HOOPER AT DETROIT
When Candidate Hoover in his Detroit speech Saturday night placed Republicanism as the test for Americanism, he thereby committed the gravest error with which he can be charged, and alienated that great element of people who still believe in two-party government which is the tradition of the United States.

Enthusiasm as to the encouragement he received at Des Moines and at Cleveland, he has become over-bold in his attacks on the Democrats, including the party's national nominees and the Congress, and now seems to lay at the feet of the latter responsibility for the ills of the nation's business as well as the unbalanced federal budget.

He reiterated the dubious contention that the economic battle had been won, and again laid the blame for the depression's origin outside the United States. He said national recovery was underway.

Things persons fail to see the logic of the statement on one hand that the depression is of foreign origin and on the other, that it has been cured by the national Republican administration. Surely, if it is true that we are suffering from a world-wide depression over which we have no control, as has been drummed into our ears since the start of the campaign, it is amazing that a political party can now claim credit for having effectually stopped it without at least taking some steps, such as Governor Roosevelt suggests, and Senator Birch suggests, in foreign trade, restore our commerce, and in the solution of the disarmament and war debt problems, hold an economic conference, restore silver to its rightful place, and eliminate the causes of the costly tariff reprisals—in fact get at the roots of this so-called world-wide situation, instead of putting ourselves on the back, and being content with such temporary and wholly inadequate measures as the Reconstruction Finance corporation. At its best, this latter measure can merely act as a stimulant to the weak heart of the sick nation, without accomplishing the painful but necessary operation which will effect a cure.

Mr. Hoover as a politician is far off indeed at Detroit in the denunciation of his opponents, stooping to the tactics of wild politics. Manifestly this will not serve to endear him to any greater degree to the hearts and minds of the American public.

Were his reasoning sound, his arguments might be unanswerable, but when any party in these United States gets to the point where its leaders seriously contend that it and it alone possesses all the ability and fitness to preserve our traditional Americanism, then Democracy is in a sad state. But only if there is not a majority of the people willing to disprove such contention, as there is at this time.

And they are waiting for the opportunity to wobble hence.

A VANISHING ARMY
The most obvious things are, very often the things that we can never quite accept; and one of them is the very self-evident fact that time passes and makes all things grow old.

We know this, of course, just as we know that the sun will set tomorrow, but we do not accept it emotionally, until something happens that makes us realize that it really is so, we get an odd, reasonless little shock.

Not long ago the newspapers announced that Ellsworth Post of the Grand Army of the Republic, at Union City, N. J., has been disbanded because it has only two surviving members, one of whom is too feeble from old age to have many more meetings. Once this post was the largest G. A. R. post in New Jersey, as recently as 30 years ago it had 70 members. But it is done for now, and only two very old men remain.

Now news of this kind is extremely common these days. The North and South are the Mason-Dixon line, the main line of demarcation in the Civil War is fading, gradually, every year. A few years ago they were numerous and in a few more years the best of them will be gone; but that, after all, is natural and inevitable as the change of this season. Why should it be so?

Perhaps it is because we can never get used to the fact that change is the first law of life. We look back on those tragic, heroic days of the war between the states and see a sort of pagan, fixed-in-history.

The survivors we know as gray-bearded and stooped old men; they link us with the past, but we cannot realize that they were once as bright and straight as the main line of demarcation today. They may mention old history books; they may say that our backbone is getting weaker, but we never realize that they are all to vanish; that we can realize that once they were young and very and ardent.

But they grow old and we shall do the same, and in a few years it will be the American Legion posts that are gradually dropping out of existence, because no more members survive; and our grandchildren will blink wistfully, making the discovery that time is inevitable.

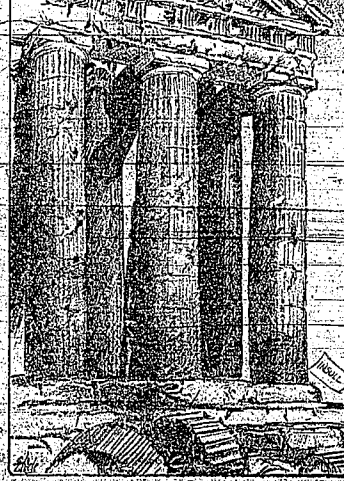
