Leaves By Airplane For Democratic Convention at Chicago

"NO SECOND CHOICE" FOR HEAD OF TICKET

Insists Californians Will Not Waver in Support of House Speaker

LOS ANGELES, (UP) — William Gladstone McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury and his father-in-law, President Woodrow Wilson, left here today by airplane for Chicago to help lead the California delegation to the national Democratic convention in London, England, pledged to support Speaker John Garner, who today formally came out for repeal of the 18th amendment.

McAdoo, for years an ardent dry, recently came out in favor of a referendum on the prohibition question and followed this by the announcement, yesterday, that he was a candidate for the Democratic nomination for United States senator from California.

He repeated before he left today that the California delegation had no second choice for a presidential elector, although he would not admit any idea of voting for anyone but Garner regardless of what turned up at the convention. It was assumed the delegation would decide on a second choice in Chicago in an event nomination of Garner seemed impossible after a reasonable vote for repeal of the 18th amendment.

McAdoo left here at 5:30 A. M. just a half hour before Garner's announcement for repeal of the 18th amendment.

President Joins In Hurried Move To Pacify Borah

Republican Platform Misinterpreted, Says Garfield

HOOPER SILENT

WASHINGTON, (UP) — Charges that Senator Borah "totally misinterpreted" the Republican prohibition plank when he asserted it counseled repeal of the 18th amendment were made today by James R. Garfield, chairman of the Republican resolutions committee at last week's convention.

In view of silence from the White House, Garfield's statement, made here today, was prepared to testify before a Senate subcommittee in the Cleveland (Ohio) marriage case, now regarded as the first administration answer to Borah's repudiation of President Hoover.

Garfield did not elaborate on his statement other than to say he was not surprised at Borah's views. He indicated, however, that Republicans would attempt to elucidate their prohibition plank which was inserted in a "few days" on a statement of "Receipts Campaign Plans."

Borah, powerful Republican progressive and dry leader, disrupted the Cleveland campaign plan announced by his dramatic and final declaration that he will not support Hoover or reelection of Hoover to the White House plank adopted at Chicago.

Administration leaders, striving to halt his work and to give him, had feared such a blow but hoped to avert it. They wanted an opportunity to make a promised explanation of what they meant purpose in the plank.

Night Speaker Hoover (Republican) Several lines of action remain open to the western leader, who in many previous sessions has shown the party standard and then picked it up again.

Hoover, who has the presidential campaign and devotes his energies to campaigning for his reelection, says he will not support a plank that would make a presidential candidate.

It might throw his support, or at least his vote, to some other presidential candidate.

It might head a third party, which would be a bold step, nothing in view again that this "President Hoover in the White House" plank is a "Trojan horse" to "interpret" the plank in a manner that would win back Borah.

White House Silent The White House had "no comment" on the dramatic utterances which Borah roared forth in the Senate late yesterday before the nation's attention.

President Hoover held hurried cabinet sessions in his study yesterday, recognizing that the veteran Borah's influence might be a factor in the campaign. It was assumed they would make every effort to induce him to reconvert.

But Borah's studied and voluminous attack on the administration platform, and the prohibition plank in particular, seemed to have little chance for compromise.

FESS REPLIES TO BORAH'S CHARGES

Shots Fired Into Arm Save Angler

MILWAUKEE, Wis., (UP) — It sounds picturesque and worthy of a story, but it is not. Ronald Parker, 21, deliberately shot himself twice in the chest and probably saved his life the way.

Parker was fishing in upper Lake Michigan when a five-foot rattlesnake suddenly struck with lightning speed.

Down into Parker's feet fell the snake's fangs—so deep, in fact that the rattlesnake fangs penetrated his chest.

Cool, even in this emergency, Parker pulled out a .32-caliber gun and fired the snake through the chest.

He did it to cut off his arm. His companions were far away to render help. So Parker courageously shot himself twice in the chest where the snake's fangs penetrated.

He did it to cut off the pain and to prevent the punctures and physical mutilation that his cut probably saved his life.

"The snake man then made his way to the bank where the ambulance was waiting to take him to the hospital."

Arrangements May Be Made With Railroads for Lowered Emergency Rates

WASHINGTON, (UP) — A plan to provide national transportation for veterans of the last expeditionary forces desiring to return to their homes was presented to police officials today by Rep. Haidich, Rep., Neb.

