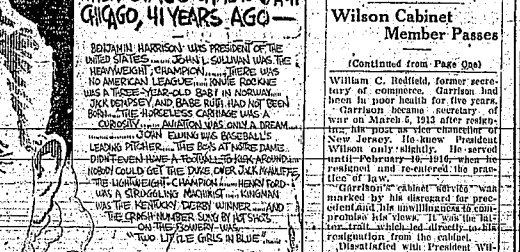

"CONGRESSMAN" COFFIN
Twin Falls is host today to the mayor of Pocatello, who, though he comes here on a political mission, is welcome, despite the fact this is the home-town of Addison Smith, his erstwhile adversary.

But Twin Falls has never taken the residence part of this congressman business very seriously anyway, recognizing that whoever serves in that capacity, is or should be, the representative of the people in all of the congressional district, regardless of their place of residence, or his residence—alert to problems of whatever character.

Twin Falls county people, as well as the other voters of this district are keenly interested in the candidacy of Mayor Coffin, for they recognize him as an individual of consequence and one with rare courage, independence and astute judgment. They are not unmindful either that with the election of Governor Roosevelt and the practical certainty of a Democratic House, as well as Senate, it will stand this district in the proverbial "good stead" to have as representative one of similar political complexion, being thus better able to serve by virtue of favorable committee appointments, and possible chairmanships—at least we have been told this during all the years that Republicans had control of the Congress.

Also, Mr. Coffin is invading a hotbed of Democracy when he comes to Twin Falls county, where a waste-no-words-for-us-campaign, and a whole-hearted knock-out, has been going on since anyone dares to touch his head for political preference; where we not only had supplied the Republican candidate for congress, but kicked through with two good Democratic aspirants and an equally capable candidate for the United States senatorial nomination; a county which will cast an overwhelming majority for the Democratic ticket next month; and in addition the home town of the Republican state chairman who in a moment of expansiveness recently asserted that Hoover was sweeping the east and would likewise sweep the west, the state of Idaho, and anything else one might wish-sweep.

STAGG LEASES THE FIELD
That part of the country which is interested in football—which is to say, practically everybody—is beyond doubt truly sorry to learn that Alonzo Stagg is in his last season as head coach at the University of Chicago.

Of all the coaches in the land, Stagg is probably the most deeply admired. And the admiration he has won, it seems to us, is of an exceptionally worthwhile kind.

Stagg is not famous as a "winning coach." He has turned out some great stars and some great teams; but there are plenty of coaches who have far better winning records. Stagg has won popular affection not so much because of what he can do as because of what he is.

The acclaim that greets him is simple, the public's way of showing that it moves him to be an exceptionally fine man to have a bunch of boys under his wing every fall, whether he teaches them football or ping-pong. The boast that football "builds character" comes closer to truth in Stagg's case than anywhere else.

BEER "REAL" AT 3 PER CENT
When the last Congress was urged to modify the Volstead act to permit the sale of beer of 2.75 per cent alcoholic content, a number of ardent wets opposed the move on the ground that such beer would not be "real" beer, and hence would not satisfy the fondles of thirsty men. It was suggested, that, to be palatable, to be loved, beer should be brewed in must contain not less than 3 or 4 per cent of alcohol.

Now comes Colonel Jacob Ruppert, formerly one of the country's leading brewers, to explain that the best beer in the old days had an alcoholic content of just 3 per cent.

The proposed 2.75 per cent beer would fall short of that, but not so far short as a lot of people have thought. And even the 3 per cent variety, it is safe to say, would fall below the kicking capacity of most of the needed airy beer that gets on the market these days.

It cannot be repeated too often that it is necessary to be registered in Idaho for the election next month. But those who did not vote on either of those occasions, or did and have moved from their precincts without having re-registered since should make sure that their names are written there.

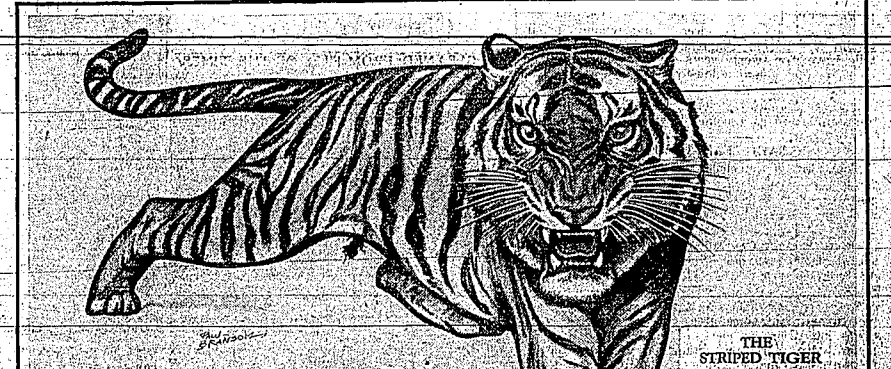

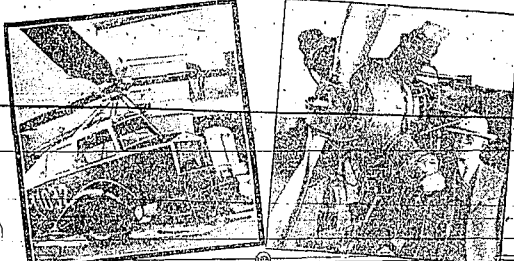

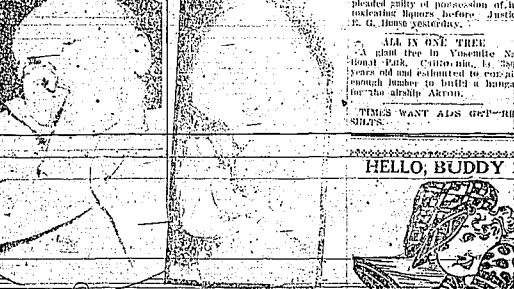
