## DAVIDSON WILL MENTOR CADETS

Former Army Player to Succeed Major Gasse as Head Grid Coach

**MILITARY POINT**, N. Y. (UPI)—Lieutenant Garrison H. Davidson, former Army player and present grid coach, will succeed Major Gasse as head coach of the cadets at the military academy next year. Davidson is only 21 and a second-year cadet, but is the youngest man and the youngest ever elected in charge of Army football. **WHEN FAME FADES**

One of the most interesting developments of this period has been the way in which certain great reputations have been deflated. Painful as they have been, the years of hardship have at least succeeded in opening the public's eyes.

There is, for example, Samuel Insull.

Just at the moment Mr. Insull has run on some uncommonly hard luck, and the indictment returned against him is no part of the deflationary process mentioned above. His fall was quite as spectacular before the grand jury acted; it will remain so regardless of the outcome of the criminal proceedings which have been instituted.

The point is that until comparatively recently Mr. Insull was one of those public characters on whose words men hung with bated breath. He was a builder, a doyen, fantastically rich man, a master of men and machines and finance.

And then, all of a sudden, we discovered that he was human after all. He became helpless in the current of the depression just as ordinary men became helpless. The financial acumen, the foresight, the skill with which he had built up his industrial empire had served merely to erect a top-heavy edifice which went down with a terrible crash when a stiff gale blew.

Now all of this does not mean that it is up to the ordinary citizen to sit back and cower existently over a great financier's downfall. What it does indicate is that during the prosperous years we got into the habit of over-estimating the value of financial jiggery. If a man was able to tie holding companies together in an endless chain we acclaimed him as an industrial wizard. We assumed that our greatest men won those who knew how to do the most tricks with money and credit.

We are getting a new light on things now. The collapse of the Insull chain shows that this business of pyramid-building and interlocking industrial securities is strictly a fair-weather game. Its leaders are not quite the giants we supposed. An oracle needs some recommendation other than the fact that he has been able to get rich by manipulating shares.

**WHAT PRICE FOOTBALL?**

The full football season is still young, but already reports of future injuries on the playing field are beginning to come in. The reports are inexpressibly saddening. The lads who give up their lives are such fine chaps, and their sacrifice is so needless.

Football is a good game; a good game to play and a good game to watch. There must be some way of safeguarding it so that we will not have to face these horrible casualty lists every fall. The game itself is too good to throw away, but the price we are paying for it these days, in fatalities and in serious injuries, is far too high.

Last fall the rules committee adopted new regulations to make the game safer. It is a bit early, just now, to say whether these regulations are going to be as effective as we had hoped. If they are not, the rules committee must try again.

**TAX RELIEF AT HOME**

With both President Hoover and Governor Roosevelt insisting that one of the most pressing problems of the day is the lightening of the real property tax load on the individual citizen, the citizen's chances for real relief begin to look brighter than they have in years.


