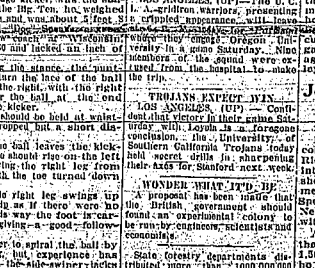

FIRE PREVENTION A DISEASE.

A single case of a contagious disease finds the community in arms to prevent its spread. Health rules and sanitary regulations are immediately enforced with great strictness. Individuals cooperate with those in authority to remove the danger. The quarantine sign is respected.

Last year the disease known as "fire waste" wiped out about 10,000 lives, and destroyed nearly a half-billion dollars worth of property.

"What a frightful thing it would be if an epidemic of a storm or some deadly pest were to claim 10,000 lives of our men, women and children," remarked officials of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, which is made up of 229 stock fire insurance companies earnestly endeavoring to reduce the loss of life and the fire waste. We would be staggered by such a catastrophe. Yet in the short span of twelve months the same awful result is seen, and because the fires are scattered and the victims are here and there and everywhere, the frightfulness of the situation is not yet imprinted upon the consciousness of the people.

The greatest number of fires occur between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning. Of forty-two fires causing losses of \$2,000 or more, twenty-one occurred between the hours of two and five o'clock in the morning. It is evident that the larger number of fires occur when human vigilance is at its lowest ebb, and fire insurance companies recommend increased effort on the part of those whose duty it is to watch over the slumbering cities, greater care in the operation of heating plants, and the installation of automatic devices to report fires to headquarters.

"Fires so often tell the story of 'bad housekeeping,' lax discipline, disregard of fundamental precautions and neglect of frequent inspections which should take place in every institution," says Alfred T. Fleming of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, "that they may well be regarded as implying some lack of business efficiency."

Dwelling houses have shown an alarming increase in frequency of fire rate. Individuals who practice good fire prevention and protection should use their influence to secure good practices on the part of their neighbors. Only by cooperation of individuals with each other and with authorities can the vicious disease of "fire waste" be abated.

Every club, society, and institution should lend a hand as well as every group. Don't be content to relax your efforts at the end of Fire Prevention Week—keep up the good work throughout the year.

SAFETY ON THE RAILROADS

A statistician has just made a detailed study of American railway accidents, and he told the National Safety Council Congress the other day that the way things stand today the American citizen has exactly one chance in 37,500,000 of being killed in a train wreck.

In 1930, for instance, only seven passengers were killed on American railroads. This, incidentally, makes quite a sharp contrast with conditions ten years ago, when 76 were killed in one year.

This magnificent record of safety is a thing, that we have come to take for granted, and it is only when we stop to think of the enormous volume of railroad traffic, the stupendous number of passengers carried annually and the vast complexity of the constant movement of high-speed trains over a network of railway lines that we can realize what a really remarkable achievement the railroad men have in their credit.

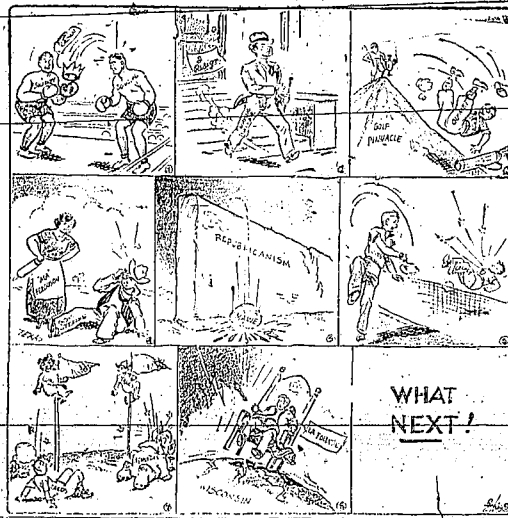

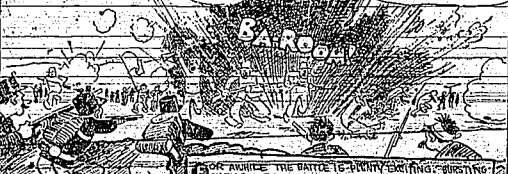
The chairman held his tongue, who he claimed, had not once during the past three years with a successful plan to fight the depression.

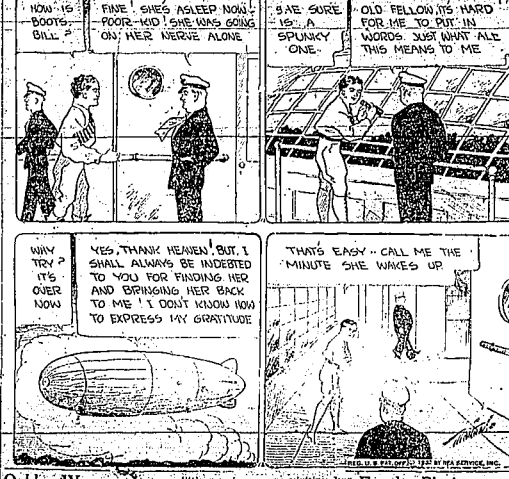
