Yanks Win Title By Beating Cubs 13-6 Yesterday

New York Makes It Four Straight Over Rivals

CHICAGO (UP)—The New York Yankees are once more monarchs of the baseball world series which began from the sublime to the ridiculous.

The Yanks won in a breeze in their straight game, leaving the Cubs dazed and bewildered by the greatest exhibition of power in the 29 years of world series play.

It was the third time in six years the Yanks had won the world championship in four straight games without a defeat or tie, and enabled them to hang on the parallel record of 12 straight triumphs in world series competition. The Yanks previously had won the 1927 and 1928 world series from the Pirates and Cardinals, respectively, in four straight games.

Outlining down the last, Cub pitcher, the Yankees won their fourth straight game, beating the Cubs 13-6 yesterday. The Yanks had won the 1927 and 1928 world series from the Pirates and Cardinals, respectively, in four straight games.

The Yanks rolled up a total of 37 runs in the four games, the largest total ever made by any team in the world series. The Philadelphia Athletics scored six runs in the games in winning from the Cubs in 1910. The score number—26—was made by the Cincinnati Reds in 1919.

The Cubs were not quite as bad on the Yanks made look when Lou Gehrig's boy was hitting his all-over, the pitcher, Ernie, the Cubs looked under the Yanks' fire, they bunched under the strain and went into a non-existent game.

A total of 131,000 persons were attracted to see the series, and they saw one of the finest games of the series, which covered every out in a baseball hit. The Yanks' total home runs came within one of tying their own record.
