# Waters and Crippled Leader Held When Shouting Through Clamors at Congress' Doors

 WASHINGTON, (UP)  
 — Thousands of World  
 war veterans marched on  
 the United States Capitol  
 today in the tumultuous

bonus demonstration.  
Cheering, shouting men  
clamored at the doors of  
Congress and at times  
gave indications of get-  
ting out of control. The  
police held Walter W.

Waters, commander of the bonus forces to enforce their demand that the veterans clear the plaza.

Atty. General, the capped the march, whose theme, "We have maintained a Capitol, we watch of veterans marching back and forth in front of the Capitol since 1920," also was the "temporary curfew" as the leaders ordered the veterans away from the steps of the Capitol.

**Refused at White House**

In the meantime an effort of leaders to enter the White House under their light directly to President Hoover was frustrated. A White House today.

Everett saw Theodore Tilton, one of the President's secretaries, who told him, the President was too busy to see him.

Everett said he and Waters wanted to present the President with a petition asking that Congress merely recess rather than adjourn, to permit an early reconvening for consideration of the bonus demands.

Everett was frankly disappointed at the failure of his effort to see Mr. Hoover, but stated that the A. F. of W. was planning

Extend Time Limit  
Asked whether he would pick the White House he said: "I don't think so—that would not be dignified."  
In the meantime, the President signed a House resolution extending the time limit under which the veterans' pay could be reduced. The House bill was supported by the federal government.
