislative Committee Attacks Veterans' Bureau

WASHINGTON, June 7.—A bill appropriating \$125,000 for assistance of the bonus marchers now encamped in Washington and for returning them to their homes after congressional adjournment was introduced today by Rep. Black, Dem., N. Y.

The bonus expeditionary force shelled all the troubles—including the question of food is being drawn from—squarely on to congress.

Henry James Wall, 70, pioneer Twin Falls settler for a quarter of a century, died at his family home at 211 Seventh avenue last night following a paralytic stroke following a fall on the porch from which he had been a sufferer for the past year.

The death was not unexpected as he suffered his second stroke last week, since which his life has been precarious in the balance.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been decided upon, awaiting word from relatives. The body lies at the White mortuary.

He is survived by his wife Mrs. Bert (Cleveland) Wall to whom he was married at Dec. 17, 1892, and by two daughters, Mrs. Beryl P. Sawyer, wife of Dr. J. E. Sawyer, Fallon, Nev., both of whom arrived here Tuesday in charge of the body.

Mr. Wall was a pioneer and president of what is now the Idaho Trust Service, located in the Perrine hotel building and since 1917, 1892, and was first attracted to the business in 1865, when he came to Twin Falls.

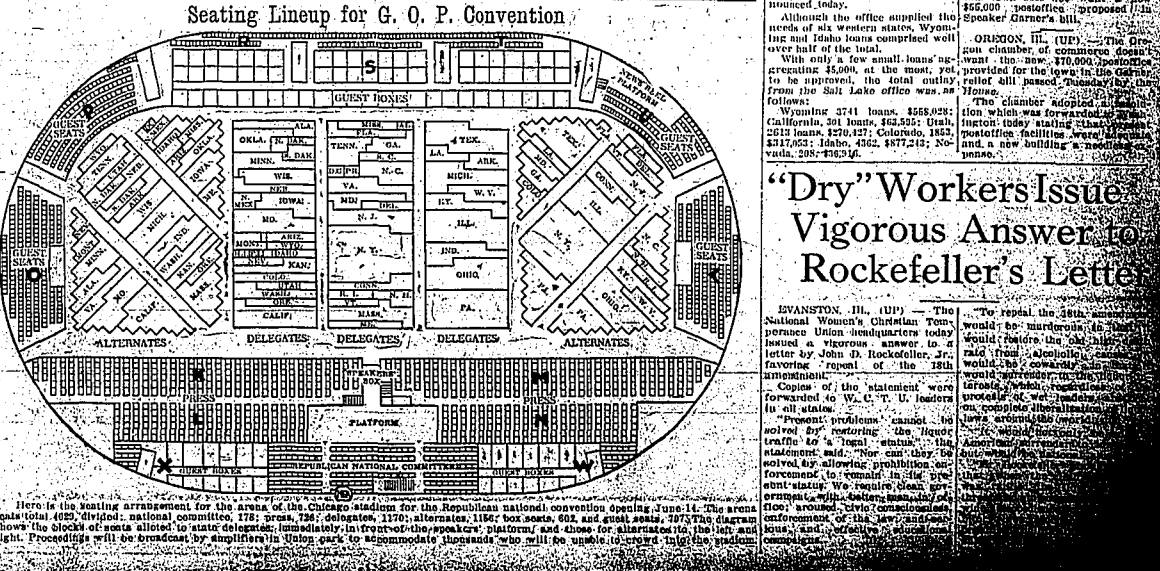

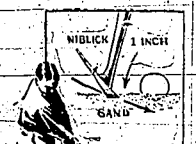

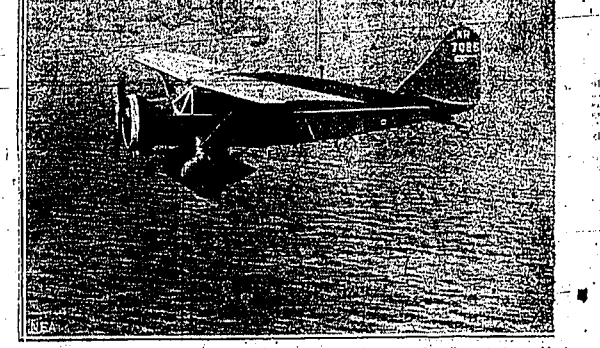

### CHILE MAY TRADE NITRAES FOR OIL

#### Socialist Government Begins Considering Exchange With Soviet

Called Press Staff Correspondent, SANTIAGO, Chile, (UP) — Chilean socialist government today is considering exchange of Chilean nitrate, the country's most important product, for Soviet petroleum.

A statement from the Ministry of Finance said that exchange includes some reconstruction plans for the Great Coat nitrate fields, formerly the financial backbone of the country, in which British and Americans are heavily interested.

There has been a recent shortage of petroleum products in Chile for weeks because foreign firms could not send money out of the country for fresh supplies.

The finance ministry statement gave the first indication of the trend of the government plans for socialization of the country.

It was decided to reorganize the central bank of Chile and to appoint a council of employees to manage the National Savings Bank.

The government announced plans to arrange funds for payment of salaries to civil employees and to meet other urgent financial obligations.

The Chilean railroads, formerly operated by the United Fruit company, will be transferred to the jurisdiction of the treasury.

The government is seeking pledges of support from various organizations, including the Society of Skilled Artisans and the Workers' Trade Union councils of Santiago and Valparaiso. There were no indications of any opposition to the plan.

Reorganization was extended to the newspaper field, with the merger of La Nacion, which was suppressed during the administration of ex-president Juan Montalvo, and another, one of the newspapers opposed to the Montalvo government. The Socialist League will have jurisdiction over the two newspapers.
