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## PLANKEY PLANK!

Senator Borah has done the expected. Idaho Republicanism having its hands full as it is, now has, as the result of the national prohibition platform, the Senator's diatribe and a few other things quite sufficient to keep it in a stew from now until the votes are counted next November.

Senators Thomas and Congressman Smith, arch-supporters of the Hoover administration are placed in the menacing position of receiving the cross-fire. They cannot follow both the President and the Senator, and they are now candidates for reelection on the lately adopted platform of the Grand Old Party which contains a modification clause which they heretofore have strongly opposed, not even countenancing thoughts of a referendum.

Now Borah withers this great document by denouncing it and its framers because it is too wet, while Nicholas Murray Butler, in a ringing statement says the plank and as well as the platform itself should be repudiated.

He says 37 of the 97 delegates from New York were office-holders and upward of 400 of the convention's delegates were officeholders, which he describes as "repugnant to Republican traditions." Well he ought to know.

Borah continues by saying he had been deluged with telegrams from all over the country, the general tenor of which is: "We're through. No matter what the Democrats do, it can't possibly be as bad as what the Republicans have done."

And the university president, stern Republican mind you, adds this: "The Democrats appear to have a wealth of material for the presidency and there is a dearth of leaders in our own. Twenty-five years ago we had all the talent. Now the Democrats have it all."

The plank adopted at Chicago was sired by mud-headed out of cowardice. Instead of having gotten out of the prohibition muddle, we are only deeper in than ever."

Borah maintains on the other hand that the plank spells the death-knell of prohibition and believes his party now is unalterably for repeal, a situation he cannot reconcile, and one which he decries.

Just how he and Mr. Butler and Mr. Hoover can get together is hard to determine. Truly the thing is a mess.

As was pointed out in these columns the day after the platform was adopted, the plank certainly is revolutionary. And what is more, the reverberations are apparently without end.

We shall presently hear more of the matter.

## A PARALLEL CASE FOR GERMANY

Probably history never exactly repeats itself, but now and then it comes close enough to give nervous shudders.

Right now students of the European situation are asking themselves: if Republican Germany is about to follow the course steered by Republican France in 1848. There are two or three little indications that it may; and, if it does, all a lover of peace can do is pray that history will repeat itself so far but no farther.

In 1848 France was a republic. Napoleon Bonaparte had been gone for more than three decades, and with him had gone—as Frenchmen saw it—all of the glory and prestige that France had had under the first empire.

So, in that year, the French elected as their president Prince Louis Napoleon, nephew of Bonaparte. The election came as a climax to a turbulent year of revolution—a year not greatly unlike that which Germany is living through now. And shortly after his election, Louis Napoleon changed France from a republic to an empire and had himself proclaimed emperor.


The emperor then led his nation into an erratic foreign policy that culminated in the Franco-Prussian War, in which France suffered a crushing defeat and almost declined to the position of a second-class power.

The parallel with modern Germany is inescapable. Germany has lost her emperor, as France had lost her Napoleon. Hard times have followed his departure. The power and the glory that the nation knew under him have flitted over the horizon. A powerful clique of army officers and aristocratic land-owners wants the monarchy restored, precisely as was the case in France in 1848.

Furthermore, it is constantly reported that the son of the ex-kaiser, the former Crown Prince William will seek the presidency of Germany shortly, with Von Hindenburg resigning to make way for him. William does not deny it. It is an open secret that the Junkers want him to.

What would happen then? Restoration of the Hohenzollern monarchy, a fight to regain the lost "place in the sun," a new war with France—the possibilities are ominous. We can only hope that in this instance history will not even come close to repeating itself.

## THREE CASES SET FOR JURY TRIAL MONDAY MORNING

Ada County Jurist To Occupy Bench In District Court Here

Three cases are scheduled to be heard in district court before a jury commencing Monday, according to the calendar. The first, Wednesday by Judge W. A. Bishcock.

As Judge Bishcock is disqualified to serve in the first case scheduled, Judges Charles F. Koenig or Ada county will serve it. It is stated that, while all cases are now subject to call, it is expected to be necessary on account of number of the cases, to waive the right to have been recently been litigated in district court actions here.

The jury will be summoned for approximately 10 o'clock Monday morning, the first case to endear being that of J. N. Matayev vs. Twin Falls Charcoal Company, Watters, Parry & Turner are attorneys for the defendant, J. N. Matayev is the company attorney. The case involves dispute over payment for tunneling work.

W. P. French et al. vs. J. W. Teller is the second case to be brought. In an attempt to recover damages alleged to have been sustained by Mrs. French in an accident, she has filed suit on October 31, 1931. Turner E. Hackman is attorney for the plaintiff. J. R. Bothwell represents the defendant. A sum of \$100 is sought, \$3000 of this being for personal injuries, alleged to have been sustained, and \$1000 for expenses incurred and for the cost of an accident which resulted in a recent trial here brought by Mrs. and Mrs. Harold Koenslak and Mr. and Mrs. French, for collection of over \$1000 in damages. The jury awarded the plaintiff \$5000 together with \$250 for injury to Mrs. Koenslak's car.

The third case on the calendar is for collection of a sum agreed due Ernest V. Mohaner et al. Payment for services is the basis of the suit. Chapman & Chapman are attorneys for the plaintiff and John W. Graham represents the defendant.

'Well Baby' and 'Pre-School' Examinations To Be Given By County Health Unit

Starting Friday, July 8, the Twin Falls county health unit will conduct a series of "well baby" and "pre-school" clinics throughout the county. The first clinic was announced Wednesday. The clinics provide for physical examination of children, but no treatment is given. The unit officials recommend corrections by family physicians.

These clinics are in line with the health unit's policy of making unusually successful in past years. Dr. George Hiley, head of the unit; Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, and Miss Helen Johnson, nurses. Clinics will be conducted at several centers over the county, to be announced later. Registrations for the examinations may be made at the county health unit office, 100 Main Street. Registration in each community will be unopposed.

All infants of the county and children up to age 5 years are eligible for these free examinations.
