Relief Bill Defended in Senate

Prominent Ohioan Breaks Silence As New Yorkers Express More Confidence

Author of Measure To Help Unemployed Raps Hoover Claims

Bond Issue Helps To Balance Budget, Wagner Avers

LISTS BENEFITS WASHINGTON, (UP)—Senator Robert Wagner, Dem., N. Y., today vigorously defended the Senate unemployment relief bill and branded President Hoover's criticism of it as "absolutely unfounded."

"I declared to the Senate that Mr. Hoover was 'casting the light and truth, obstinately resisting the persuasion of fact and logic, and continuing in the despair which is all too prevalent.'"

Wagner is the author of the \$2,000,000 Senate relief program. He spoke shortly after he and other Senators and House conferees had considered the first session on the House of whipping the bill into final form and adjourning it with the Hoover program passed by the House.

"He has to be charged," the speaker said in reply to yesterday's statement in which Mr. Hoover said the \$2,000,000 public works bond issue provision was "a mere farce and a device to divert public attention from the real cause of unemployment."

Wagner said the bond issue would not unbalance the budget. "On the contrary," he said, "it helps to balance it and to reduce the very heavy burden of current taxation by cancelling the \$175,000,000 of permanent improvements."

Noting that Mr. Hoover approved the proposal to expand the Reconstruction corporation's borrowing power by \$1,000,000 to finance self-helping public and private construction, Wagner declared that the bill would not unbalance the budget.

"It is the contrary," he said, "it helps to balance it and to reduce the very heavy burden of current taxation by cancelling the \$175,000,000 of permanent improvements."

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CONGRESS RECORD UNPARALLELED IN NATION'S HISTORY

Lawmakers Vote Fundamental Economic Legislation in War on Depression

SESSION MARKED BY NUMEROUS BATTLES

Reconstruction Finance Corporation Feature of Federal Program

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The Congress now about ready to adjourn has completed an unprecedented program of basic economic and fiscal legislation.

It has been accused on many sides of smothering liberal and alienating politics. Numerous sharp critics have marked the session, however, the present Congress, in its efforts to stimulate business, job unemployment and put the government's finances in order, has passed more fundamental economic legislation than any previous Congress.

Best of Deduction of Debt

Last December Congress approved the war debt moratorium which has since then been extended a year ago to alleviate a world-wide financial crisis. In approving the moratorium, Congress said it would not tolerate any reduction or cancellation of war debts due this country.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation, capitalized at \$2,000,000,000 as directed by federal credit to bolster banks, railroads and industry, was pushed through House and Senate in fast time and set in operation at the end of January.

Adopt Credit Features

The Glass-Steagall bill for expansion of the federal reserve credit system was the second domestic economic reorganization measure. It was closely followed by the act establishing an agriculture credit corporation to aid in farm financing.

The Senate early in the session declined to pass the La Follette-Connally bill carrying \$375,000,000 for loans to states for the relief of distress. Debate on the measure continued almost three weeks.

Efficient Relief Program

Persistent agitation for further relief led to the drafting of a \$2,000,000,000 program by a committee of Senate Democrats. At the same time Speaker Garner of the House introduced a bill carrying an equal amount.

AUTHORITIES READY FOR EMERGENCIES

Waters, who led the first detachment of veterans here from Portland, Ore., in the unsuccessful struggle for bonus legislation, refused to carry on further when he found his orders disobeyed and the expedition openly rebelling at his commands.

Recruits Veterans

Mrs. James Huey, 32, arrived by airplane from Pittsburgh and announced she had recruited 50 families of veterans who also said, would leave by motor truck next Tuesday to join the bonus army.

EXPLAINS STAND

CLEVELAND, O. (UP)—Newton D. Baker broke his political silence today with an attack against Roosevelt forces to abrogate the century-old two-thirds rule of nominating Democratic presidential candidates.

The former secretary of war, whose name has been mentioned prominently in the Democratic presidential nomination race, said in a formal statement here today which he termed the two-thirds rule "a rule that has made and kept the Democratic party a national party."

Seems Majority Plan

"A nomination procedure from a majority voting rule, such as that established by tradition of the party would be deeply embarrassing both to the party and to the candidate," Baker said.

"Sensitive men would find it difficult to defend a candidate who started out with a moral flaw in his life."

The complete statement read: "Every member of the Democratic party who knows its traditions and is proud of its history, have a duty to protest against the proposed amendment of the two-thirds rule at Chicago. That rule has made and kept the Democratic party a national party."

Prevents Sectional Bids

"It has prevented the favoring of sectional candidates against the will of respectable minorities and if the rule is ever changed, it ought not to be by a convention elected under it or in the interest of any particular section or candidate.

The Democrats of the United States have selected and instructed their delegates to Chicago in the expectation that the two-thirds rule would apply. Our representatives at Chicago have no right to change that rule after we have instructed our delegates.

WALL STREET UNMASKED... It is too bad that the recent rush of political news has kept the Senate committee's stock market investigation from getting much attention.

The ordinary mortal, to whom the whole field of stock market speculation is pretty much a foreign country, may not be able to follow the ins and outs of things very closely.

It is the peculiar virtue of this Senate investigation that not only those men, but the practices in which they engaged, are being revealed to the country now in the proper light.

We are discovering—that we should have known all along—that the whole Wall Street process is simply an exceedingly complicated and slightly unreliable machine, from which, if you are smart enough to pull the right levers, streams of gold can be made to gush.

The men who pull these levers properly are not doing anything for the nation. They are not, and never have been, engaged in building up the country's industry, fostering its trade, buttressing its prosperity.

It is becoming more obvious every day that a lot of our troubles now stem directly from the orgy of stock speculation of recent years.

SPECULATION

An interesting feature comes to light in a study of the abstract of votes of the late state primary election. Before the returns were officially announced, it will be recalled the Republican organization laid claim to a 10,000 lead in the vote for Defenbach over Ross, which claim on the official canvass was brought down to a lead of only 3,443 votes for the former state treasurer.

Carrying on a study of the Ross vs. Defenbach vote, the abstract as reported by Fred E. Lukens, secretary of state, shows that he and W. W. Deal, candidates for nomination to that office received a combined vote of 49,636, whereas Mr. Defenbach received only 43,644. In other words Defenbach ran 5,992 votes behind his ticket!

On the other hand, the combined Democratic vote for secretary of state, where there were three aspirants for the nomination: Bossen, Girard and Gobie, totalled 34,587 votes, whereas the Ross vote was 40,201, running unopposed. Ross thus lead his ticket by 5,614 votes!

One can make whatever deductions he cares to from this, but it is highly significant. Important too, is the fact that all the interest created by the contests for the Democratic senatorial and congressional nominations, failed to bring out as many votes for those offices as did Ross. The combined vote for the five senatorial candidates was only 39,725, and the total ballots cast for the five Democratic congressional aspirants was only 23,799, which was fewer by 16,402 than the Ross vote!

Since all we have to do between now and election is to speculate on what the results shall be, the foregoing is offered as a means of providing such diversionement over the week-end.

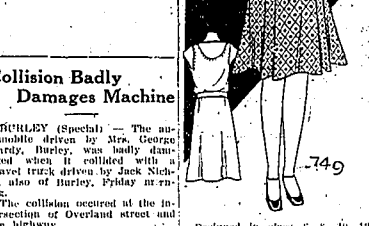
