CHICAGO, (UP)—The major league baseball season ends in a month from today and the Cubs will not have a chance to pitch against the Chicago Cubs and 14 of the National League's 25 teams at home. The Cubs were 3-1 favorites to win the pennant as they met the Brooklyn Dodgers in the second game of their important series today.

The Cubs rolled a natural in the opening game yesterday by beating the Brooklyn 7-1, and gaining a full game and the third-place Pirates as well as the second-place Dodgers.

Selects Ray Bush.
Guy Bush, the warthy Mississippian who had his name handled there recently, as a race-track gambler in the so-called investigation, was selected by Manager Charlie Grimm to pitch for the Cubs today.

With Hack Wilson, the Dodgers' cleanup hitter, having a bad case of third-stagers at the plate yesterday, the Cubs' triumph was made easy, Wilson, one-time World Series champion, was out of the line.

were injured by a rain of shot and stones, and by broken glass from the windows of their car.

Strikers held the car. The strikers fell upon them when their car, carrying some of the men on the running board, was forced by a stalled machine to a stop in the middle of the street.

More than three thousand persons, including many women and children, watched the strikers disregarding the choking gas, rushed the car, hurling sticks and stones against the windows.

Struck by Missiles. The officers were shelled by broken glass and thrust missiles. Their own eyes streaming from the effects of the gas pouring in through the shattered windows, the men finally succeeded in starting their car and disappeared into the night amid the jeers of strikers.

The injured were: Lieut. Col. Henry C. Hall, chemical warfare officer of the Iowa national guard, who accompanied the officers because of his knowledge of the use of tear gas; Hall suffered two lacerations on the head.

Clearly outnumbered by the pickets, Sheriff Lalor and his men gave up further attacks and retired within the city limits. There, during the early morning hours, many arrests of striking farmers were made.

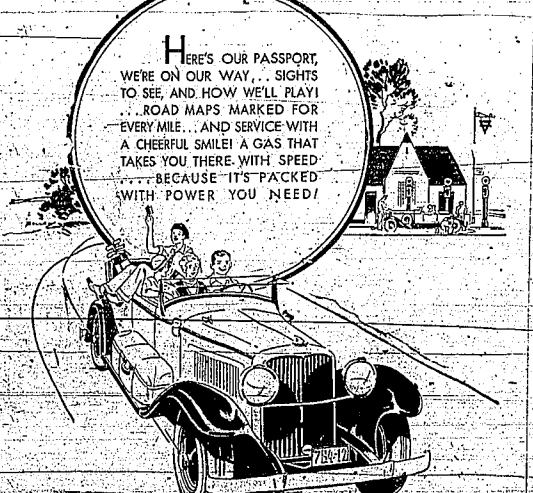
