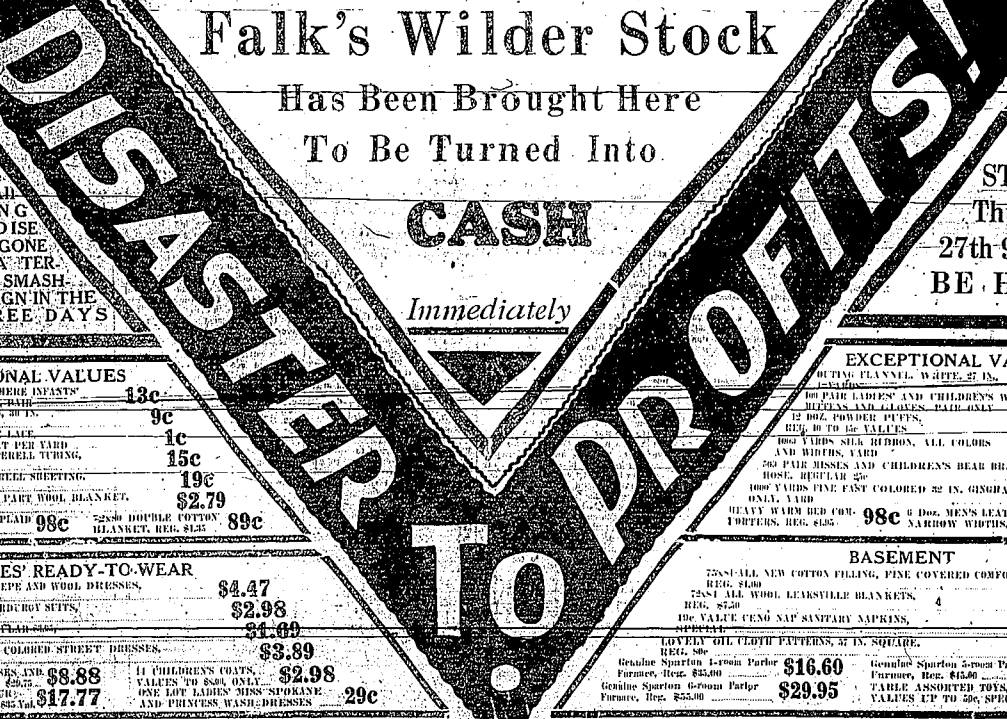

Defenders of Byron Defenbach, Republican candidate for governor, charge that he is being defamed because his opponents have chosen to hold him responsible for statements the G. O. P. nominee made at Lewiston in regard to the Guman case.

It appears Defenbach not only said that the Guman highway equipment fraud trial at Lewiston involved 'the arguments of a shyster lawyer to an ignorant jury,' but that he wrote the statement out word for word!

He denies he said it, and blames the newspapers for misquoting him. His supporting press says frankly, we cannot believe Defenbach ever said any such thing.

Everyone wishes this were true. Political opponents have flown to his defense. They hold up his hands in holy horror, that any such remark would be seriously imputed to their candidate.

It isn't so, they never. T. S. Ross, the Governor, says he is to blame, they say. He hatched up this 'big lie.' To quote a Defenbach advocate: 'Defenbach's reputation is too well established, his character is too well known, to be affected by any such slanderous attack as the Governor is making.' (Defenbach is not one to speak lightly or worse of an orderly course of justice in the State courts.)

All Idaho wishes this were true, also. 'But what about the facts in the case? Who is the slanderer?' The Lewiston Tribune, morning newspaper of the northern Idaho city is no trivial publication. It was established in 1892, it is ably edited by A. L. Alford, it carries more advertising than any newspaper in the state, and in addition it has a wide circulation, an enviable reputation, and a record for reliability. Furthermore it has a competent staff.

What does the Tribune reveal? Mr. Defenbach was scheduled to speak in Lewiston the night of September 27, and as is customary, he prepared an advance copy of his remarks.

The Evening Times has an advance copy of Byron Defenbach's speech at Lewiston on Sept. 27 as prepared by Mr. Defenbach and issued by him to the Tribune and Associated Press.

Quoting from this prepared statement is the following paragraph, among others: 'The investigation of the highway department and of the endowment funds have been of the grandstand variety, tending to raise prejudice in the voters' mind. They are not the arguments of a high-minded advocate devoted rather to truth than to success; they are the arguments of a shyster lawyer to an ignorant jury.'

According to the Tribune, Mr. Defenbach personally prepared and handed the advance copy to the Tribune; it was used as the basis for the press association stories of Defenbach's address, and furthermore the address, including the disputed paragraph, was supplied to and reproduced in full by the Lewiston News, a Republican weekly.

Let Mr. Defenbach do some more explaining. Let him deny that his 'real thoughts were not there expressed in regard to Guman, who is now behind the bars serving for crimes which went unpunished until Governor G. Ben Ross assumed the governor's chair. The facts are he sacrificed principal for politics when he condemned the prosecution.'

Let the Defenbach mouthpieces feel that he could not have said it, or hope it is true, and in their consternation seek to cast reflection instead on the chief executive who simply did his duty in running down the highway frauds which disgraced the state.

But many say well, that it must have been one other than Don Defenbach who coined the phrase to designate the attitude of the Guman prosecution: 'The arguments of a shyster lawyer to an ignorant jury!' And he it is who now seeks to fill the governor's chair. No one can seriously contend the text of his now famous address was fabricated by some foul politician. It was a typical brain-child of Defenbach, the wise-cracker. Not until it was revealed that a previous political error he had committed did he begin his creation.

Except to be apologizing for unwarranted biases against the Governor of the State of Idaho, the only reason for the foolish tactics of him and the Tribune, the friends of Defenbach, will not, doubtlessly, be only too glad to let the matter drop.

But the low appraisal they have placed upon the author of the words condemning the Guman prosecution will brand further defense of him as either highly inconsistent or utterly insincere.

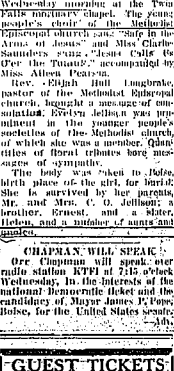
