ship of Legion to a powerful line of political party—first by favoritism, then by monopoly and then by buying monopolies,

the condition of unemployment and unequal distribution of the rewards of industry. It is need for Legionsmen and all others to get into politics to restore the sway of American in its pure, unaffected form, which will apply tested old doctrines to new conditions. We have too long been trying to put new wine into old bottles.

Political Duty
"I urge Legionsmen and all others to make their voices heard in open meeting stations, to enroll and enlist in the conflict for civic justice and civic rights, and to do their duty. I know it is the cardinal principle of the Legion to confrontation."

Legionsmen should not permit its great influence to be used to advance the fortunes of any political party. Present legislation is not justified as a justified indication from political duty."

"Recent events have Legion leaders at Legion posts since the allegation that they have been utilized to secure legislation for themselves, their families and themselves, while caring little about the larger claims of citizenship."

Legislation Under Fire

"Legislation for the benefit of veterans is under fire. The aim of the Legion is to see that it is not tampered with, but that it is not tampered with by some other officials, who should take the lead to demand that the legislation be passed, which veterans secure both pensions for disability and salary for service rendered, and every cent for veterans' benefits must be touched by favoring discrimination."




