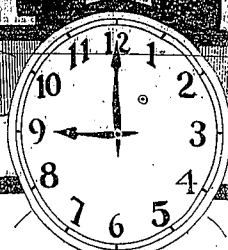

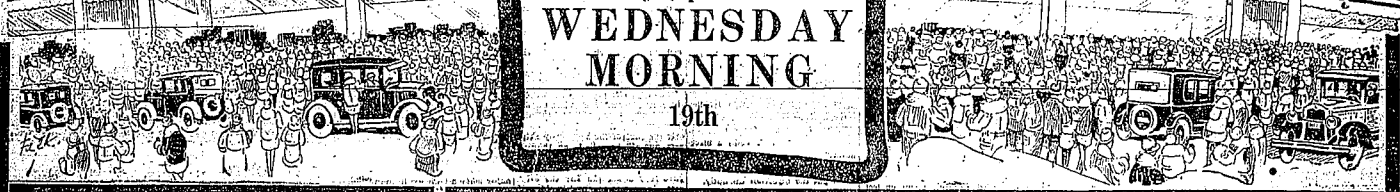

RICHES AND WORRY

The late Edith Rockefeller McCormick, daughter of the world's richest man, paid two private detectives an average of \$74 a month to guard her during a period of more than eight years.

Great riches, apparently, have their drawbacks; among them, the fact that the very wealthy person can never be really carefree. As far as anyone knows, Mrs. McCormick had no more enemies than any ordinary woman—which is about equal to saying that she had none at all. But she felt obliged to retain two guards all the time. AN EXAMPLE FOR INDUSTRY

BRITAIN'S WALL GOES UP

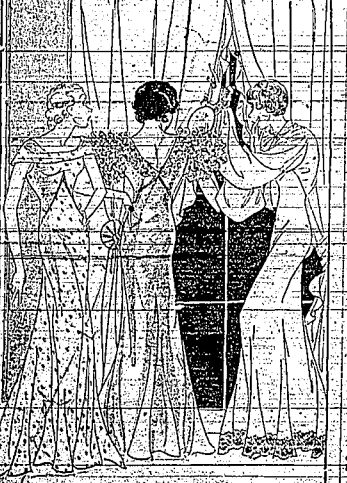

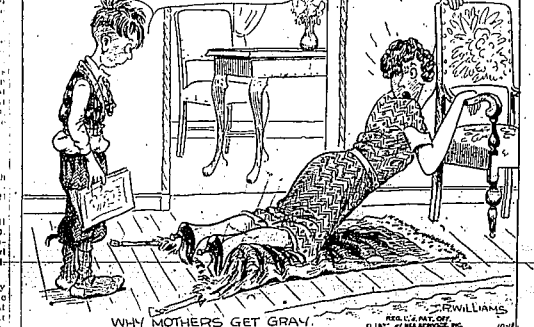

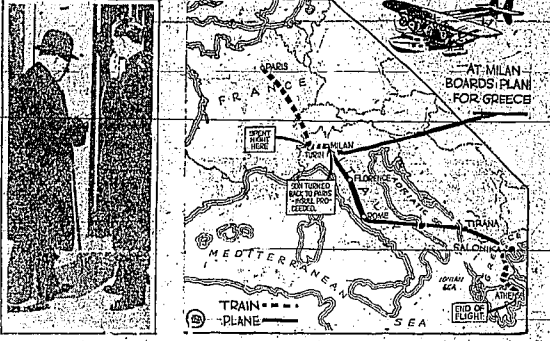