Financing of such an arrangement is provided in the Black bill, upon which Majority Leader Haidich of the House has introduced legislation if it becomes apparent that any great number of the veterans would be leaving Washington for their homes.

House Speaker Opposes Amendment, Favors New Financing for Industry

Another Outright Wet

WASHINGTON, (UP) — Speaker John Garner went on record today as an unqualified advocate of repeal of the Eighteenth amendment and for the first time took official notice of a campaign in his behalf for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Garner's position, made known in a formal statement, added another restrict set to the list of Democratic presidential candidates and indicated that the Democratic platform to be adopted in Chicago next week would contain a strong anti-prohibition plank.

The reference to prohibition was made in the course of a complete outline of Garner's views on public questions, apparently put forward as the platform upon which he will stand in his bid for the Democratic nomination.

No Excuse for Defeat This Time, Challenger Admits

50,000 Expected to Witness Bout for Championship

LONG ISLAND, L. I., (UP)—Jack Sharkey, who tossed away four chances at a world's heavyweight boxing championship, and finally handed the title to Max Schmeling on a foul, will try to bring it back to this country tonight in a bout where "fouls-don't count."

The fans hoped for some thing better than Sharkey's battle two years ago, when he hit low and sent the title to Germany. It appeared that 50,000 of them would turn out for tonight's affair, paying from \$2 to \$23 for the privilege.

They'll be packed into the new Long Island sports stadium.

Last Chance To Win Fame

"For Schmeling, the show will be his second defense of his title," says Dave G. Lallyhood as a "last stand."

The Bonafide has fortune. He wants fame. Tonight will be his last chance to win the title. But counters immediately will be a hollowed shell that there is no chance of the fight being a black-haired young Ublan.

Sharkey always has been a question mark. There is no middle course. He is either very good or very bad. He is right today, the German, Dornier, and the most coveted of all ring titles.

No Allth For Sharkey

Sharkey admits there will be no excuse. He is full, he is in the best condition of his career. And he is not a "chess" fighter. He is only a routine matter now before he wins the title.

Schmeling is so confident as Sharkey, anxious to convince fans he is not a "chess" champion. He proved that to a few when he knocked out William Strickling, Jr. last summer. But there are many who hold that Schmeling is champion because he was fouled.

The German is a slight favorite, betting commissions giving him odds of 10 to 10 (including taxes). Broadway's leading commissionaire said there was little possibility of an even money. He said the men with the big money were backing Schmeling to the limit.

The latest quotations included 2 to 1 against Schmeling, favored by a knockout, and 2 to 1 against Sharkey winning the same way.

Sharkey is expected to have at least 10,000 spectators advantage. He expects to weigh 265 1/2 pounds. While Schmeling weighs only will weigh about 175. Schmeling has the advantage in years. He is 32, while Sharkey is 22.

President William F. Carey of Madison Square Garden announced he expected a total gate of between \$200,000 and \$400,000. He said he was sure of 60,000 spectators.

Predict Jack's Win

Schmeling's contract calls for 45 per cent of the gross receipts. Sharkey is pledged 10 per cent.

Veteran fight managers predicted that Jack would try to win and depend on his superior boxing ability to win the amateur championship on the Slott canal at Atlantic.

The main bout is expected to start about 10 p. m. E. D. T. The first of the five preliminary bouts is scheduled for 8 p. m.

The fight will be broadcast over a nationwide hookup of the National Broadcasting company. There will also be a short wave broadcast for Europe.

There was a time when golfers relied solely on the explosion shot in a trap.

With the introduction of the new sandwedge, which formerly was buried and later smothered by the P. S. G. A. leading golfers employ what is known as the cut shot. This shot is executed by striking the club across the line of flight in a slicing stroke.

Tommy Armour is a master at playing this shot. He cuts under the ball, slicing a thin cushion of sand between the ball and the club-head.

To play a shot in this manner an open stance must be taken and the ball should be played off the left foot. The club is laid well back and swung across the line.

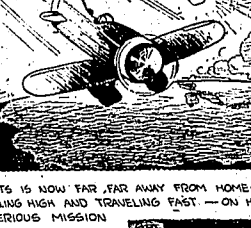
