NEW YORK (UP)—Chicago's Cubs have decisively outscored Chicago's White Sox in this civic enterprise of injecting the old-time rough-and-tumble spirit into modern baseball. Recent reports from Cleveland indicated that it required four White Sox to trounce one fat, middle-aged umpire, but those fire-cracking Cubs stepped out at Brooklyn yesterday and took the entire Dodgers team, man for man, and blow for blow.

To ring the alarm it appeared that the Cubs entered at least a dozen times in the field, which indeed proved an asset in view of the Sox' questionable show at Cleveland. Drastic Plans to Check Decrease of Migratory Birds Urged at Meeting

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, (UP)—Drastic measures to check the alarming decrease of migratory birds—particularly ducks and geese—were considered today at a convention of the Western Association of Fish and Game commissioners.

Declamation of swamp lands—the natural habitat of ducks—duck epidemics which have claimed tens of thousands and increased number of hunters have taken a tremendous toll of migratory birds. Speckler said the situation had reached the point where it was a question of conservation or extinction.

Ways and means of raising money to finance conservation projects aroused New York, president of the more game birds of America foundation, favored a tax of one cent on each shot gun shell.

J. Dale Greer, president of the California game commission, told the convention that the depletion of game resources had been least but not sane.

Fortunes have been expended to convert natural duck feeding and breeding grounds into agricultural land, he pointed out. The result is that we now have a huge, overproduction of farmed products and a deplorable scarcity of ducks.

The convention will close tonight with a banquet.

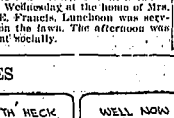
