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LIBERTY OR DESPOTISM? by MERLE THORP Editor "Nation's Business"

Liberty, as our forefathers conceived it, was not only to escape from the overlordship of King George and the British Parliament. It meant release from any kind of governmental authority which interfered with their individual right to work out their own destinies.

Liberty, even in the setting of a later day, remains the same. Professor Sumner, of Yale, said of it: "If we try to formulate a true definition of liberty to words which the development of political institutions is all the time tending, it would be this: 'Civil liberty is the status of a man who is guaranteed by law and civil institutions the exclusive employment of all his powers for his own welfare.'"

"The long struggle for human liberty is essentially a battle against governmental power to acquire and maintain certain individual rights, for liberty is nothing but the sum of these rights. Among the most important is the right of acquisition and conservatism, against the unlimited claims of governmental power."

Liberty and despotism stand at opposite poles and it has taken seven hundred years to shift the ground of government from one to the other. During all that time progress has been in the direction of clipping the wings of sovereignty and expanding and safeguarding the right of the individual to live his own life in his own way so long as he did not violate the same rights of other individuals.

Much of our modern slang is so rampant to heat but for crisp conciseness and clarity of meaning, some of it is remarkably fitting.

We have observed a great deal of usage of the expression, "So what?" Doesn't that express pretty clearly a satiric and sophisticated disinterest? And doesn't the querulous tone of it sound a sharp note of playful ridicule which is one of the most efficacious methods of terminating an argument quickly?

The world's always been an interesting study. It seems that there has always been, for instance, a popular and imperative slang exclamation, meaning "Go!" Nowadays the words are "Scram!" "Sneak!"
